Preface

Since the early days of the Israeli occupation to Palestine in 1948, the Israeli occupation forces have arrested Palestinian children, women, and men to deter Palestinian freedom fighters who take part in resistance actions against the Israeli occupation. The Israeli judiciary continued to make horrible judgements against Palestinians, such as life sentences and hundred-year-long imprisonment sentences. Although the Israeli occupation knew that Palestinians will not live for hundreds of years, it makes such judgments to terrorize and criminalize the indigenous Palestinians who are entitled to resist the Israeli occupation. Moreover, the Israeli occupation turns a blind eye to the international community, law, and conventions about the prisoners' rights.

As the Palestinian male and female detainees are the icons of the freedom struggle against the Israeli occupation, their freedom has been a priority and the Palestinians have managed to hammer out many prisoner swap deals with the Israeli occupation. The last one was the Gilad Shalit prisoner exchange deal in 2011, known among Palestinians as the Wafaa Al-Ahrar deal ("True Promise of Freeman"). Under this agreement, the Israeli occupation released all the Palestinian women detainees held in Israeli jails.

After 2011, and with the surge in the resistance actions against the Israeli occupation that mounted in the 2014 Jerusalem Intifada, the Israeli occupation accelerated its aggressive policies against



the Palestinians. Israeli occupation forces have detained dozens of Palestinian women at Israeli checkpoints that fragment the West Bank and disconnect Palestinian cities, towns, and villages. The Israeli occupation made these checkpoints a place to strip the Palestinian people of their dignity and make their life difficult. Dozens of Palestinian women have been arrested in Israeli jails for fabricated charges in 2015 and 2016. It was a massive wave of arrests to hinder the popular resistance that broke out in defense of the Palestinians' holy places.

The lack of trusted information about the Palestinian women detainees held in Israeli jails encourages us to publish this book to bear witness to the Israeli violations against Palestinian women. Needless to say, information about the Palestinian detainees is usually informally published on social media, and there are no available references that document their captivity, except in some academic dissertations.

The Palestinian women detainees are not numbers. Every Palestinian woman detained in Israeli jails has her story and this book is intended to document their suffering and hardship behind bars. Titled "Palestinian Female Detainees in Israeli Occupation Jails: A Documentary Study (2000 - 2021)," the study is divided into three parts: Chapter One offers an overview about the Palestinian women's experiences of captivity in Israeli jails, Chapter Two offers biographical data about each Palestinian female detainee, and Chapter Three includes a list of the Palestinian female detainees



in Israeli jails within the timeframe covered in this book. The list includes women detainees who were released from Israeli jails or those who are still in detention.

It is noteworthy that two detainees who were arrested beyond the timeframe of this documentary study have been listed. Although arrested in 1998 and 1997, their names are included to make this documentary study more inclusive. Moreover, both were in prison during the Second Palestinian Intifada erupted in 2000.

Working on this study was not easy. The major obstacle was the inaccurate information available on the internet or released by human rights organizations. Although the internet was a good source, it did not offer details about each case. As Women for Palestine Center for Studies and Research considers the issue of the Palestinian detainees part and parcel of its scope of work, we worked hard to check every single information about the detainees. We formed a team of researchers who contacted a big number of freed women detainees to obtain accurate data about them. We also formed another team to review the information and a translation team to render this information into English.

We are indebted to human rights organizations and bodies that contributed to this study, including, the Palestinian Ministry of Detainees and Ex-Detainees Affairs, the Palestinian Detainee Club based in Hebron, and the Addameer Prisoner Support and Human Rights Association. Special thanks go to the Palestine-Malaysia



Strategic Initiative led by Dr Ibraheem Al-Zaeem for their efforts to make this book see the light of day.

Women For Palestine Center for Studies and Research is publishing this book as an endeavor to document the Israeli detention of Palestinians, which is an outcome of the Israeli occupation of Palestine. Therefore, we publish this book to make information about the Palestinian women detainees available for researchers, human rights organisations, and other bodies that are concerned about the issues of women. We also hope that the information included in this book would be used as evidence to hold Israeli leaders accountable for their crimes and violations of human rights and international conventions at international courts.

Introduction

All forms of historical documentation, inclusive of listing historical facts or historical analysis and interpretation, have been of paramount importance since ever. Sometimes, kings and people in authority have documented history to monumentalize themselves. But, in most cases, historical documentation aims to offer solutions for problems faced by humans in a particular setting, and it is never intended for entertainment.

There are many examples from the documentation of Arabic and Islamic history. such as Al-Masudi's 'Muruj Al-Dhahab' ("The Meadows of Gold") which raised a fundamental question: How would the social groups of the Muslim society avoid disputes and splits, given that the Muslim society is racially heterogeneous? To answer this question, Al-Masudi toured the Islamic State, learned about its communities and social groups, and recorded the norms and traditions of each in a bid to help them get to know each other and promote absolute harmony among this society.

Another prominent historian is Ibn Khaldun, who answered a question that perplexed the people of his time: Why do countries and societies collapse? Reviewing historical facts, he put forward some answers to guide Muslims to correct their mistakes and improve their conditions. Many other examples are also available in the histories of Arabs and non-Arabs.



But why should women in particular write history? Is it a trend now? Is it an attempt to highlight the history of a vulnerable, marginalized group? Is the female documentation of history really needed?

I believe there are many endeavors that interpret the need for women to write their history, especially of the Palestinian women detainees. These can be summarized in the following points:

1. Highlighting the cultural values that help or impede women's integration in resistance directly or indirectly and their support for the resistance actions made by males.
2. Learning about the experiences of female detainees in the face of the jailer and making them available for generations who want to go for the resistance path.
3. Understanding the social factors and laws that help women get their rights and other factors that impede their access to these rights
4. Explaining the environment that paves the way for Palestinian women to excel or hinder participation in the freedom struggle

Therefore, the documentary study by Women for Palestine Center for Studies and Research about the female Palestinian detainees in Israeli jails contributes considerably to the achievement of the



above-mentioned objectives. The experiences of those female detainees is an integral part of the Palestinian heritage and culture and the women detainees themselves are a major social group in the Palestinian society. Such documentation emphasizes the role played by women in the status quo and offers answers about other questions, such as: What are the cultural values that should be enhanced to strengthen the role of women in the Palestinian society? What are the laws needed to stop the oppression endured by women in the Palestinian society? What kind of work environment is needed to encourage the Palestinian women's creativity and ensure their influential position in the Palestinian society?

Finally, this book is part of many activities conducted by many organizations and associations aimed at the production of a genuine Palestinian culture that smells like the thyme, olives, oranges, and lemons of Palestine. Such endeavors enhance the national legacy of Palestine that connects the past with the present and paves the way for the future.

List of terms



Ramleh Prison

Located in Ramleh, this prison is one of the most guarded Israeli prisons and the Palestinian detainees kept in this prison are classified as ‘very dangerous’. The Ramleh prison is designed to look like ‘Tegart forts’. It includes 625 cells and is divided into 15 sections.

Hasharon (Telmond) Prison

Located South of the line extending between Tulkaram and Netanya on the old road leading to Hadera, the Hasharon prison has three sections: three sections: one for male children classified as security prisoners, another for female children designated as security prisoners, and the third one for female security prisoners. Three-meter-high walls surround the prison, and it has four guard towers.

Neve Tirza Prison

Constructed in 1968, Neve Tirza Prison is the only prison in Israel for women. It is a maximum-security prison, and it may include up to 220 detainees.

Damon Prison

Located in northern Palestine in the forests of Carmel in Haifa, this prison was reopened in the Second Intifada. It was first opened during the period of the British mandate to Palestine.



Givon Prison

Opened in October 2015, Givon prison is one of the newly established prisons. Only minors from Jerusalem and the 1948 occupied territories are kept in this prison.

Megiddo Prison and Detention Center

Located in the meadow area of Beni Amer en route to Haifa, this prison was opened for Palestinian security prisoners in March 1998, after the outbreak of the First Intifada. It is both a prison and a detention center.

Negev Desert (Ketziot) Prison

Located 45 km southwest Beer Sheva, the Negev Desert Prison is the largest incarnation center in Israel.

Al-Moscobiyeh (The Russian Compound) Interrogation Center and Prison

It is located northern Jerusalem inside the so-called ‘Russian compound’. It was established during the British mandate to Palestine. It was known as the ‘central prison’ back then. An interrogation centre is also attached to the prison.

Jalamah Prison (Kishon)

Located at a main road between Haifa and Nazareth south 1948 occupied Palestinian territories, the Jalamah Prison is a maximum-



security prison in which detainees are kept during the entire interrogation period. The prison was established during the British mandate to Palestine, but re-opened during the Al-Aqsa Intifada.

Confidential file

Confidential file is a term to describe the charges and sentences of Palestinian detainees held in administrative detention. If a Palestinian detainee has a confidential file, s/he does not know any details about the charge or case. The Israeli occupation keeps prisoners charged with a confidential case in detention only for ‘secret information’, which neither the detainee nor his/her lawyer has access to.

Administrative detention

Administrative detention is incarceration without trial or charge. Neither the lawyer nor the detainee has access to this ‘secret information’ for which the detainee is imprisoned. Every detention order is six-month-long but is renewable infinitely, based on Israeli military orders.

Financial penalty (fine)

The Israeli Prison Service and military courts impose two types of financial penalties on Palestinian detainees. The first one is imposed through military courts on detainees, especially, minor prisoners sentenced to imprisonment. In this case, the Israeli court added a large sum of money to the judgement. The other type of



financial penalties is imposed on Palestinian detainees serving their sentences behind bars for actions considered as violations by the prison service.

Life sentence

When an Israeli court sentences a Palestinian for life sentence, s/he will be imprisoned for the rest of his/her life or for a hundred years. This court judgement is irreducible and unappealable. It is issued against the one who does the action and everyone who assists this person. One detainee may be sentenced to more than one life sentence. It may reach up to sixty consecutive life sentences.

Shabeh

It is a torture method used by Israeli interrogators. Shabeh entails shackling a detainee's hands and legs to a chair for a prolonged period to inflict severe pain on his/her body. It can be accompanied by sensory isolation or sleep deprivation.

Bosta

The bosta is an armored, high-security prisoner transport vehicle used by the Israeli prison Service to transfer prisoners between prisons, detention centers, or hospitals. The bosta is not a safe vehicle—it does not have a sitting bench or good ventilation. While being transferred in the bosta, a prisoner's hands and legs remain shackled for more than ten hours.



Fora

It is a term coined by Palestinian prisoners to mean the break time in prison. It is a time when Palestinian detainees are allowed to go out to the court yard which is a space covered by barbed wire and surrounded by a 7-meter long walls.

Shekel

It is the currency of Israel and is also used as the legal tender in the occupied Palestinian territories. Now it equals 0.29 USD.

Cantina

It is a small market in prison that sells the basic items to Palestinian detainees, such as food, cleaning materials, or clothes. The Palestinian Authority deposits a sum of money in special accounts for every detainee to be used to buy from the cantina. But the Israeli Prison Service often deprives the detainees from the credit and confiscates the money.

The 1948 occupied territories

They refer to the Palestinians territories occupied by the occupation in 1948, covering all parts of historical Palestine, except for the Gaza Strip and the West Bank.



The 1967 occupied territories

The territories that Israel occupied in the 1967 six-day war, covering the West Bank, the Gaza Strip, and East Jerusalem.

Israeli settlements

Palestinians name the settlements ‘usurped lands’. They refer to the Israeli residential spots established in Palestinian territories occupied in 1967.

Military checkpoints

They are security checkpoints placed in all Palestinian cities by the Israeli occupation to make the Palestinian people’s life difficult. Israeli occupation forces use these checkpoints to humiliate the Palestinians, search them, and restrict their movement. Israeli settlers who are escorted by Israeli soldiers also attack the Palestinians at the checkpoints. Some of the Israeli checkpoints are placed along the Israeli separation wall.

Checkpoints are divided into two types: permanent or temporary (mobile). Israel has erected hundreds of permanent checkpoints in the West Bank since the outbreak of the Second Intifada in September 2000. According to the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs, Israel places 522 checkpoints that restrict the Palestinian people’s movement in the West Bank, in addition to 495 temporary checkpoints erected every month.



Gilad Shalit prisoner exchange deal

It is a prisoner swap deal signed in Cairo between the Palestinian Islamic Resistance Movement Hamas and the Israeli occupation. Brokered by Egypt and Germany, the deal resulted in the release of 1027 Palestinian detainee in exchange for Gilad Shalit, the Israeli soldier captured by Hamas. The Palestinian detainees were released in two stages, with 477 detainees released on October 18, 2011, and 550 released on December 18, 2011.

Shalit footage deal

Following the 2008-2009 Israeli war on the Gaza Strip, a deal was reached by Israel and Hamas whereby Hamas released a one-minute footage of the Israeli soldier Gilad Shalit in exchange for 20 Palestinian female detainees, 19 of them are from the West Bank and one from Gaza.

Chapter I

The Palestinian women's experiences of captivity in Israeli jails: 2000-2021



Introduction

The Palestinian woman is an integral part of the Palestinian society. She endures suffering and persecution due to the brutal Israeli occupation. This made women follow the path of resistance and liberation to play a national role in the resistance against the Israeli occupation. The Israeli Zionist occupation treats every Palestinian cruelly. Women are arrested in difficult conditions, where the Zionist soldiers violate their dignity and basic human rights. They are also placed in detention centers that lack the basics of life.

Israel has arrested many Palestinian women, including minors, pregnant, mothers, wounded women, or sick ones who need medical treatment. The occupation practiced various forms of physical and psychological torture against Palestinian detainees, which has left a negative impact on the prisoners' lives. Many of the detained women who were released suffer from various diseases due to the inhumane conditions of the Israeli prisons. In addition, there is a social stigma attached to female detainees who suffer from discrimination.

By detaining Palestinian women, the Israeli occupation aims to humiliate the detained women and kill them mentally and psychological through a systematic policy and a set of procedures and discriminatory laws it adopts. Everyone who works in the Israeli security forces contributes to this policy, including the soldier, the investigator, the jailer, as well as the doctor, as suffering



starts from the moment of arrest and does not end at the moment of release.

Israeli occupation's arrest of Palestinian women, and practicing its systematic torture against them, is a flagrant violation of International Humanitarian Law and all human rights conventions, especially the Fourth Geneva Convention of 1949, which governs the legal status of Palestinians in the occupied Palestinian territories as protected people by that convention ⁽¹⁾, as well as the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women, «CEDAW» 1979.

In this study, the names of several female prisoners who were arrested and tortured in the Israeli occupation's prisons were cited as an example. The study also highlighted the geographical distribution of Palestinian female prisoners. If we want to list all the women who went through the experience of detention during the study timeframe (2000-2021), the pages will not suffice.

The importance of the study:

1. Exposing Israeli occupation violations against Palestinian women detainees from 2000 to 2021
2. Drawing the international community's attention to the ongoing crimes of the occupation against Palestinian women
3. Helping human rights activists to find a well-documented source that includes events and testimonies, which confirm



the violation of the Israeli occupation against Palestinian women

4. Drawing the attention of the Palestinian community about the necessity of embracing released female detainees and giving them support
5. Providing much-needed documentation of the captive feminist movement for those interested in the women's movement in Palestine

Objectives of the study:

1. Documenting the violations of the Israeli occupation against Palestinian women during the detention and investigation stages
2. Highlighting the poor imprisonment conditions of Palestinian female detainees in the Israeli occupation detentions
3. Identifying the female detainees suffering due to medical neglect and denial of visits
4. Exploring the social and psychological impact of detention on Palestinian women
5. Highlighting the Palestinian women detainees' struggle in the Israeli occupation detention centres



Study Approach:

In this study, the researchers followed the historical-descriptive approach, by tracing the suffering of the Palestinian female detainees in the Israeli occupation's detention centers. Besides, the study documents Israeli violations against the detainees, monitoring their numbers during the study period, and describing their suffering during the arrest and investigation stages. In addition, it examines the international humanitarian law's position towards arresting and torturing Palestinian women in the prisons of the Israeli occupation.

- » **Time limits:** The study sheds light on the conditions of female detainees in the occupation's prisons from 2000 to 2020.
- » **Spatial limit:** The study examines the violations of the Israeli occupation against Palestinian women detainees in the occupation detention centers.

The study problem:

The ongoing Israeli occupation violation of Palestinian women's rights that were approved by the international community and all international conventions on human rights, especially those related to the inhumane and unethical treatment of female Palestinian detainees, makes this study a necessity. This study can help put much-needed pressure on the Israeli occupation and force it to



abide by human rights and release Palestinian female prisoners.

First, the Israeli occupation's targeting of Palestinian women by captivity and detention:

The Israeli occupation deliberately targets Palestinian women through captivity and detention, thus exposing them to as cruel treatment. About 16,000 Palestinian women were arrested in the Israeli occupation detention centers from 1967 to 2020. The period of the first Palestinian Intifada, which began in 1987, witnessed the largest surge of arrests against Palestinian women, as the number of female detainees reached about 3000. Until the end of June 1989, there were 32 women in the Israeli occupation prisons. ⁽²⁾

The number reached 36 female prisoners in 1996. Israel released 35 female prisoners on February 12, 1997, according to the Taba Agreement, and kept one female prisoner, Saha Marra, who remained alone in prison for more than nine months suffering from the bitterness of detention and loneliness. ⁽³⁾ But it seems that the case of Saha Marra was neglected and was not covered in the media. The researcher did not find a name for her in the sources and references, so many people thought that all the captives were released then. But Israel continued to arrest Palestinian women for many reasons. By the Second Intifada, the Israeli occupation had detained four Palestinian women. ⁽⁴⁾

During the Al-Aqsa Intifada that broke out in 2000, the Israeli occupation arrested about 1,500 women, who went through



the experience of detention for days, months, or years ⁽⁵⁾. The conditions of female detainees during that period were tragic, as the occupation worked hard through its repressive procedures to destroy the detainee psychologically to make others refrain from following the same path ⁽⁶⁾.

The Israeli occupation accelerated its brutal attacks against the Palestinian people in 2002, especially after the Israeli occupation forces' invasion of Jenin and Nablus and the siege imposed on Palestinian President Yasser Arafat's headquarters. Palestinian women were subjected to oppression and suffering as well. Palestinian female detainee Qahera Al-Saadi was an example of the Palestinian woman who went through enormous suffering caused by the Israeli occupation. Israeli occupation forces detained her in May 2002 and subjected her to abusive interrogation and torture ⁽⁷⁾. She was physically insulted and verbally abused and denied family visits.

As of March 30, 2004, the Israeli occupation forces had detained 74 Palestinian females. Some 129 Palestinian detainees were in Israeli jails in December 2004. ⁽⁸⁾

Statistics released by the Palestinian Ministry of Detainees and Ex-Detainees show that 97 were held in Israeli jails, as of the end of 2007, including member of the Palestinian Legislative Council Dr Mariam Saleh whom the Israeli occupation detained on November 12, 2007. Mariam was the first parliamentarian to be detained by



the Israeli occupation. ⁽⁹⁾

Since mid-2009, the number of female detainees began to decline, reaching 36 female detainees; after the occupation released 20 Palestinian female detainees, on the first of October 2009 when Hamas had delivered a video to the occupation through the German mediator, of the captured soldier Gilad Shalit ⁽¹⁰⁾. The number of female detainees remained the same throughout 2010 ⁽¹¹⁾. Then the number of detainees decreased again after the prisoner exchange deal between Hamas and the Israeli occupation, which is known as the Wafa Al-Ahrar Deal. This agreement resulted in the release of 27 Palestinian female detainees ⁽¹²⁾.

Following this deal, the number of Palestinian female detainees in the occupation prisons decreased to nine, who were not included in the exchange deal in the first phase, bringing the number of detainees until December 18, 2011, the date for the final phase of the exchange deal, to (10) detainees, after the arrest of Salwa Hassan, 56 years old, from Hebron. Six female detainees were released, leaving four Palestinian detainees in the occupation jails: Salwa Hassan, Lina Jarbouni, Ward Qassem, and Khadija Abu Ayyash from the occupied lands of 1948.

In 2012, the Israeli occupation arrested 30 Palestinian women, among whom were the two freed detainees in the Wafaa Al-Ahrar prisoners' exchange deal, Hana Shalaby and Mona Qa'dan, from Jenin ⁽¹³⁾. In early 2013, the Israeli occupation authorities were



holding 10 Palestinian female detainees in their prisons, and that number reached 16 detainees in the end of the year, ⁽¹⁴⁾ but in 2014, the Israeli occupation arrested 112 Palestinian women ⁽¹⁵⁾. The city of Jerusalem witnessed the highest rate of arrests among women, especially among the steadfast defenders of Al-Aqsa Mosque, where 66 Jerusalemite women and girls were arrested, ⁽¹⁶⁾ including teacher Hanadi Halawani. The occupation also re-arrested two detainees who were released in the Wafa Al-Ahrar deal, namely: Bushra Al-Tawil, from Al-Bireh, and Haniyeh Nasser, from Ramallah, to serve the remaining of their previous sentences. ⁽¹⁷⁾

The re-arrest of female detainees released in the prisoners' exchange deal indicates Israel's lack of respect for the agreements it signs.

By the end of 2014, the number of Palestinian detainees reached 21 women and girls, and among them were three minors: Dima Sawahreh, 17, from Jabal Al Mukaber in Jerusalem, Yathrib Salah Rayan, 16, from Jerusalem, and Malak Al-Khatib, 14, from Ramallah.

In 2015, the Israeli occupation arrested 106 female detainees, the majority of whom were from Jerusalem. They represent various social sectors of the Palestinian people, including mothers, MPs, doctors, university students, and minors, ⁽¹⁸⁾ whereas the Israeli occupation arrested 164 Palestinian women and girls in 2016, including 79 Jerusalemites. ⁽¹⁹⁾



The escalation of the arrests against Palestinian women has reached its peak with the outbreak of the Jerusalem Intifada after US President Donald Trump declared Jerusalem as the capital of Israel on 6th December 2017. ⁽²⁰⁾ Palestinian Prisoners Center for Studies monitored 170 cases of Palestinian female detainees in 2017. The rate of arrests of Palestinian women also increased in 2018, especially among steadfast defenders of the Al-Aqsa Mosque. As the occupation authorities arrested about 110 Palestinian women that year, by the end of 2018, the number of female prisoners inside the occupation prisons had reached 57 Palestinian women. ⁽²¹⁾

On December 12, 2019, the number of female detainees was about 50. Four of them were held in administrative detention, who are: Alaa Al-Bashir from Qalqilya, Shorouk Al-Badan from Bethlehem, Bushra Al-Tawil from Ramallah, and Shatha Hassan from Al-Bireh. ⁽²²⁾ The Israeli occupation also continued to arrest MP Khaleda Kanaan Jarrar, who was arrested on 31st October 2019, only 8 months after her release, after administrative detention that lasted for 20 months. The charge against her was the same charge she was tried for in 2015 (joining a prohibited organization), which violates the international legal principle that a person cannot be tried twice for the same matter. ⁽²³⁾

Since the beginning of 2020, the arrests of Palestinians have increased. According to the documentation of human rights institutions about prisoners' affairs, the Israeli occupation forces arrested about 128 women in 2020. The highest rate of arrests



among Palestinian women was recorded in Jerusalem and its towns, where 100 Jerusalemites were arrested, including 3 minors.

2021 witnessed a rise in the Israeli arrests of Palestinians. As of February 6, 2022, Israeli occupation forces have detained almost 184 Palestinian women, and 32 of them are still in detention. (25)

The arrest of female university students:

The arrests carried out by the Israeli occupation authorities have targeted female students in Palestinian universities, especially female students at Birzeit University. The occupation deliberately arrests female university students because of their student activities inside the university. This comes in an attempt to undermine any social activity that could contribute to raising national awareness at the educational environment. Several female students who were arrested by Israel were prevented from completing their education, for example:

1. **Hala Muhammad Bitar:** A student studying at Al-Quds University. The occupation forces arrested her on 19/04/2016 for her participation in student activities at Al-Quds University. She was sentenced to 4 months in prison. (26)
2. **Bayan Khamaysa:** A student from Hebron. The Israeli court issued a sentence of 13 and a half months and a fine of 4,000 shekels (\$ 1,200) against her. This was on charges



of incitement through social media and her activity with the Islamic Bloc at Polytechnic University. ⁽²⁷⁾

3. **Mays Abu Ghosh:** She was arrested on 29/08/2019 and transferred to the Al-Maskobiyya investigation center, ⁽²⁸⁾ where the interrogation continued for a period of 30 days. During the investigation, the Israeli occupation deprived her of meeting a lawyer. Mays was subjected to severe torture and sleep deprivation. ⁽²⁹⁾
4. **Ruba Asi:** She was arrested after the occupation raided her house on 07/07/2020. Israeli occupation forces threatened to arrest her father and prevented her from completing her university study. She was interrogated in harsh and poor conditions. Then the Israeli occupation transferred her to the al-Maabar section of Telmond prison (Hasharon) ⁽³⁰⁾ with female criminal prisoners, where she was subjected to verbal harassment and abuse. ⁽³¹⁾
5. **Shatha Majed Hassan:** A media student at Birzeit University. The Israeli occupation forces arrested her from her home in Ramallah, on 12/12/2019. The Israeli occupation forces issued a verdict of administrative detention against her for a period of 3 months. Administrative detention was renewed for a further period of 3 months when it was nearing its end. ⁽³²⁾



6. **Layan Nizar Kayed:** Sociology student at Birzeit University. She was arrested on 08/06/2020 while she was crossing the Za'tara military checkpoint, under the pretext of her participation in student activities. The occupation is still presenting her to the courts in succession without trial. Then she was released on 09/09/2021. ⁽³³⁾

7. **Elia Abu Hijleh:** A law student at Birzeit University. She was arrested by the Israeli occupation forces on July 1, 2020, for her student activities at the university. The occupation has prevented her from continuing her studies, and the occupation authorities have also prohibited the entry of educational books to her. Still, Elia has maintained her academic distinction since she joined the university. ⁽³⁴⁾

Israel's targeting of university students violates their basic right of education as it hinders their educational and academic journeys. Besides, the Israeli occupation authorities are submitting indictments against students for their student activity, in a clear violation of the basic right of political affiliation guaranteed by international covenants and treaties.

The arrest of female journalists and press women:

The media plays an important role in delivering information to a wide audience. It is distinguished by its ability to influence segments of society, create public opinion and develop trends and patterns of behaviour. Hence, the Israeli occupation's target of



Palestinian women journalists was an attempt to suppress media freedom. Some influential press women who have been arrested by the Israeli occupation are:

Lama Khater: A Palestinian writer who studied Arabic at the Faculty of Arts, Hebron University. The occupation forces arrested her on 24/07/2018, and the occupation court issued an effective sentence of 13 months against her. She was accused of being a writer and an activist in exposing the crimes of the Israeli occupation in newspapers and social media. ⁽³⁵⁾

Bushra al-Tawil: She spent more than 20 months in administrative detention, without a specific charge. The occupation has continuously targeted Bushra with arbitrary administrative detention, in an attempt to silence the truth. This is because Bushra Al-Tawil is a journalist who is active in defending detainees and runs a media network for detainees called Anin Al-Qied (the Moaning Chains).

It is worth mentioning that Bushra was arrested for the first time in 2011 when she was 18 years old. A 16-month sentence was issued against her, but she was released after spending 5 months in the Wafa Al-Ahrar exchange deal in 2011. However, the occupation forces re-arrested her again on July 2, 2014, to complete the remainder of the previous sentence. ⁽³⁶⁾

Esraa Lafi: A journalist and writer in the fields of literature and politics in several newspapers and websites. She has also worked



for several local radio stations as a press correspondent. The occupation forces arrested her on 26/09/2018, and the occupation court issued a 10-month sentence against her for her media and public activities to advocate for the causes of her people and her homeland. ⁽³⁷⁾

Arrest under the pretext of incitement on social media:

Israeli occupation detains Palestinian women and girls under the pretext of incitement on social media in an attempt to silence the voice of truth. Some women who have been arrested due to their activity on social media include:

Sanaa Abu Sneina: She was arrested on February 17, 2016. This was under the pretext of incitement on her personal Facebook page by publishing posts that glorify martyrs and detainees. The occupation sentenced her to administrative detention for 3 months, to be renewed again for another 3 months. ⁽³⁸⁾

Sahar Natsheh: She was arrested on 05/09/2017 and sentenced to three and a half months. She was accused of incitement on social media, and she was also banned from using Facebook. ⁽³⁹⁾

Suzan Abu Ghannam: She was arrested in August 2018 after a raid and search of her home in the town of Al-Tur in Jerusalem. She was sentenced to 11 months in prison for incitement on Facebook. It is noteworthy that Suzan is the mother of the martyr Muhammad Abu Ghannam, who was martyred in July 2017 during the Uprising



Jerusalem against the electronic gates at the gates of Al-Aqsa. ⁽⁴⁰⁾

From the above, it is clear that the occupation did not only pursue women due to their political work but also went beyond that to monitor social media in an attempt to silence Palestinian women's voices. The Israeli occupation practices this procedure, especially in the city of Jerusalem, in an attempt to make Palestinians unconscious of their Palestinian reality and their national cause.

Injured detainees:

Israeli occupation forces intentionally shoot Palestinian women and girls during arrest, causing serious injuries, and then arrest them in inhumane conditions. As of the publication of this study, wounded women are still behind Israeli bars suffering from their injuries. They are:

Lama Al-Bakry: She was hit by three bullets in the body when she was arrested on 13/12/2015 on her way back from her school in Hebron. Her leg was stabilized with internal fixation as a result of that injury. The Israeli occupation practiced medical neglect against her. Lama still suffers from the impact of the injury. ⁽⁴¹⁾

Abla Al-A'dam: The occupation soldiers shot her during her arrest on 20/12/2015. As a result, she suffered from serious injuries in the head and face, which led to losing sight in the right eye. The detention center refuses to provide her with adequate treatment, and the doctor at the detention center only provides her with painkillers. ⁽⁴²⁾



Jihan Hashima: The occupation soldiers at Qalandia checkpoint fired at her, wounding her with three bullets in the left leg on 30/12/2016. She was taken to the hospital, where she underwent an operation and titanium was placed on her leg. After the operation, she was transferred to the Ramle Prison Hospital. ⁽⁴³⁾

Shorouk Dwayyat: She is from Jerusalem. She was shot by a bullet in her shoulder that caused a tear in one of her major arteries.

Amal Taqatqa: She is from Bethlehem. She was shot by a bullet in the left thigh, two bullets in the chest, a bullet in the waist and a stun grenade that exploded in her left hand. She was also beaten during the arrest, which caused fractures in the rib cage.

Marah Bakir: She was shot and wounded by 14 bullets in her left hand.

Nourhan Awad: She is from Jerusalem. She was wounded by 4 bullets, one in the left thigh and 3 bullets in the stomach.

Helwa Hamamra: She is from Bethlehem. She was seriously injured. She underwent 4 surgeries, during which part of the liver, pancreas, spleen and intestine were removed.

Israa Jaabis: The occupation forces shot her while she was in her car, which caught fire causing serious burns on her face as well as her body. ⁽⁴⁴⁾



Detained minor girls:

The Israeli occupation did not refrain from arresting underage girls and harming them. Some minors were released after serving their sentence period such as;

Lama Al-Bakri, 14: The Israeli occupation sentenced her to 3 years. She was wounded during detention by three bullets in her left leg and was confined to a wheelchair for several months.

Dima al-Wadawi, 12: She is the youngest female detainee in the world. She spent two and a half months in the occupation jails.

Malak Al-Khatib, 14: She was arrested by the occupation soldiers while she was returning home from school. She spent two months in detention.

Ahed Tamimi, 17: She spent 8 months in Israeli detention.

Some underage girls are still in Israeli prisons serving long sentences. According to the reports of the Prisoners' Institutions, there are 4 Palestinian women who were arrested while they were minors and are still in detention: **Shorouk Dwayat**, from Jerusalem, was sentenced to 16 years, **Nurhan Awad**, from Jerusalem, was sentenced to 10 years, **Malak Salman**, from Jerusalem, was sentenced to 10 years, and **Marah Bakeer** from Jerusalem was sentenced to 8 and a half years and a fine of 10 thousand shekels.

The Israeli occupation is the only entity that tries children in military courts, which lack the standards of regular courts according to human rights institutions. The children released from detention suffer from many mental disorders, such as isolation and introversion. They are very often in need of a long treatment period from the negative effects that detention has on them.

Second, violating the dignity of Palestinian women during arrest:

The Israeli occupation soldiers deliberately humiliate Palestinian women during the arrest, in front of everyone, whether they are her family or people in the streets. The forms of detaining women and girls have varied; some were arrested from home, some have been arrested after being summoned by the intelligence, and some have been arrested at checkpoints or from areas adjacent to settlements. It can be said that almost all minors were arrested either at the checkpoints or from the areas adjacent to settlements.

Soldiers storm the house at night and damage its content, handcuff and detain family members in a separate room. After that, they handcuff the girl's hands behind her back and put a blindfold on her eyes and then lead her to the military vehicle. Later, she is transferred either to army camps, to investigation and interrogation centers, and finally to the women's detention center. ⁽⁴⁶⁾

Many female detainees report how they were humiliated during the arrest. **Qahirah Al-Saadi** from Jenin, who was taken by the



occupation forces from home in front of her four children in May 2002, stated that she was beaten with rifle butts and that the soldiers insulted her with dirty words. ⁽⁴⁷⁾

Detainee **Alaa Assaf** stated that the occupation forces stormed her family's home in Birzeit on May 9, 2016. She was arrested and led in chains that caused her severe pain, and then she was thrown on the floor of the military jeep until she arrived at one of the occupation army camps, where she remained standing for more than half an hour, handcuffed and blindfolded. After that, she was transferred to the Maskobiyya detention center in Jerusalem. ⁽⁴⁸⁾

Hanadi Al-Halawani said: “The occupation soldiers stormed my house at midnight on 17/09/2017 and damaged its contents. Then they took me outside while my hands and legs were chained. I was humiliated in front of all the neighbors.” ⁽⁴⁹⁾

Ruba Abu Asi reported that Israeli soldiers threw her on the floor of the military jeep after placing a muzzle on her mouth and blindfolded her. She remained seated in a squatting position next to their military equipment which she was hit by. One of the female soldiers deliberately pulled and dragged her violently while she was handcuffed and her legs chained, and she almost fell several times. She also had a haemorrhage in her leg. ⁽⁵⁰⁾

Many female detainees were injured during their detention. The female detainee **Amal Taqatqa**, who was arrested on 01/12/2014, stated that when she was shot by the soldiers, they also beat her up.



She said, “After I was hit by a bullet in my chest, a stun grenade in my left hand, and another bullet in my side, I fell to the ground. A soldier repeatedly hit me with the butt of his rifle in my chest and other soldiers kicked me all over my body all while abusing me verbally.”⁽⁵¹⁾

It is evident from the above that the Israeli occupation authorities are using all kinds of abuse and torture against Palestinian female detainees, starting from arrests from homes until they are transferred to detention and interrogation centers. In many cases, they are shot during arrest, stripped naked, body cavity searched and physically and verbally abused.

Third, the methods of torture in the occupation detentions:

Palestinian female detainees are subjected to torture in the Israeli occupation prisons, where they are exposed to ill-treatment which does not distinguish between men and women. Israel detains the prisoners in cells that are not suitable for living and subject them to interrogation for long periods. Meanwhile, the soldiers practice all kinds of torture against them, such as beatings, hanging by the limbs, insults, sleep deprivation for long hours, and intimidation and bullying without taking into consideration their gender and their special needs. Among the methods of torture practiced by the occupation against female detainees during the investigation are:



1. Beating:

The Israeli interrogators do not hesitate to brutally beat the female detainees during the interrogation to extract information from them. There is ample evidence of detainees who had such experiences. They include: **Amna Abdel-Gawad**, from the town of Bir Nabala, north of Jerusalem, who was arrested in 2001 and sentenced to twenty years in prison. She was taken more than once to the hospital because of beatings and electric shocks for her activism for female prisoners' rights. ⁽⁵²⁾

Wafa Al-Bes, from Jabalia refugee camp in the Gaza Strip. The occupation forces arrested her at the Beit Hanoun "Erez" checkpoint on August 20, 2005, and she was sentenced to 12 years. She was beaten, deprived of sleep, and hit on her face. She said, "They deliberately beat the detainee on the head." ⁽⁵³⁾

During 30 days of investigation, the Israeli occupation soldiers beat **Mays Abu Ghosh** on the face and body, causing severe pain in her spine. Mays stated that she once tried to escape from the interrogators' hands and sit in a corner of the cell, but the investigator grabbed her and hit her head into the wall, kicked her harshly and verbally abused her. ⁽⁵⁴⁾

Thus, it can be said that most of the Palestinian female prisoners were beaten, either during arrest or during the interrogation stage. The testimony of the female prisoners whose names were mentioned is the clearest evidence of the occupation authorities'



use of beatings as a method of suppressing female prisoners, in addition to other methods such as isolation, psychological pressure and threats to the family.

2. Stripping (Body cavity search)

One of the worst ways of torture used by the occupation in the prisons is to strip the detained women to humiliate them and violate their dignity. Many female detainees were subjected to naked inspection during the arrest.

Qaherah Al-Saadi stated that she was stripped naked, in an unethical and degrading manner. Similarly, **Wafaa Al-Bes** mentioned that a Zionist jailer with a dog forced her to strip, and the dog tried to attack her. She had two options either to strip or to be attacked by the dog. ⁽⁵⁵⁾ **Amna Mena** also complained about the naked inspection she was subjected to daily saying: "The naked search is carried out by a jailer in a humiliating manner." ⁽⁵⁶⁾

Some veiled female detainees were subjected to removing their scarf either during the arrest or during the interrogation, such as teacher Khadija Khwais. The occupation forces arrested Khadija on 05/09/2017 who spent 38 days in detention. She suffered from oppression and humiliation behind the prison bars, as she was subjected to removing her dress as well as her hijab, and the soldiers flocked to her cell for inspection to further her psychological torture. ⁽⁵⁷⁾



In an interview with one of the detainees, who asked not to be named, she stated: "Many soldiers stormed my room while I was not veiled. I started screaming and they took me to another room. Then two female soldiers came and searched me completely naked; I felt violated and severely oppressed. I was also subjected to more naked inspection during the arrest, upon my arrival to each detention and investigation center, and even during my arrival to the women's detention center in Sharon prison." ⁽⁵⁸⁾

3. Solitary confinement:

The Israeli occupation isolates the Palestinian detainees in small cells of no more than 80 cm x 120 cm, for several days or weeks as a method of punishment. Prisoners are especially isolated if they take part in any activity to ease the jailer's suppression or if they go on a hunger strike. The occupation aims to kill their spirit of defiance and resilience and destroy their morale. Some of the detainees who suffered from isolation include:

Itaf Alyan: She was intermittently detained for more than 14 years in the occupation prisons, and was isolated for four continuous years under the pretext that she was dangerous. ⁽⁵⁹⁾

Amna Mena: She was kept in solitary confinement for nearly a year and a half in a very small room, located next to the cells of criminal prisoners.

Abeer Odeh: From the town of Sidon, north of Tulkarm, she



spent five and a half years in solitary confinement in very difficult circumstances.

Wafa Samir Albes: She spent two years in isolation cells in the Ramle prison.

Fadwa Hamada: From Jerusalem, she spent 62 days of solitary confinement in extremely difficult conditions. Fadwa had previously been subjected to isolation for more than two months in Jalameh prison, ⁽⁶⁰⁾ accompanied by Jihan Hashima. ⁽⁶¹⁾

Nawal Fatiha: She was subjected to solitary isolation in a cell that lacked all the essentials of normal human life, despite her bad health and psychological condition. ⁽⁶²⁾

Isolating Palestinian women prisoners by the occupation authorities is a crime against humanity that is added to the series of Israeli crimes against the Palestinians. As the isolation of the captive has a negative impact on her and her psyche in an attempt to kill her spirit of defiance and steadfastness.

4. Hanging by the limbs (suspension) and sleep deprivation:

The interrogators torture prisoners by tying them and suspending them by the limbs (shabeh) for long hours, in addition to depriving them of sleep for long hours. Many female detainees were subjected to shabeh during interrogation, as the detainees' hands are tied to the back of a chair, and the legs are tied to the chair as well. Among



the detainees who were subjected to this are:

Qahera Al-Saadi was subjected to an interrogation that lasted 115 days in the investigation cells in the Maskobiyya in Jerusalem. During this period, she was subjected to various forms of torture as she was tied and suspended in a filthy cell. Qahera Al-Saadi was arrested in 2002 and was sentenced to life imprisonment three times, but she was released in the exchange deal in 2011. ⁽⁶³⁾

Lama Khater stated that from the first moments of her arrest, she was subjected to harsh and continuous investigations. The interrogation lasted for more than 20 hours a day, and she was tied to a chair the whole time. ⁽⁶⁴⁾

Mays Abu Ghosh reported that her interrogation continued for many hours when she spent her time squatting on a small chair inside a very cold cell. Besides, the interrogators violently beat her on the face and body and deprived her of sleep. ⁽⁶⁵⁾

Tasnim Al-Qadhi stated that: "The interrogators deliberately removed her veil during the investigation. In addition to restricting her in a chair throughout the investigation period which lasted for two weeks from morning until eight in the evening." ⁽⁶⁶⁾

There is, it seems, no conscience to prevent the Israeli interrogators from torturing sick female detainees, such as Kifah Jibril, who was arrested by the occupation from her home in Ramallah, on August 1, 2013. She was tortured and was left handcuffed and tied



to a chair behind her back, causing her blood to clot in addition to severe pain. ⁽⁶⁷⁾

5. Stress:

Palestinian female detainees have been subjected to psychological torture by the Israeli occupation through threatening to destroy their homes, depriving them of seeing their children, arresting and beating their family members, torturing detainees in front of them, and throwing them in dirty, cramped cells with poor lighting and ventilation. Many female detainees who were subjected to psychological distress include:

Qahera Al-Saadi suffered from the severe psychological pain that befell her inside the prison. The Israeli intelligence informed her that they had arrested her two daughters, 10 and 16 years old, and threatened to rape them if she did not respond to their demands. Exhausted psychologically, Qahera did not know the fate of her four children, after the occupation had arrested her and her husband since the kids had no relatives in their area of residence in Jenin for the children to live with. ⁽⁶⁸⁾

Dalal Abu Al-Hawa, from the Al-Thawri neighbourhood in Jerusalem, was arrested on 28/8/2016 and was sentenced to 12 months and deported from Jerusalem for three years. During the interrogation, Dalal was subjected to ill-treatment and profanity. The occupation also exerted psychological pressure. Sometimes two interrogators would pressure her to confess. They also threatened



to beat her son Omar, who was detained by the occupation in front of her. ⁽⁶⁹⁾

Mays Abu Ghosh reported that the interrogators brought her brother and her parents in to force her to confess to the charges against her. She also reported that the interrogators brought a large rat into the cell to terrorize her. They were procrastinating in responding to her demands, including denying her access to the bathroom. ⁽⁷⁰⁾

It is clear from the above that these torture methods are used by Zionist interrogators to put pressure on the detainee, humiliate her, terrorize her and violate her dignity. Sometimes, this leads to the destruction of the detainee's psyche, for which she needs treatment and psychological rehabilitation.

Fourth, the poor living conditions in the occupation detentions:

Palestinian women detainees in detention centers of the Israeli occupation suffer from tragic living conditions. The place is unliveable, and the storming of the detainees' rooms in constant, and provocative tampering with their personal belongings never stops. Under the pretext of searching, Israel practices abusive methods against detained Palestinian women.

The Prisoners' Institutions confirm that the detained women in the Damon Detention Center ⁽⁷¹⁾ suffer from difficult living conditions. The cells are very humid, as the floors of the rooms are made of



concrete without tiles, and most of them are poorly ventilated and full of insects since the building is very old. The female detainees also suffer from the presence of surveillance cameras in the section square, which violates their privacy. The bathrooms are located outside the rooms, denying them to have showers freely, and they are not allowed to take showers except during the hours of **fora (stroll)** “a special term in Israeli prison means the time of going outdoors”. The female detainee is forced to walk from her room across the yard, which poses embarrassment and difficulty for them, especially in cold weather. ⁽⁷²⁾

Moreover, female detainees at Telmond (Hasharon) suffered from poor sanitary conditions. Its walls are saturated with moisture, which affects the health of the prisoners and exposes them to chest diseases, back and joint pain, and many other diseases. This is because the sun does not enter the cells. In addition, the buildings smell of mold due to ancient sewers, where insects, as well as rodents, procreate. ⁽⁷³⁾

This was confirmed by the liberated captive **Abeer Mahmoud Odeh**, who said: "The administration of Telmond Prison releases police dogs into the rooms under the pretext of inspection, which spreads a state of panic among the female prisoners. In addition to the open presence of sewage, which causes unpleasant odors and serious diseases." ⁽⁷⁴⁾

Female detainees also suffer from a lack of blankets in the winter,



as the detention administration does not provide them with warm winter clothes, nor does it allow their families to bring them blankets and clothes. ⁽⁷⁵⁾

Abdel Nasser Farwana, Head of the Documentation Unit at the Prisoners and Editors Affairs Authority, points that: "There are no safety conditions for female detainees inside the detention rooms. The beds are high as they are made up of bunks, which results in hurting and injuring detainees who fall. Regarding drinking water, the detainees buy drinking water at their own expense from the prison canteen." ⁽⁷⁶⁾

The freed detainee **Ibtisam Eid Musa**, 60, described the interrogation cell in which she was being held: "The walls are of a gloomy colour, which leads to aversion as well as pessimism. There is no ventilation or windows. As for the size of the cell, it barely accommodates a worn-out, dirty mattress that smells bad and a light cover without a pillow. The bathroom is without a door." ⁽⁷⁷⁾

The Israeli Occupation authorities detain Palestinian female detainees in poor living conditions violating Article (85) of the Fourth Geneva Convention, which states: "The Detaining Power is bound to take all necessary and possible measures to ensure that protected persons shall, from the outset of their internment, be accommodated in buildings or quarters which afford every possible safeguard as regards hygiene and health."



Detainees and Coronavirus:

At the beginning of 2020, the Coronavirus (Covid-19) began to spread in the world and the occupied Palestinian territories. The Israeli detention administration did not take sufficient measures to protect the detained women from the risk of virus infection. The occupation authorities also did not take into account the age of the detainees and their special needs and did not provide them with the minimum elements of prevention and safety procedures in the detention and investigation centers where they are held. Besides, the detention administration did not address the problem of overcrowding, nor did they reduce the level of contact or daily “security” measures to protect them from infection in light of the increasing number of Covid-19 cases among the jailers and prison guards. This has threatened the lives and health of the detainees and exposed them to the possibility of getting an infection with the Coronavirus. At the same time, female detainees were not allowed to communicate with families through alternative means, along with visits bans for more than 7 months due to the pandemic. ⁽⁷⁸⁾

1. The suffering of female detainees due to medical negligence:

Female detainees in the Israeli occupation detention centers suffer from very difficult health conditions. The prison authorities do not respect their right to health care, or their special needs as women. Female detainees also suffer from a lack of attention to medical cases with which Israel deals neglectfully. Even wounded and sick



women among the detainees who suffer from very difficult health conditions do not receive appropriate treatment.

The female prisoners complain of medical neglect, especially from the ophthalmologist, who comes to visit the prisoners only once every six months, and does not provide them with the necessary treatment, although some of them need medical glasses. The female prisoners also complain about the absence of a female gynaecologist to examine their health conditions. ⁽⁷⁹⁾

Medical negligence against Palestinian female detainees is a policy that has been followed since the beginning of the Israeli occupation in 1948 until the present day. Some female detainees who suffered from medical neglect are:

1. **Rima Riad Daraghmeh:** She is 20 years old from Tubas. She was arrested on July 28, 2004. The prisoner suffered from a stomach ailment, which led to a decrease in her weight from 65 kg to 48 kg in less than two years. When she was presented to the prison doctor, he only measured her weight and returns her to her room without giving her any medication. It is worth mentioning that this disease caused dizziness and severe pain in the throat due to vomiting. In addition, the acids that came out of the stomach affected her teeth, as she already suffers from a dental problem. ⁽⁸⁰⁾
2. **Kifah Jibril (Qatash):** The occupation arrested her from her home in Ramallah, on August 1, 2010, while she was



ill. She was in constant need of a doctor as a result of her immunodeficiency, but the prison administration refused to bring a doctor for her, and her condition worsened. This prompted the detainees to threaten to go on a hunger strike. Only then did the prison administration send a doctor to her.

3. **Israa Al-Jaabis:** She is 32 years old from Jerusalem. She was arrested by the Israeli occupation forces on 10/10/2015 after a fire broke out in her car. As a result, she suffered burns on 50% of her body, lost 8 of her fingers, and suffered from deformities in her face as well as her back. She needs eight urgent surgeries on her eyes and face, separating her ears attached to her head, and treating severe injuries on her hands. She also suffers from continuous high temperatures, and her treatment requires years of physical and psychological rehabilitation. Because of the erosion of most of her fingers as a result of fire and injury, Israa is unable to eat or perform daily living requirements. ⁽⁸²⁾ Despite all the calls for the release of Israa, the occupation refuses to release her which further increases her suffering through medical negligence for her critical condition.

4. **Nisreen Abu Kamil (46):** From Gaza, she suffers from glandular cancer, hypertension, diabetes, high cholesterol in the blood and nerve pain in her hands as a result of torture. She also suffers from tumours in the chest that cause her



severe pain. The detainee also broke her hand when she fell in the cell and had a botched splinting operation. Days after the operation, they broke the bone again under the pretext of a mistake in orthopaedic surgery, in which the main nerve of her hand was damaged. ⁽⁸³⁾

5. **Marah Bakir (16):** Her suffering began on 12/10/2015 when the Israeli occupation soldiers shot her after she left her school in the Sheikh Jarrah neighbourhood in Jerusalem. Marah's mother says: "The Israeli soldier fired 14 bullets at Marah that penetrated her left hand, shattering her bones from the elbow to the shoulder and she was left bleeding for several hours without treatment. [The soldier] did not even have mercy upon her innocent childhood."

During her detention, she underwent an operation to take out bullets and another to implant platinum in her hand. Bakir suffers from medical negligence, procrastination in providing her treatment, and an operation to remove platinum from her hand, which increases her suffering and pain. Her mother asserts, "We contacted human rights doctors for urgent intervention pressure on the occupation to allow her to have an operation but so far nothing has happened!" ⁽⁸⁴⁾

6. **Iman Al-Awar (45):** The occupation forces arrested her on 17/06/2020 after they stormed her home in Silwan, Jerusalem. The occupation military court extended her detention in



a secret file. Iman suffers from bad health conditions, in addition to the need for surgery that the occupation prevents. She previously underwent many surgeries to remove tumours. Iman still suffers from liver disease and a broken pelvis.⁽⁸⁵⁾

Certainly, there is deliberate procrastination by the administration of Israeli prisons to conduct examinations and diagnose diseases, which leads to the deterioration of the health and psychological status of the female detainees. The medical negligence of female detainees is considered a flagrant violation of international humanitarian law, especially the Fourth Geneva Convention, Article 91 of which states: "Every place of internment shall have an adequate infirmary, under the direction of a qualified doctor, where internees may have the attention they require, as well as an appropriate diet..."⁽⁸⁶⁾

2. Suffering during transport via 'bošta':

Palestinian detainees suffer during their transfer to the court or the medical clinic, where they are tied and transported in poor and harsh conditions in the bošta (the transport vehicle between detention centres and the courts). The transport period lasts 3 days in the Bošta, and it is a journey of torture and severe suffering for the detained women. They are kept in closed and cold iron cages for long hours and possibly days, deprived of sleep, food or bathroom. Sometimes they are taken with criminal prisoners who



provoke them and insult them.

Most of the Palestinian female detainees had the bitter experience of being transported through the Bošta. The freed detainee **Kefah Jebril** described the ‘Bošta’ as a refrigerator in the winter and an oven in the summer, meaning that transporting her is a journey of torture. Throughout the round trip, the detainee remains are bound by hands and feet, which lasts for more than 20 hours. During this time, the occupation prevents the detainee from taking anything with her, even her own needs as a woman. ⁽⁸⁷⁾

The former Minister of Women's Affairs, Maryam Salih, who was arrested on 12/11/2007, summarized the suffering of the Bošta: “Transportation by the Bošta is bad, humiliating and very tiring, especially since the detainee is bound by hands and feet for a long period of up to 12 hours.” She also confirmed that the soldiers deliberately left a dog in the Bošta with her, only a net separating them, which caused her severe psychological pressure. ⁽⁸⁸⁾

Minors also did not escape persecution during the transfer via the Bošta, including the captured child Malak Al-Ghaliz,14, who was arrested on 20/5/2017. She said: "In the Bošta, we sometimes are transported with Jewish criminal prisoners who provoke us and abuse us verbally. The last time I was taken to the Bošta with criminal prisoners when the bošta stopped in Ramla, they shook the bošta, my body shook and my head hit its iron walls, which caused me great pain."



Thus, it seems very clear the severe suffering that women face during arrest, and during transportation from one prison to another, or from prison to court, by an iron vehicle that is not suitable for transporting people, and military dogs may accompany them on the trip, in addition to the long period that the detainee spends on an iron chair in the *bosta*, which causes her severe physical and psychological pain. ⁽⁸⁹⁾

3. Denial of visitation rights:

In most cases, the Israeli occupation authorities have deprived Palestinian detainees of their right to visit their families, lawyers, or Red Cross representatives, which added to their pain and suffering. Since 1996, the occupation authorities have restricted those allowed to visit only first-degree relatives. Only one or two members of the family are allowed each visit, and if either of them is unable to visit, then it is not permitted to change that person, and thus the detainee loses the right to a visit. ⁽⁹⁰⁾

a. Denial of family visits:

Female detainees complained about the procedures imposed on them by the occupation during their relatives' visits, where they are forbidden from even shaking hands with their families. The meeting takes place behind a glass wall, and the conversation is over the phone. The visit is often carried out according to the mood of the detention administration, which



can abruptly cancel it, or prevent the detainees from visiting as punishment. Some detainees were denied visits for long periods. Besides, all detainees from the Gaza Strip are usually completely banned from visiting, based on the decision of the Israeli Supreme Court, which increases the suffering of the detainees in Israeli prisons. Female detainees who were denied family visits are:

- **Qahirah Al-Saadi:** She was deprived of her right to family visits for two years after her arrest. Her eldest daughter's visitation permit was repeatedly denied under the pretext of "security reasons". When the children of al-Saadi were able to visit her, they did not stay for more than half an hour, although it took them about ten hours to and from the prison. This is due to delays caused by physical and frequent baggage checks. During the visit, the children were separated from their mother by a pane of glass and had to speak to her on the phone. ⁽⁹¹⁾
- **Amal Fayez Juma'a:** She was arrested from her home in Nablus on 9/5/2004 and was sentenced to 11 years in prison. The Israeli occupation authorities prevented her family from visiting her, and then they were only allowed to visit their daughter Amal once a year. ⁽⁹²⁾
- **Nisreen Abu Kamil:** She is a mother of seven, and the Israeli occupation authorities prevented her from the visits of her husband and children in the Gaza Strip. In addition, Israel



prevented her brothers in Haifa from visiting her since her arrest on October 18, 2015.⁽⁹³⁾

- **Elia Abu Hijleh:** The Israeli occupation prevented her from her family visits, and only her mother was allowed to visit her. Her mother asserts that she has only been able to visit her daughter twice since her arrest: the first in August and the second in November 2020,⁽⁹⁴⁾ that is, once every three months.

Deprivation of family visits is a double punishment, as it negatively affects the psyche of the detainee and her family. As they are deprived of their right to meet their daughters in detention centres, they suffer from the bitterness of distance and deprivation. The ban on visitations is a serious violation of Article (116) Chapter VIII of the Fourth Geneva Convention, which states: “Every internee shall be allowed to receive visitors, especially near relatives, at regular intervals and as frequently as possible.”

B. Banning arrested brothers and spouses from visits:

The Israeli occupation authorities separate the families in the detention centers. Israel prevents the female detainee from ever meeting her detained father or brother or husband. The detainees have repeatedly demanded to visit their detained husbands in other detention centers. However, the detention administration refused their request and did not allow them to make internal visits. They include:



Ahlam Al-Tamimi: She applied several petitions in 2009 to meet her husband, Nizar Al-Tamimi, who had been sentenced to life and 16 years. However, the detention administration refused her request under the pretext of security reasons. ⁽⁹⁵⁾ She is from the village of Nabi Saleh in Ramallah and holds Jordanian citizenship. She was arrested on September 14, 2001, and sentenced to 16 life sentences. She was released in the Wafa Al-Ahrar exchange deal in 2011 and was deported to Jordan. ⁽⁹⁶⁾

Irina Sarahneh: She was arrested on May 23, 2002, and sentenced to 20 years in prison. She submitted several requests to be allowed to visit her husband, Ibrahim Sarrahna, who is detained in the Hadrim prison, adjacent to the prison where the captive is located, but all requests were rejected. ⁽⁹⁷⁾

Fedaa Al-Shaibani: She was arrested by the occupation from her home in Arraba, Jenin, on May 11, 2014. The Israeli occupation prevented her from visiting her detained husband, Ahmed Al-Shaibani, and also prevented her from seeing her family, especially her two children, Hassan, 15, and Mustafa, 14, whose parents died. ⁽⁹⁸⁾

Amina Odeh Mahmoud: She was arrested from her home in occupied Jerusalem on November 4, 2017. The occupation denied her visit to her only son, Muhammad Ahmad Halasa, who was detained in Raymond when he was only 17 years old



in 2016, he was sentenced to prison at the age of 18. ⁽⁹⁹⁾

The occupation authorities' prohibition of the meetings between detainees of the same family constitutes a violation of Article 82 of the Fourth Geneva Convention, which states: "Throughout the duration of their internment, members of the same family, and in particular parents and children, shall be lodged together in the same place of internment." The same article adds in the third paragraph: "Wherever possible, interned members of the same family shall be housed in the same premises and given separate accommodation from other internees, together with facilities for leading a proper family life."

C. Banning visits by lawyers and representatives of the Red Cross:

The Israeli occupation authorities never allow the lawyers to visit their clients until the end of the investigation. Moreover, the visit takes place every several months in a room in the presence of the jailers or the officers. At other times, the detention administration prevents lawyers from visiting the detainee at different periods, and they can go to the court to confirm the banning decision. ⁽¹⁰⁰⁾ Regarding the Red Cross visit, it does not take place until the end of the investigation, to allow for any signs of torture on the detainee's body to disappear. Therefore, the visit takes place a month or two after the end of the investigation, and the detainees are not allowed to



talk about their miserable conditions. If that happens, they are punished with isolation or solitary confinement. ⁽¹⁰¹⁾ Examples:

Samah Jaradat: Since her arrest, the occupation prevented her from meeting her lawyer; the ban continued for nearly 20 days. As the occupation issued seven orders prohibiting her from meeting a lawyer, renewed as soon as the end of the previous order. Addameer lawyers filed two appeals against the extension of Samah's detention from her arrest until the end of the investigation. However, these two appeals were rejected under the pretext of supplementing the investigation.

⁽¹⁰²⁾

As illustrated above, the occupation authorities prevent female detainees from receiving visits by lawyers or representatives of the Red Cross deliberately. This happens to further persecute and harm them so that their suffering is not exposed to the outside world. Definitely, that is a crime and the Israeli occupation authorities must be held for committing it.

4. The suffering of pregnant detainees in Israeli prisons:

Pregnant detainees suffer twice as a result of their special situation and the ongoing violations of their rights by the occupation authorities. The occupation imposed severe restrictions on women in labour, as pregnant women were taken to the hospital handcuffed, chained, and surrounded by several female soldiers. Besides, the occupation keeps her



handcuffed even during delivery. Sometimes the chains and handcuffs are removed a few minutes before birth without allowing any family members to be present. ⁽¹⁰³⁾

The suffering of the pregnant detainee continues after birth, as she is restrained again in her bed. Her newborn is also treated as a captive, not as a baby who needs special care. These children are detained with their mothers in miserable conditions of detention and denied any childhood rights. In addition, they are exposed to imprisonment which their mothers have inside their cells, in addition to the spread of insects, the scarcity of hot water and the lack of ventilation, which exposes children to diseases due to the absence of health care. ⁽¹⁰⁴⁾

Violations of the occupation against pregnant detainees are contrary to international law, which provides that they shall have a special status because of the health conditions and medical care they need, in particular article 76 of the Protocol Additional to the Fourth Geneva Convention of 1977. ⁽¹⁰⁵⁾

Many female detainees gave birth in the occupation detentions. The researcher was able to document the names of nine female detainees who were pregnant during detention and gave birth in Israeli detention centres. The first case was **Zakia Shamout**, from the Palestinian city of Nazareth. The Israeli occupation arrested her while she was six months pregnant, and she gave birth to her daughter Nadia in prison in February 1972. ⁽¹⁰⁶⁾



During the period (2000-2010) four female detainees gave birth in Israeli detention centers. They are:

1. Mervat Taha: She was arrested by the occupation from her home in Al-Issawiya, Jerusalem, in May 2002. She gave birth to her baby Wael inside the Ramleh Prison on February 8, 2003. As a result, Wael was exposed to difficult health conditions in the detention center. ⁽¹⁰⁷⁾

2. Manal Ghanem: She was arrested by the Israeli occupation on 17 April 2003 and was sentenced to 50 months. She gave birth to her son Noor in September 2003. The child was behind bars with his mother for two years. During that time, he suffered from a lack of milk, baby clothing, and health care. ⁽¹⁰⁸⁾

3. Samar Sobeih: She was tied when she gave birth to her child (Baraa) on April 30, 2006. Samar underwent a Caesarean section without her husband or any of her relatives present. The lawyer for the Mandela Foundation, Buthaina Bushnaq, who witnessed the birth, confirmed that the occupation did not remove Samar's chains until the time of the operation and then re-chained her immediately after the birth. ⁽¹⁰⁹⁾

4. Fatima Al-Zaq: She was arrested in May 2007 when she was pregnant. She reported that the female soldiers tried to abort her fetus. The occupation also placed her in a cell littered with dirt and sewage on the floor, for a period of 21 days of



interrogation and torture. On January 17, 2008, Fatima gave birth to her son Yusef while tied up, without her husband or mother being allowed to attend the birth. Immediately after her birth, she was tied and remained restricted for three her chains were only loosened at the time of breastfeeding until she left the hospital to prison. ⁽¹¹⁰⁾

Thus, Zionists' crime against Palestinian women is indisputable. They arrest her while she is pregnant and practice all kinds of physical and psychological torture against her. At birth, they tie her up when she is in a precarious unenviable situation. The only thing she thinks of is giving birth peacefully. The kid grows up in the prison to know only his/her mother as well as the detainees around. Israel's policy is to release the kid after two years and send him/her to the mother's family. The Zionist jailers snatch the child from his/her mother's lap to heap yet more misery on the mother.

5-The Suffering of Mothers in Detention:

The occupation detention centres are full of detained mothers who were arrested and deprived of their children. Until the date of publishing this study, mothers are still in Israeli occupation prisons. Many female detainees left behind infants whose ages did not exceed several months at the time of the arrest. Some of the imprisoned mothers who were deprived of their children are:



- **Itaf Elyan:** Israel arrested her, on December 22, 2005, from her home in 2004, leaving behind an only child, who was less than one year old. She went on a hunger strike in an attempt to allow her to have custody of her child. Finally, after 18 days of the strike, she managed to extract a decision for the kin to join her. ⁽¹¹¹⁾

- **Sima Anbas:** She was arrested by the Israeli occupation forces from Tulkarm camp on February 12, 2004, after they snatched her infant son from her lap, while she was screaming with grief and sorrow due to the severity of her fear for him. Then the occupation took her to Telmond prison and sentenced her to two and a half years. It was a big shock to her when she got out of prison and her son did not recognise her and was afraid of her and did not adapt to her until after seven months. ⁽¹¹²⁾

- **Intissar Al-Sayyad:** Israel arrested her from her home in Jerusalem on November 22, 2012, separating her from her four children. Her children suffered greatly Their first visit was three months after her arrest. The meeting took place through the separating glass, and Intissar was prevented from hugging her children. ⁽¹¹³⁾

- **Fadwa Hamadeh:** Israel arrested her from Jerusalem on 12/08/2017. The Israeli court issued a 10-year prison sentence against her, in addition to a hefty fine of 30,000 shekels, after



her trial was postponed more than 14 times. The occupation isolated the detainee and prevented her from seeing her five children for a long time. ⁽¹¹⁴⁾

Studies have shown that preventing family members from visiting their incarcerated relatives affects their psychological and physical health, which leads them to worry and depression and exacerbates the feeling of loneliness among the female detainee, her children, and her family members. Although these days visits are allowed twice a month theoretically, the policies imposed by the occupation authorities often deprive hundreds of detainees' families of their right to visit.

6-The detainees' suffering from administrative detention:

The Palestinian woman was subjected to administrative detention, ⁽¹¹⁵⁾ which is based in its preliminary form on an order issued by the Israeli military District Commander according to evidence and confidential data that neither the lawyer nor the detainee himself or herself had seen. This makes the detainee unable to face up to allegations s/he does not know and therefore has no way of refuting or disproving them and does not know when s/he will be released. Palestinian detainees are administratively detained for long periods of time, although the detention period is a maximum of 6 months. But it can be extended and renewed indefinitely, and it can be for long years.

Administrative detention cases are increasing during popular



uprisings as the occupation authorities use this policy to suppress and intimidate Palestinians. Currently, 430 Palestinian detainees are being held in the occupation prisons under administrative detention orders without charge or trial for an indefinite period of time, including 3 female administrative detainees: Shorouk al-Badan, Bushra al-Tawil, and Khetam al-Sa'afin. Some of the Palestinian female detainees who suffered from administrative detention include:

Etaf Alyan: She was arrested more than once under administrative detention. The first time was in 1998. She went on hunger strike for 45 days to reject administrative detention and stopped her strike after Israel agreed to release her when she ends her sentence. On December 22, 2005, the occupation soldiers kidnapped Etaf from her home in Ramallah to Hasharon Prison (Telmond) and sentenced her administratively for 6 months. A day before her release date, she received an order to extend her administrative detention for another 4 months, and the administrative detention continued to be renewed until she was freed on October 23, 2008. ⁽¹¹⁶⁾

Hanaa Shalabi: Israel arrested Hanaa for the first time on March 14, 2009. She spent 35 months in administrative detention until she was released as part of the exchange deal on October 18, 2011. Then the occupation re-arrested her on February 16, 2012. Soon after, Hanaa Shalaby announced her open hunger strike to reject administrative detention. ⁽¹¹⁷⁾



Kifah Jibril Qatash: The occupation authorities arrested her from her home in the city of Al-Bireh on August 1, 2010, and extended her administrative detention three times in a row for four months each time. The occupation had deliberately extended her detention just one day before her release date. It is reported that Kifah suffers from a rare and terminal illness that prevents blood from reaching the limbs and fingers, in addition to pressure and many other diseases. Despite that, Israel deliberately kept her in detention without any charge.

Khaleda Jarrar: The occupation arrested her on 02/07/2017, and the military court issued an administrative detention order against her for six months. Then the administrative detention order was extended three times in a row until she spent 20 months in administrative detention. Eight months after her release, the occupation arrested her again under administrative detention. (119)

Bushra al-Tawil: On 01/11/2017, the Israeli military commander issued an administrative detention order against Bushra for a period of four months. Before the expiration of the period, it was renewed for another four months. The occupation authorities released her after spending 8 months in administrative detention. Then the occupation forces re-arrested her on December 11, 2019, and she spent another 8 months in arbitrary administrative detention to be released on 28/07/2020. Then



the occupation forces re-arrested Bushra on 09/11/2020, less than five months after her release and sentenced her to four months in administrative detention. ⁽¹²⁰⁾

Administrative detention in the manner practiced by the Israeli occupiers violates international standards for a fair trial. It is considered a war crime as Article 8 (2) of point 6 of the Rome Statute describes war crimes as "Wilfully depriving a prisoner of war or other protected persons of the rights of fair and regular trial in a fair and orderly trial."

Fifthly, arresting Palestinian women as a means of pressure:

The Israeli occupation exploits the Palestinian system of customs and traditions, so it arrests the detainees' families, subjects them to interrogation, and tortures them in front of their family members to put pressure on the detainees and push them to disclose any information they have. Examples of arresting women for pressure include:

Asma Muhammad Abu Al-Hija: The Israeli occupation forces arrested her on 14/11/2003 and kept her in administrative detention for a period of nine months to put pressure on her detained husband, Sheikh Jamal Abu Al-Hijah, who was offered a deal by Israel to deport him to Jordan in exchange for the release of his wife. ⁽¹²¹⁾

The mother of the detainee Ghaith Nasr: The Israeli occupation arrested her and placed her into a cell and then presented her to her



son while she was handcuffed to pressure him to confess to charges he did not commit. When Ghaith saw his mother bound, he was ready to confess anything until they released mother. Ghaith said: "When I saw my mother being brought bound into the cell, I was ready to tell them anything to release her." ⁽¹²²⁾

Wedad Al-Barghouti: The occupation authorities arrested the lecturer at Birzeit University Widad Al-Barghouti on September 1, 2019, to put pressure on her detained son Qassam Al-Barghouti. ⁽¹²³⁾

The occupation intensified its targeting of prisoners' families in 2018, as 10 women with families of prisoners were arrested. They are **Nevin Salah**, the wife of prisoner Abdel Moneim Salah, **Mazouza Abu Joudeh**, mother of prisoner Khaled Abu Joudeh, **Noha Shawahna** from Qalqilya, mother of two captives Urwa and Sharhabil Taher Shawahna, **Safa Atatreh**, from Jenin, the wife of prisoner Majid Nizar, during her visit to the Negev prison, the mother of two captives Mohammed and Mahmoud Al-Badan, the mother of the prisoner Zayd Al-Badan, from Bethlehem, **Ibtisam Obaid**, from the Al-Isawiya neighbourhood in Jerusalem, the mother of child captive Nayef Waseem Obaid, **and Hanan Radaydah**, arrested during her visit to her brother prisoner Jamal Radaydah, from Bethlehem. Meanwhile, the occupation intelligence summoned prisoner Uday Sinokrot's wife and prisoner Omar Kiswani's mother for interrogation. ⁽¹²⁴⁾



Abusing detainees' families is a violation of international humanitarian law. It is also contrary to United Nations General Assembly Resolution No. (43-173) issued in 1988, which relates to the protection of all persons who are subjected to any form of detention or imprisonment, specifically Principle No. (21), "It shall be prohibited to take undue advantage of the situation of a detained or imprisoned person for the purpose of compelling him to confess, to incriminate himself otherwise or to testify against any other person."

Sixth, the impact of detention on Palestinian female detainees:

The customs and traditions that govern the Arab community have affected the society's view of the female detainee, as she is often viewed negatively. The perception differs from one person to another according to the degree of understanding and awareness, as many refused to marry female prisoners or to remain married to them. Some institutions also do not respect the detainee and refuse to provide her with a decent job opportunity.

Detainee Sona al-Ra'i stated that her husband divorced her and deprived her of her son after she was arrested.⁽¹²⁵⁾ Whereas, freed detainee Latifa Shteivi stated that her fiancé left her and refused to marry her after she was arrested for two years, and she remained single.⁽¹²⁶⁾ Thus, the detainees who were released from detention either remained single, were divorced, or are in an unhappy marriage.



Fatima Al-Halabi stated that the released detainees suffer from marginalization, whether from the institutions of the society or organizations to which the detainee was affiliated or even the Ministry of Prisoners. She stated that most of the old detainees are below the poverty line: many of them cannot afford the costs of health care and have not received proper care and attention, especially after the death of Yasser Arafat. ⁽¹²⁷⁾

Liberated detainee **Qahera Al-Saadi** says: “Society’s perception of the female detainee changed after the Al-Aqsa Intifada in 2000, as it believed in the role of women in the struggle. From the Ministry of Prisoners and ex-detainees, or even the organization to which the detainee belongs.” She also mentioned that after her release in 2011, she gained respect among people. However, the institutions do not care about the released detainees and do not provide them with the necessary support. ⁽¹²⁸⁾

Female detainees: challenges and resilience:

Despite the cruelty of society towards the detainees, their determination has not diminished and their self-confidence increases after the captivity. The mother of the detainee **Ansam Shawahna** stated that: "Ansam took advantage of her time inside the occupation prisons to develop herself with useful things such as teaching the Quran, supervising high school students, and taking many courses, especially in the field of journalism and media as she is trying to fulfil part of her dream to be a journalist after the



occupation deprived her of that." (129)

As for the mother of **Marah Bakeer**, she said that five years of bitter detention and injustice did not hinder Marah. Rather, she defied her pain and wounds, completed her education, and managed to obtain a high school diploma with a rate of 80%. (130)

On the other hand, **Ibtisam Musa**, from Khan Yunis, who was arrested by the occupation at the Beit Hanoun checkpoint (Erez) while accompanying her cancer patient sister, for treatment at Al Mutla' Hospital in Jerusalem, said: "The arrest made me stronger, more solid, and strong-willed. I took advantage of the detention period to memorize the Quran."

The result may be attributed to the positive factors that the detention experience has accumulated: steadfastness, group values, altruism, empathy, and political awareness.

Seventh, the strikes of female detainees in the occupation detention centres:

When we talk about female detention strikes in the Israeli occupation detention centers, this matter is divided into two parts:

First: There are individual hunger strikes that the female detainee goes on alone to gain freedom or achieve certain demands, such as the detainee **Itaf Elyan**, who went on many strikes, such as the 12-day strike in 2002 when she was subjected to an attempt



to remove her hijab during the investigation period. Likewise, the strike she waged in 2005, which lasted 18 days, to have her infant daughter in her custody. ⁽¹³¹⁾ Additionally, the open hunger strike that female detainee **Hana Shalabi** went on in 2012 happened in refusal of administrative detention and her exposure to torture and degrading treatment. ⁽¹³²⁾ The prisoner lawyer **Shireen Al-Issawi**, from Jerusalem, went on an open hunger strike to protest her isolation in Al-Jalama, and she ended her strike after ending the isolation. ⁽¹³³⁾

Second: the participation of female detainees in the collective strikes that the captive movement stages. The female detainees fought dozens of strikes in protest, including:

1. The strike of Palestinian female detainees at Neve Triaeste Detention Center on June 26, 2001, lasted for 8 consecutive days. This was in protest against their poor conditions and the detaining authorities' horribly harsh treatment of the detained women. ⁽¹³⁴⁾
2. A general strike in all detention centers took place on 15 August 2004, in which female detainees participated. They went on hunger strike for 10 days to improve the conditions of life in detention centres. The strike failed due to the lack of a unified leadership of the detainees. ⁽¹³⁵⁾
3. The strike of April 17, 2012: It was fought by all detainees to fulfil their demands: to allow visits to the prisoners of the



Gaza Strip, to abolish solitary confinement, and to refuse administrative detention. The strike continued until May 14, 2012, when the detainees' demands were met under Egyptian auspices. ⁽¹³⁶⁾

It is evident from the above that the Israeli occupation authorities tortured detainees physically and psychologically to break their spirit of defiance and patriotism. This has always prompted them to rise for themselves and declare a strike and disobedience inside the detention centres of the Israeli occupation.



Conclusion

The researcher concludes the study titled: ‘Palestinian Female Detainees in Israeli Occupation Prisons: (2000-2021)’ with the following points:

- » The Israeli occupation continues to arrest Palestinian women and violate their rights to the freedom guaranteed to them by all laws and international human rights charters.
- » Palestinian female detainee has always been held in unsanitary conditions in detention facilities that lack the basic necessities of human life.
- » Palestinian women are subjected to various forms of torture in Israeli prisons, such as beatings, suspension by the limbs (shabeh), and solitary confinement. Also, she suffers from medical neglect and violation of her privacy.
- » In many cases, the Israeli occupation deprived the Palestinian detainee of her right to receive visits from her family or lawyers. The Israeli occupation does not respect the special needs of pregnant detainees but practices torture against them. Normally, Palestinian detainees go on strikes inside Israeli jails demanding their liberation and improving their living conditions.



Recommendations

Therefore, after exposing such suffering that women detainees experience and still suffer from inside Israeli jails, it is necessary:

1. To exert Palestinian and international efforts to release Palestinian prisoners, especially those who are sick.
2. For the International Committee of the Red Cross to exert pressure on Israel to fulfil its legal obligations and to cease the degrading practices committed against Palestinian female detainees.
3. To demand the Palestinian Authority to work to prosecute the leaders of the Israeli Zionists who are responsible for the violations against female detainees and try them in the international courts.
4. To form international committees to monitor Israeli occupation prisons and follow up with the Palestinian detainees.
5. For women institutions to play their role in providing psychological and social support for the released detainees.
6. To benefit from the experience of the freed female detainees by giving them a position worthy of their sacrifices and providing them with the requirements of a decent life.

Nine years after the martyrdom of her brother and life companion, Sonia avenged his death by carrying out an operation at the Karama Crossing 'Allenby Bridge'. She shot at the 'Israeli' soldiers with a pistol she had tied around her leg and had smuggled from Jordan. After a short crossfire, she ran out of bullets and was detained. She was sentenced to 12 years during which she suffered from solitary confinement and the harshest forms of torture and was imprisoned with female 'Israeli' criminals. She was released after serving her entire sentence.

All these burdens pushed her to a settlement entrance to carry out a stabbing there. The female settler was only wounded and did not die.

Souad was immediately detained, severely beaten, and interrogated at the Kadomin Center for 17 days. She was sentenced to six years and a half. At the time of her release, she was accused of assaulting the warden. She proved the falsity of the accusations before the Supreme Court and was released after serving her sentence.

Iman was released in the Gilad Shalit prisoner swap deal in 2011 after serving 10 years in prison.

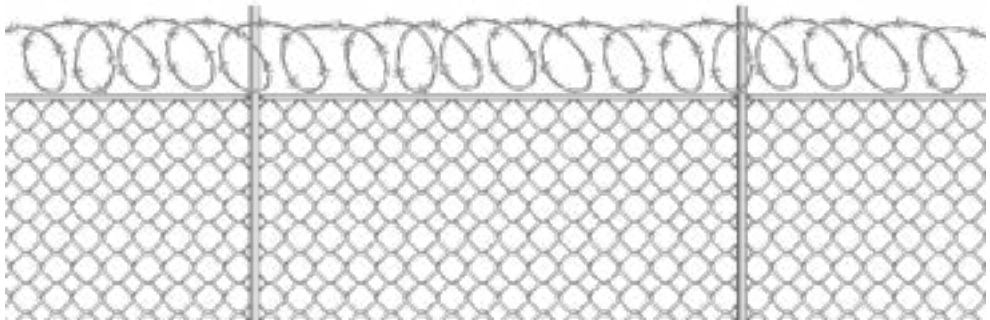

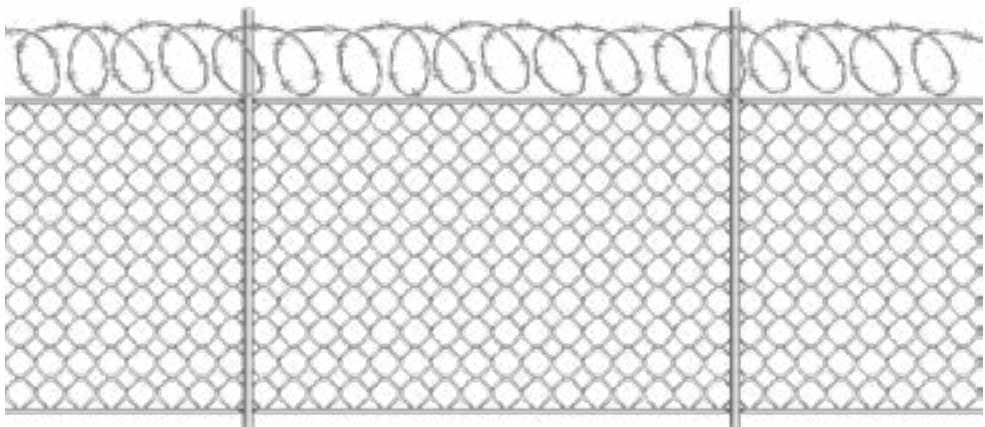

Ahlam Al-Tamimi was a media student at Birzeit University and the first female recruit in Ezzedeen AL-Qassam Brigades. Her mission was to select and locate martyrdom operations. She participated in the first attack on July 27, 2001, when she wandered around the western part of Jerusalem to gather intelligence. She transported Ezzedeen al-Masri to carry out a martyrdom operation at the 'Sbarro' restaurant in occupied Jerusalem on August 9, 2001. 15 'Israeli' occupiers were killed in the operation. The forces detained her on September 14 of the same year after breaking into her parents' house in Nabi Saleh village.

Like other detainees, she was subjected to harsh interrogation conditions, confined in solitary, and survived difficult times in the prisons. She was sentenced to 16 life imprisonments and additional six months for allegedly beating a policewoman working for the occupation. The occupation, however, released the lady and sent her to Jordan on October 18, 2011, as part of the

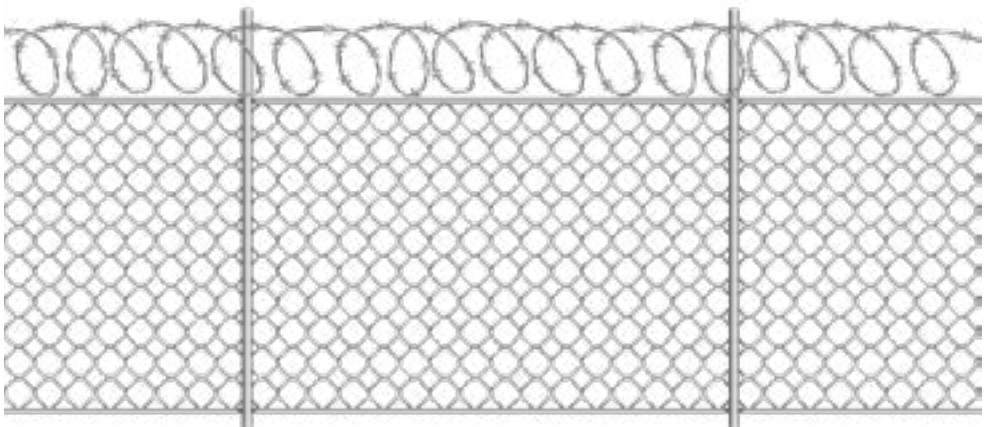


first batch of the Gilad Shalit prisoner swap deal.

On March 14, 2017, the US Department of Justice demanded the Jordanian government extradite the liberated detainee holding Jordanian citizenship. The FBI had classified her as a top wanted ‘terrorist’ involved in the bombing of the restaurant, where two Americans were killed, in the occupation’s entity.

In late March 2017, the Court of Cassation, the highest judiciary in Jordan, approved the decision issued by the Appellate Court of Amman that ruled against surrendering Ahlam Al-Tamimi to the US authorities.

On March 11, 2021, liberated detainee Ahlam Al-Tamimi’s lawyer declared that Interpol sent a warrant explaining that of that day Mrs. Ahlam Al-Tamimi would not be subject to notice because she had already been prosecuted before the occupation’s courts for the charges she had been accused of (i.e., supporting the resistance). By virtue of the principle of the Common Law, a person shall not be incriminated twice for the same charges. Ahlam is currently living in Jordan with her husband, the liberated detainee Nizar Al-Tamimi.

She was sentenced to 17 years and a couple of months, but after the appeal; her sentence was reduced to 15 years. The occupation refused to release her in the prisoner swap deal of “Wafa Al-Ahrar 1 and 2” which enraged the Palestinian public which had hoped to have all female detainees released. Jarbouni was called the ‘dean of female detainees’ because she had spent the longest time in detention and played a major role in organizing the Prisoners Movement inside the prisons and helping the female prisoners learn Hebrew, sewing and embroidery. She took it upon herself to defend her fellow detained women and fight for their rights. She was released after serving her time, the longest period a Palestinian female detainee spent in the occupation’s prisons.

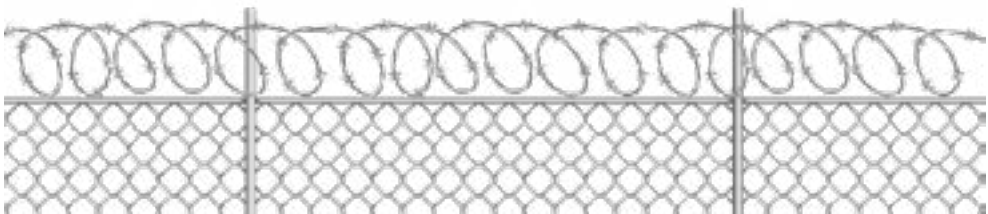

The major charge she was accused of was transporting martyr Muhammad Hashikah from Tauza village in Nablus to King George St. where he carried out a martyrdom operation killing three occupiers and wounding others on March 21, 2002.

Qahera is affiliated with the Palestinian Islamic Jihad Movement and was sentenced to three life sentences and 30 years. The occupation demolished her house and arrested her siblings and husband. She was released in the Gilad Shalit prisoner swap deal in 2011 after serving nine years in detention.

She was sentenced to three life imprisonments and an additional 32 years, the highest sentence ruled against any Palestinian female detainee. Doaa experienced difficult conditions in Israeli jails and was moved to different prisons, including Ramleh, Damon, and Hasharon (Telmond). She survived difficult circumstances in Damon prison and deteriorating health conditions. She suffered from severe anemia and permanent low blood pressure.

Doaa was released in the Gilad Shalit prisoner swap deal after serving ten years and was deported to the Gaza Strip where she got married. Doaa has got two children.

The occupation sentenced her husband to six life sentences.

The occupation's Supreme Court had sentenced Irina to three years followed by deportation to Russia on 26/10/2005. When the female detainee refused the banishment decision, the Court canceled the banishment decision and continued her arrest for a year when on 10/August/2006 the Court sentenced her to additional 20 years. The occupation's detention of Irina and her husband separated and scattered their family. Her daughter 'Yasmin' had to live with her maternal grandmother in Russia; Ghazala had to live with her paternal family in Bethlehem. Neither can speak the language of the other as one speaks Arabic and the other speaks Russian. Irina was released in the Gilad Shalit prisoner swap deal after spending nine years in prison.

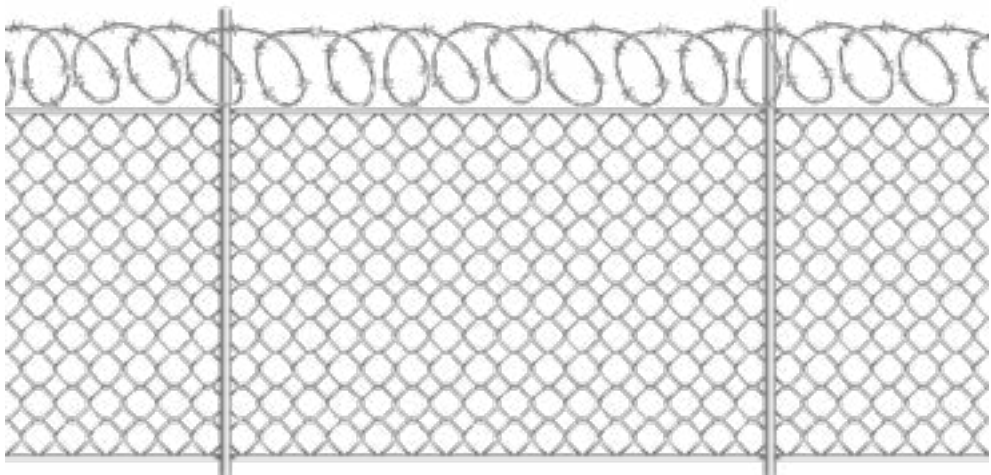

The real torture began the next day; the soldiers violently beat her legs with the butts of the rifles. The intelligence officer made her choose between rape or confession. She was released after serving her sentence.

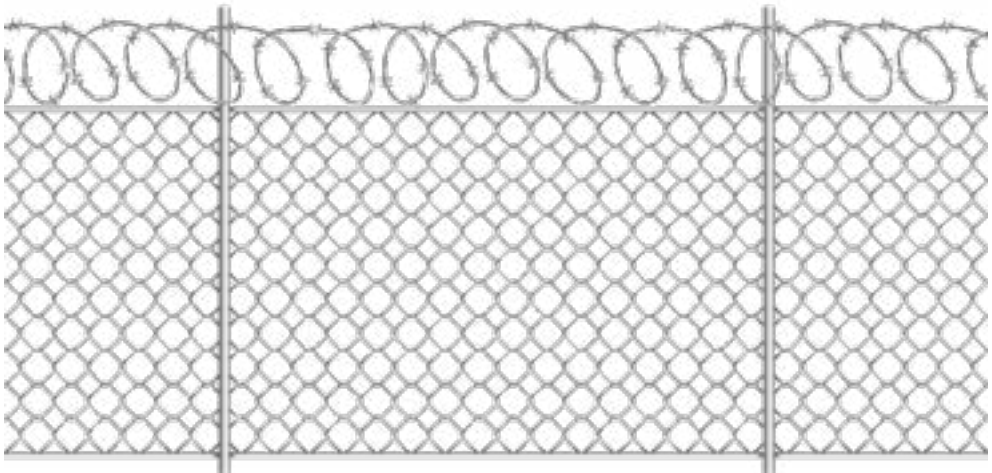

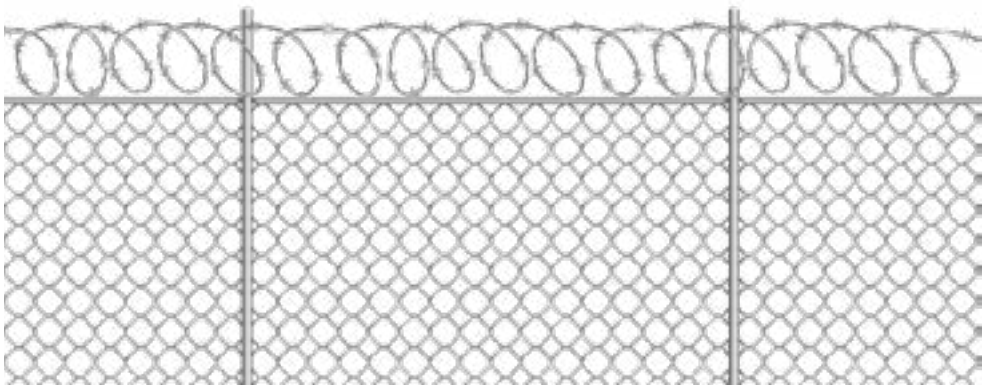

From the very first day of detention, Mervat suffered all forms of torture. At first, she was transferred to the Al-Moscobiyeh prison, then to the notorious Jalamah prison where she spent 12 days; and then she was transferred to Ramleh prison where a few days later she discovered she was pregnant. Despite her pregnancy, she was severely tortured until on the day of delivery she was transferred to a hospital handcuffed and gave birth to her son 'Wael'. Wael spent his first year of life in detention, where he neither enjoyed a quiet nor peaceful life leaving a negative impact on his behavior. He screamed a lot due to the limited space he was living in which restricted his movement and play. He would wander around the room all day. Before turning two years, it was decided to separate the mother from her child and release him alone. However, the decision was issued to release Mervat and her baby after she had served her sentence.

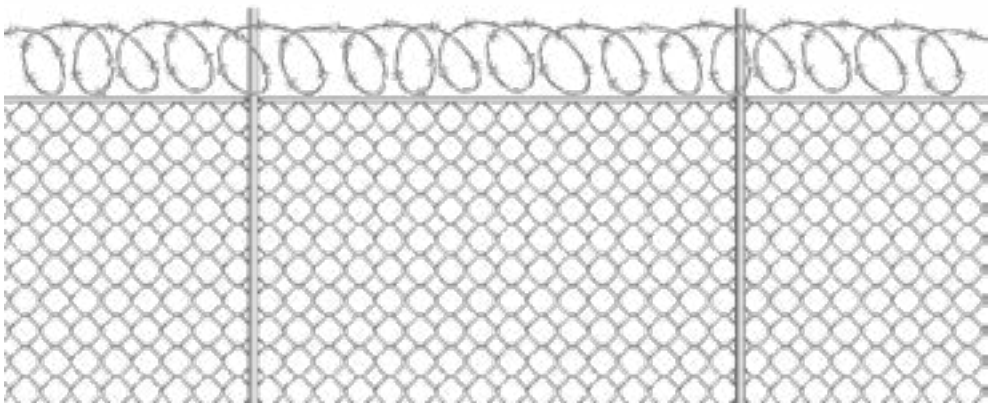

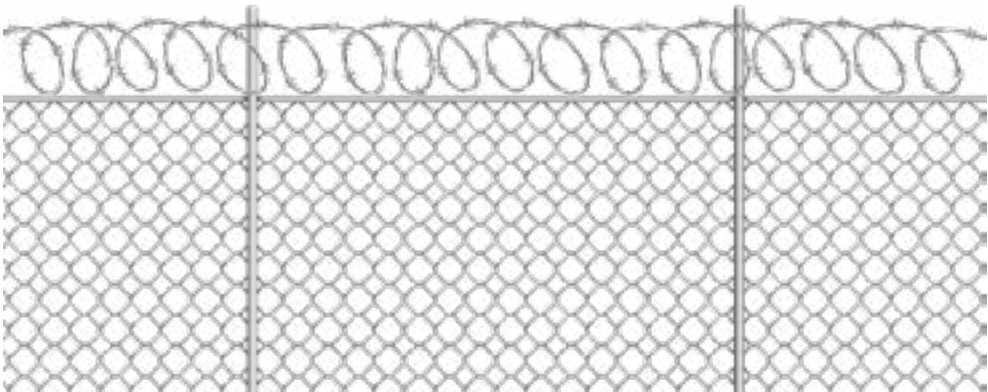

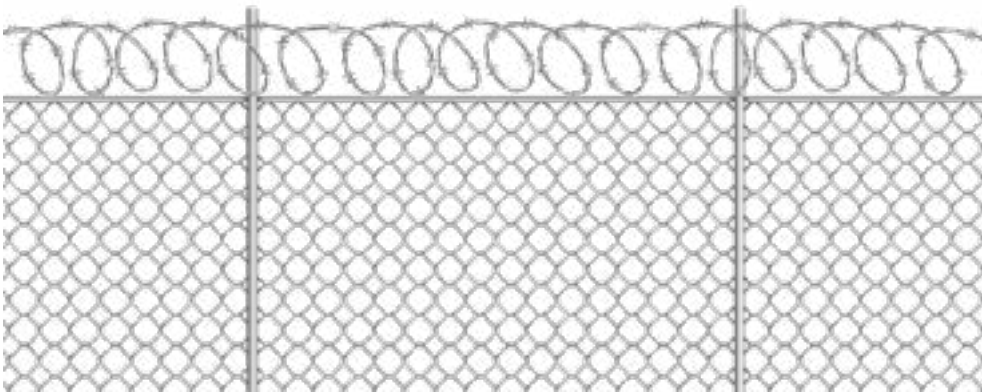

Umayyah was sentenced to four years in prison with a week of solitary confinement, prevention of family visits for two months and a 450-shekel fine. She was released after serving her sentence.

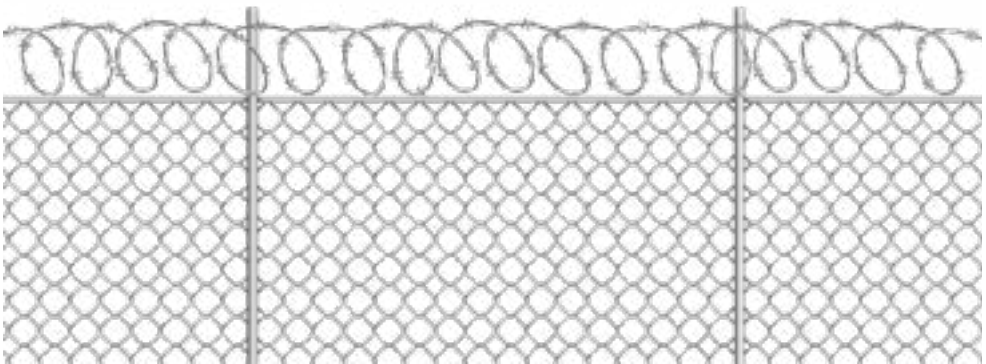

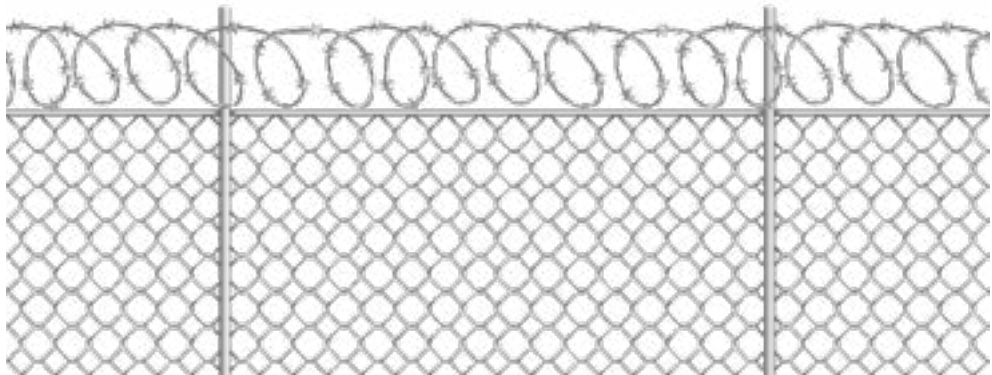

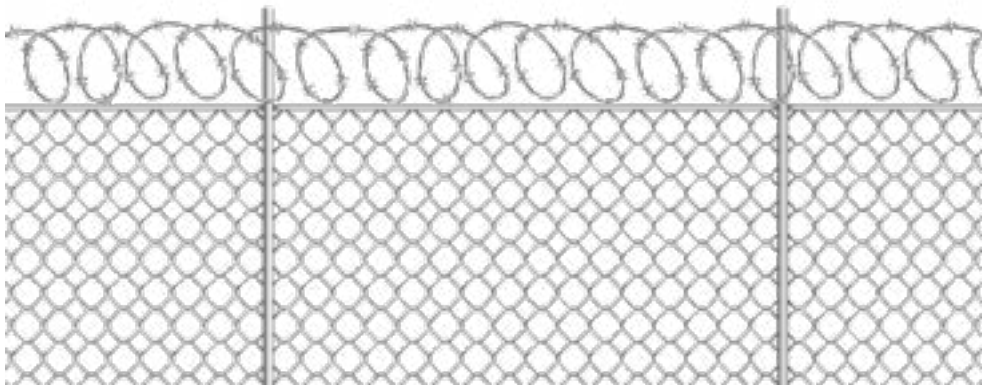

She had witnessed a female soldier attacking one of her fellow female detainees, so she responded to the soldier's attack, avenging her friend.

Latifa was released as part of the Gilad Shalit Prisoners Exchange deal in 2011 after spending eight years in prison. As a result of the medical neglect she was subjected to during her capture, Latifa suffered many diseases and died in 2018

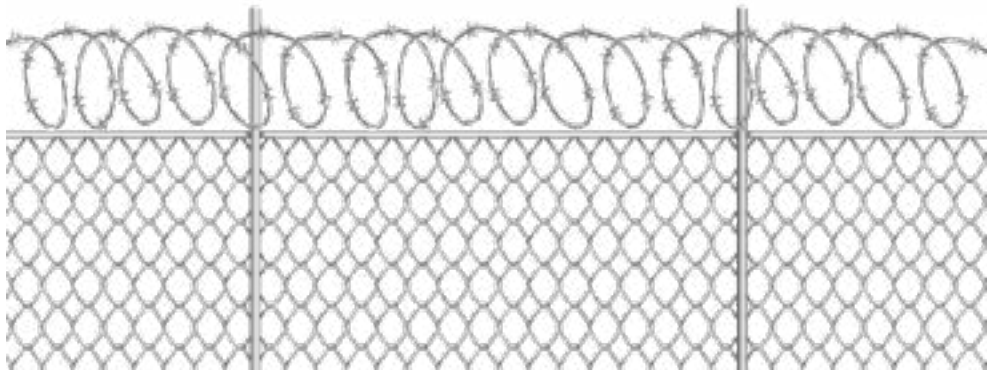

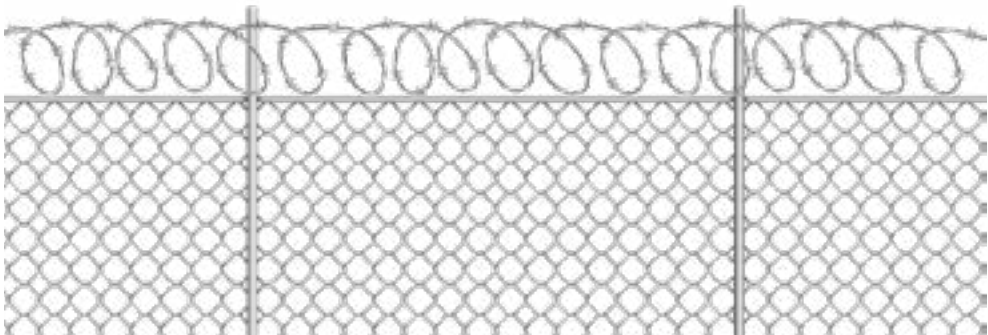

Fairouz was sentenced twice: the first time was two and a half years, and a couple of days before her release, the prison's administration filed a new case against her and ruled two additional years of imprisonment after which she was released.

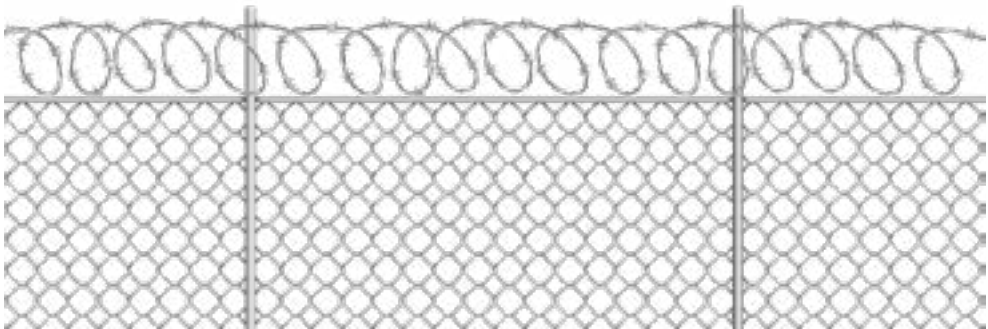

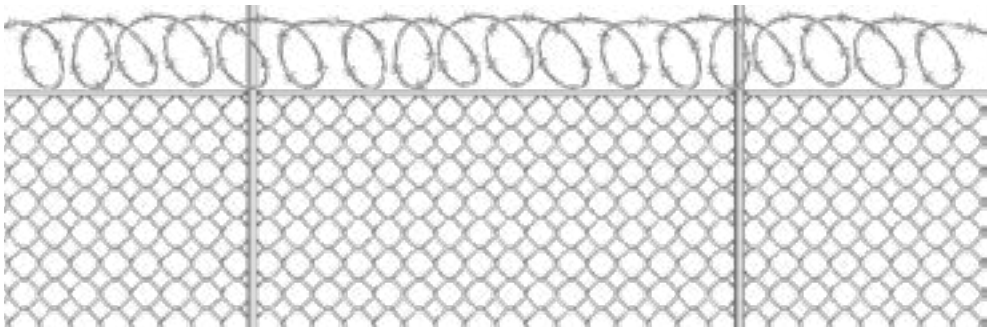

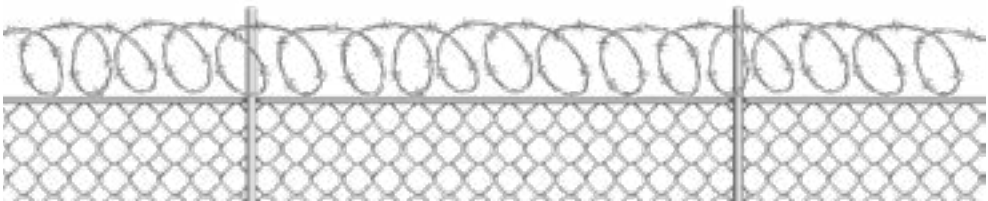

Whenever the detainees looked at these murals, they felt as though travelling to another world.

By drawing these murals, Areej said she aimed to bring joy to the detainees and make them feel the hope of a beautiful future, get out of the dark prison, and fly to their home country, its greenery and beauty. Areej was released after serving her sentence.

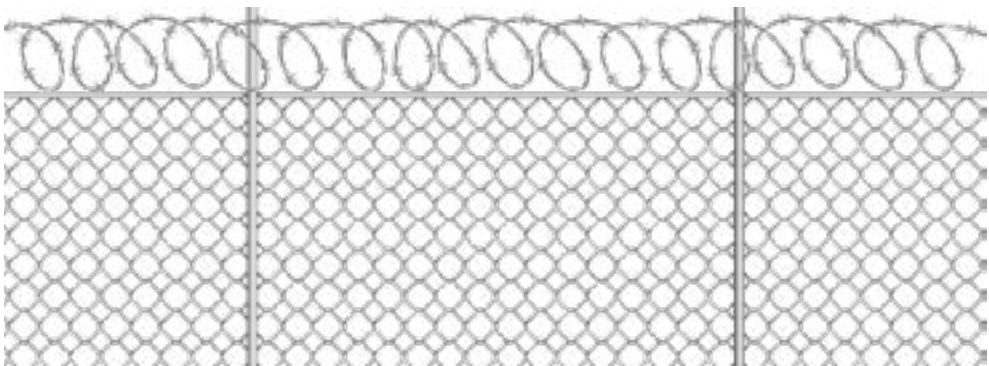

She was released as part of the Shalit footage deal along with 19 other detainees after serving six and a half years of her sentence.

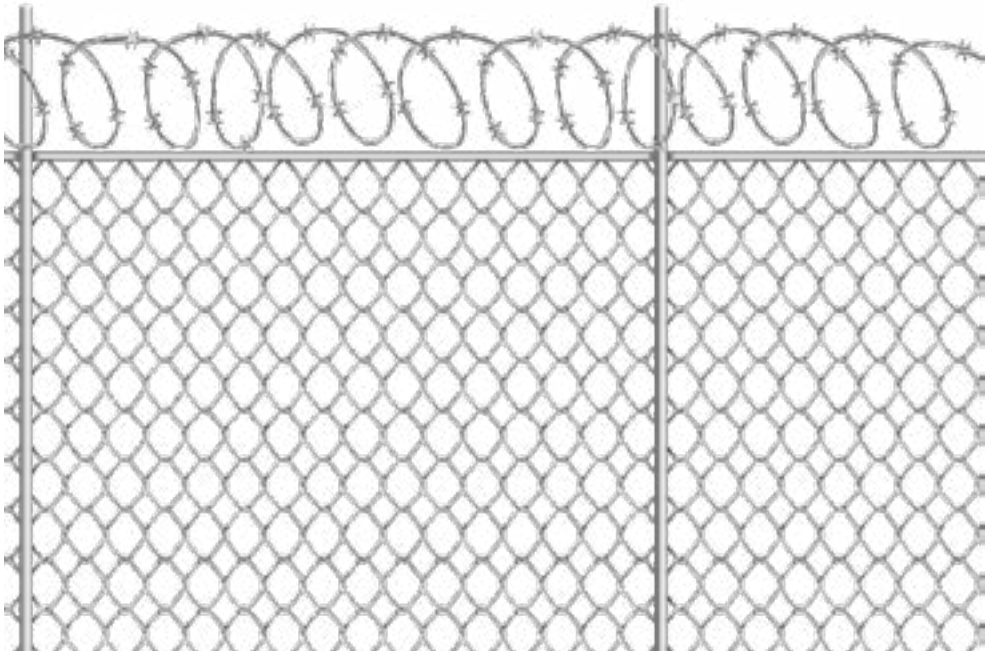
Abeer Ouda is a Palestinian woman who spent more than nine years in Israeli jails in three different detentions. She spent five years and a half in solitary confinement. During her imprisonment, she was subjected to all forms of torture. She is also a sister of three freed Palestinian detainees and a man with a disability murdered by Israeli occupation forces in the First Intifada in 1987. The Israeli occupation also placed her mother under house arrest and demolished her family home, moreover.

The first arrest occurred when Israeli occupation forces arrested Abeer at Innaba military checkpoint erected in eastern Tulkarem when she was on the way back to her home. Israeli occupation forces forced her to get off the car and pointed their guns towards her. They also searched her bag and arrested her for allegedly keeping a knife. The Israeli Prison Service release her two years later, but Israeli occupation forces arrested her after less than a year on 22/04/ 2006. An Israeli court then sentenced her to 28 months in detention and five years of imprisonment suspended, in addition to a financial penalty of 2000 shekels. Although Abeer's sentence expired on 10/07/2008, the Israeli occupation refused to release her and kept her in administrative detention for six months. She was released on late March 2009. But Abeer



got arrested for the third time five months later on 09/08/2008 for resisting the Israeli occupation and affiliation with a banned organization. She was finally released in the Gilad Shalit prisoner exchange deal in 2011 after serving two years in prison.

During her detention, the Israeli Prison Service has kept her in solitary confinement repeatedly. Moreover, the Israeli Special forces once broke into her cell at dawn, claiming that they were making urgent inspections. The Israeli forces had shackled Abeer and the other prisoner, Mariam Altarabean, to bed for twelve hours, depriving them of drinking water, eating food, or using the toilet. Two months after her release, Israeli occupation forces stopped her at the Container/Qidron checkpoint and forced her to get off the car. She was searched provocatively and detained for long hours. Later, the Israeli occupation forces released her. It is noteworthy that Abeer still suffers from many health issues due to her stay in prison.

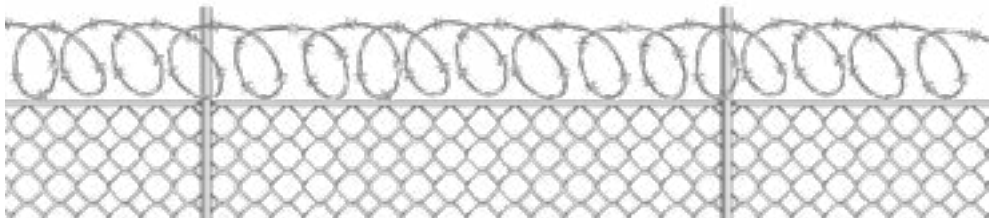

She was later transferred to the Hasharon (Telmond) Prison. Israeli occupation claimed that Maysoon planned to escape the prison and transferred her to another prison. But she went on a hunger strike in response. She continued to slim down until her weight reached 46 kilograms. After a medical examination in prison, it was found that Maysoon suffered from anemia, but she continued the hunger strike until the Israeli Prison Service agreed to return her to the Hasharon (Telmond) Prison. The Israeli occupation forces released her in 2007 as part of “Israel’s goodwill” gestures to the Palestinian Authority. This happened after she served three years and three months in prison.

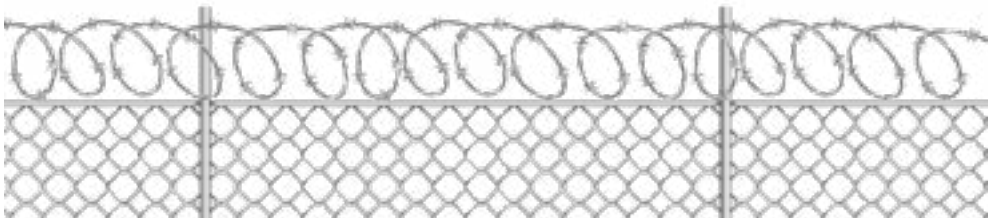

Amal suffered from very difficult health conditions. After a few years of stalling, the occupation allowed her to undergo surgery at Beni Zion Hospital in Haifa under very harsh conditions of constant shackling in bed and maltreatment by everyone around her, including the doctors and medical crews. Amal was released as part of the Shalit Prisoners Exchange Deal after spending seven years in prison.

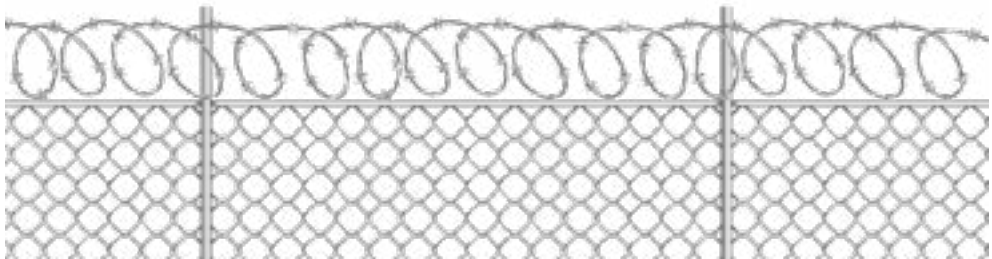

Claiming that Hasarma was going to carry out a martyrdom operation, the occupation subjected her to severe torture in prison. Despite the beating and torture that caused her back ailments (disc hernia) which prevented her from sleeping for days while being chained to the interrogation chairs, and being beaten on the head along with the exposure to psychological torture; she did not confess to the charges made against her. She was released after serving her sentence.

She was later transferred to the OR at the Arab Specialized Hospital in Nablus to remove a cancerous tumor in her neck that was the result of the methods of torture used against her inside the occupation prisons. Daraghmah was released after spending three and a half years in prison. The occupation released 255 Palestinian prisoners, including Faten and 6 females others, out of “good faith” to the PA in 2007.

After her release, she was treated and had her gallbladder removed. Ardah has three brothers serving high sentences at the occupation’s prisons. One of her brothers is Mahmoud Ardah, who is sentenced to life and responsible for the escape of six prisoners from Gilboa prison in 2021.

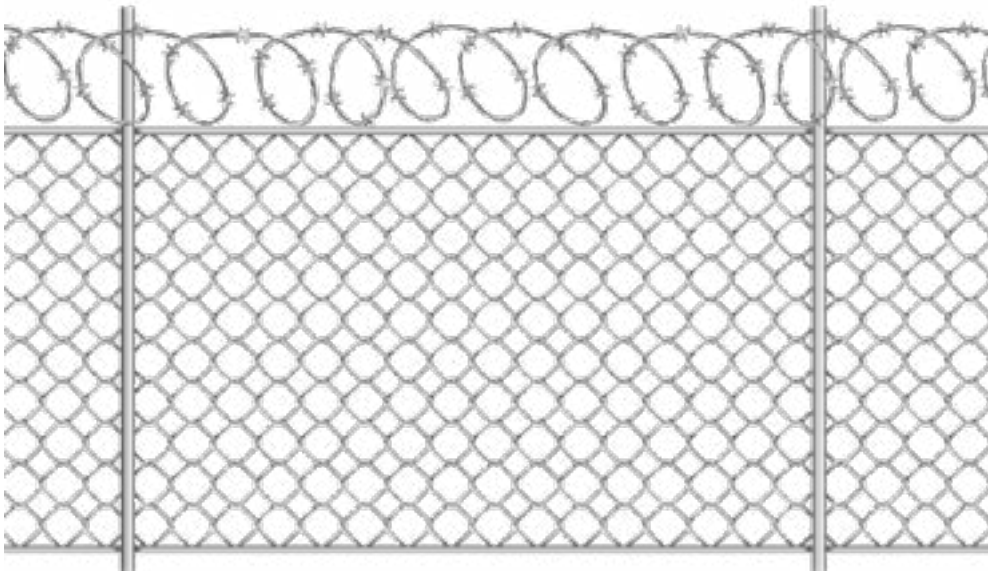

Al-Sa'di was a high school student when the Second Intifada erupted in 2000. She participated in student activities and protests against the Israeli occupation. She also witnessed the Israeli massacre perpetrated at the Jenin refugee camp, where she resides.

She decided to carry out a martyrdom operation to avenge the slaughtered families in the Jenin massacre. She went to the Palestinian Islamic Jihad Movement and received extensive training for the operation, but on June 16, 2004, the news covered the arrest of a cell affiliated with the PIJM in Jenin which was responsible for the operation, so Al-Sa'di realized that her project collapsed and that what she had planned for turned into a mirage. A month later, a military force surrounded her house, and she and her brother Ihab were arrested. She was taken to Salem camp and was immediately interrogated while being tied to a chair, with her hands tied behind her back. They puffed cold air on her through an air conditioner until her teeth chattered, and she bled from her face and hands; then she lost consciousness only to wake up in the hospital surrounded by dozens of soldiers.



After violent rounds of interrogation and psychological torture, Al-Sa'di was referred to the court. After several hearings, a sentence of seven years was issued. However, due to her young age and an appeal hearing, the sentence was reduced to a year and a half. Later she was transferred to Hasharon (Telmond) prison. She was released after serving her sentence.

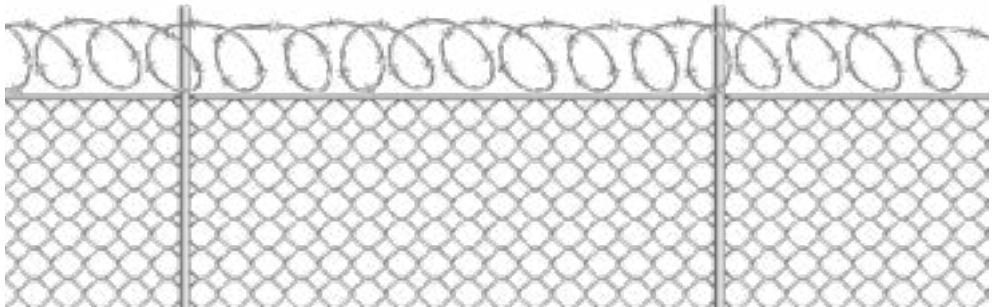

Then the court sentenced her to 15 months in prison in addition to 5 years suspended, a fine of 3000 shekels, and two years of house arrest after her release. She was released after serving her sentence.

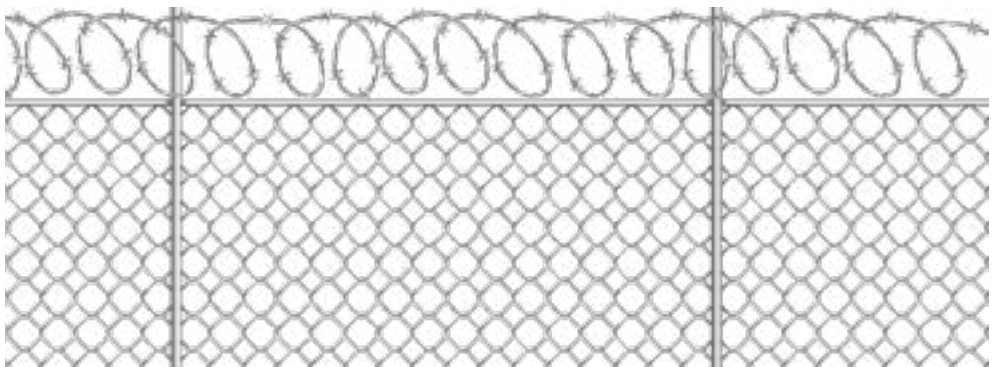

The detainee said, "When I arrived at Hawara detention center, one of the soldiers kicked me with his leg and blood poured from my mouth, and another soldier threatened to rape me. The cell in which I was held seemed deserted and the mattress was wet and dirty. There was no water. When I asked for water, one of the soldiers urinated in a bottle and brought it to me to drink; the food was bad with flies on it. There were no fruits or vegetables and the quantity was insufficient. The ventilation was poor, the windows were broken, and there was no break or rest. The toilets were far from the detention cell." She was sentenced to 45 months and was released after serving her sentence.

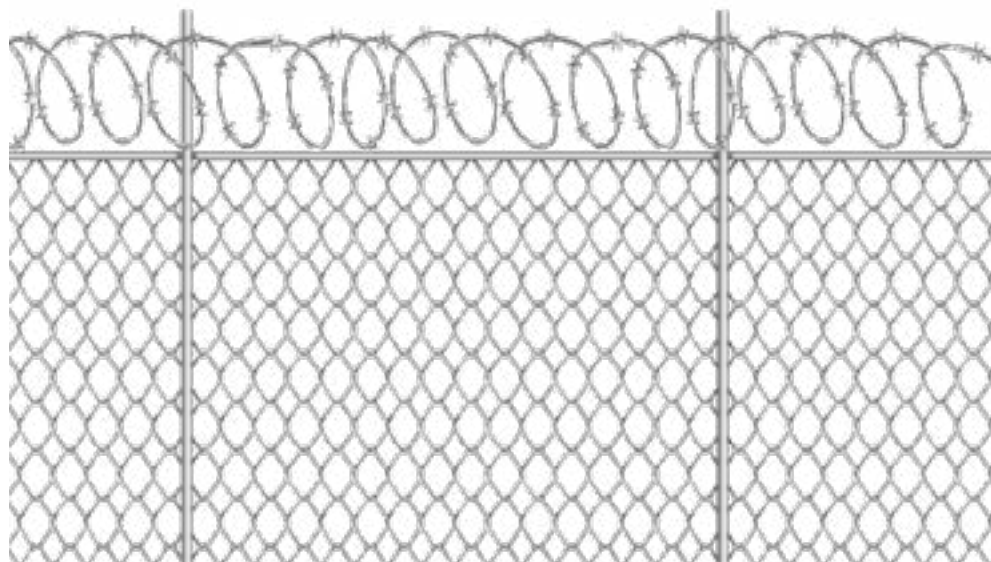
The occupation forces arrested detainee Samar Sbeih from the Gaza Strip at night in a brutal way. Samar is married to her relative in Tulkarm. She was taken blindfolded and handcuffed to the Al-Moscobiyeah interrogation center in Jerusalem. She was arrested while pregnant in her first trimester. She spent two months of interrogation in a solitary cell far from air and sun, and the health and nutritional care any pregnant woman needs.

After she was charged with "managing student activities", which the detainee had denied, she was transferred to prison. Before giving birth to her first child, she submitted a request to the prison administration to give her the opportunity to deliver her baby under healthy conditions as stipulated in the Fourth Geneva Convention, which states that prisoners must be respected, but her request was rejected.

Sbeih went through very harsh delivery conditions as she was alone without any family members by her side. She delivered "Baraa" in surgery while handcuffed and her legs restrained; she was observed by tight security despite her fragile state and inability to move.



The prison administration also treated the child “Baraa” as any female detainee or prisoner serving a prison sentence, without any special humane exceptional treatment, and he was prohibited from “exposure to the air and the sun and the possession of toys”. She was banished to Gaza after serving her sentence.

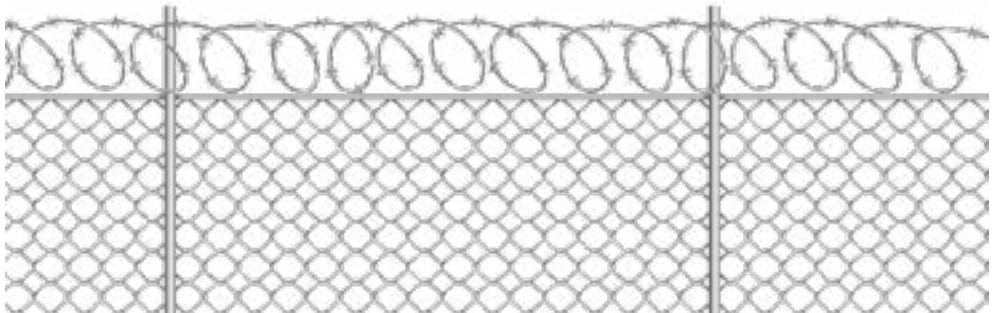

Suffering long harsh hours of interrogation that drain detainees' physical and psychological ability to be patient until they reach a stage of wanting to survive this suffocating place and go to the nearest prison to meet with other prisoners".

After several court hearings, she was sentenced to 18 months in prison, which she spent in Division 12 of Telmond Prison on the pretext of belonging to the PIJM and its student union and for her work in the "Mushkat Al-Aseer" in Tulkarm. She was released after serving her sentence.

She was also exposed to the risk of being detained along with criminal prisoners. As a result of the harsh isolation conditions, the prisoner started suffering from a mental illness, and the prison administration refused to release her from isolation and deliberately extended the isolation every 6 months. She was released in the Shalit prisoner exchange deal in 2011 after spending 6 years of her sentence in prison.

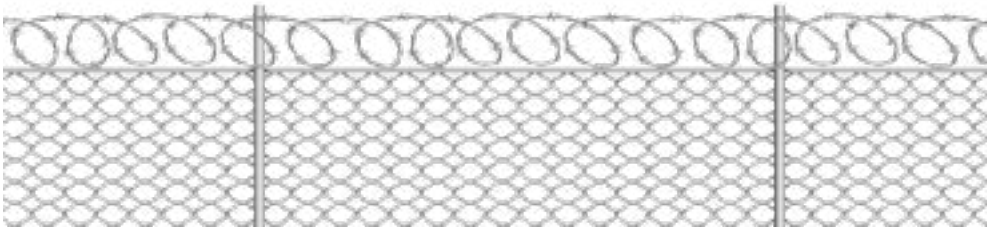

Also, she lived in the darkness of solitary confinement and experienced the bitterness of isolation as the detainee was taken out to the solitary confinement division of Telmond on 01/08/2010. She was released as part of the Shalit prisoner exchange deal in 2011 after spending nearly 7 years in prison.

Five Israeli officers interrogated her in rotation. The daily interrogation extended from the early morning until late at night. She was subjected to both physical and psychological torture. The Israeli interrogators kept telling her that she had to admit confessions made by other female detainees. At the end of the interrogation period, she was forced to sign a paper in Hebrew, although she could not read or write Hebrew. After a long period of abusive interrogation, Niveen was transferred to the Hasharon Prison. She was finally released in the Shalit footage deal in 2009 after serving forty months in Israeli jails.

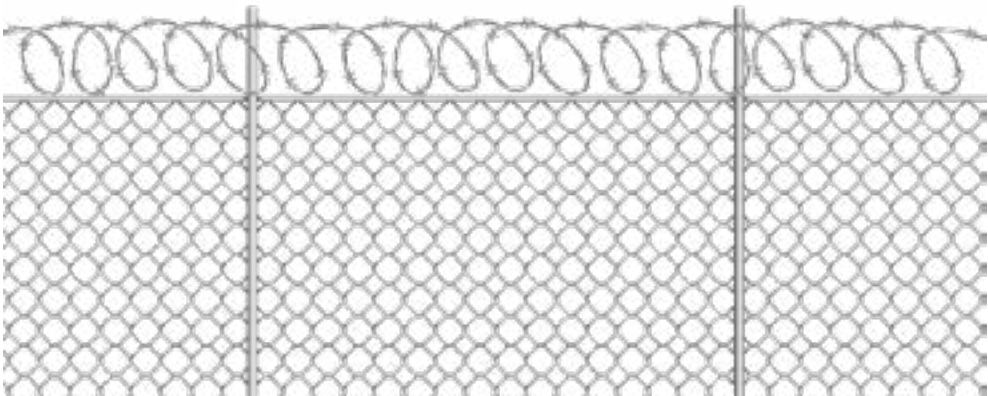

Also, her 7-month-old daughter, Ghada, was detained along with her in the prison for three and a half months. During that period, the little child suffered from pulmonary diseases that almost turned into asthma. Al-Zitawi was released after ending her sentence. She was detained again in December 2018 for four days while visiting her detained brother, Abdallah al-Zitawi in the Negev prison, who is serving a 7-year prison sentence, and she was transferred to an unknown destination for interrogation and then released.

The Israeli occupation's Prisons Authority had rejected her lawyer's request to reduce a third of her three-year imprisonment, so she resorted to the Magistrate's Court in Tel Aviv, which rejected her request and case. Her lawyer submitted an appeal to the District Court, which acknowledged her right to be released and decided to release her after spending two-thirds of the sentence.

During the investigations with Ardah, the occupation forces arrested her two sisters; Reem, 18, and Nahid, 25, a mother of a child, to exercise pressure on Maha to confess the charges. The forces threatened her to continue arresting them as a punishment. Then they released them and transferred Maha to the court, which extended her detention, and she was transferred to Hasharon prison, where she was sentenced to two years. She was released after serving her sentence.

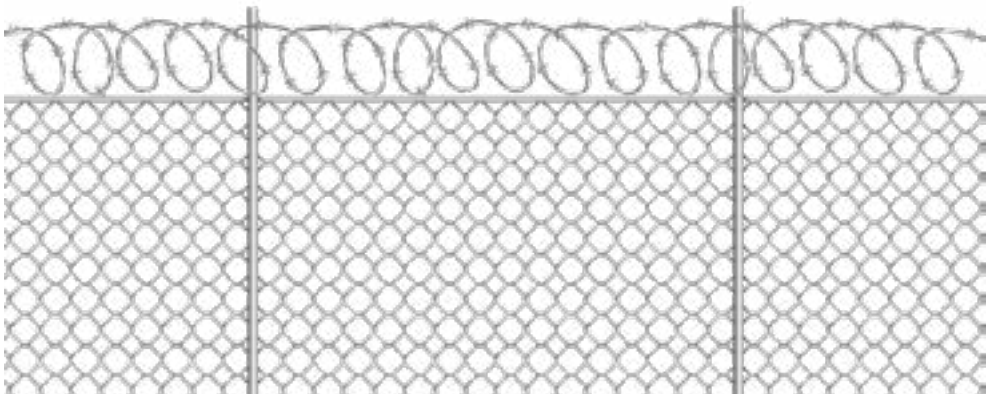

The occupation forces arrested detainee Rawda at the Beit Hanoun, Erez, crossing in the northern Gaza Strip while heading to undergo a surgical operation in a hospital in the occupied territories with her Aunt Fatima Al-Zaq. Then they were accused of planning to carry out a martyrdom operation for the Palestinian Islamic Jihad movement. Rawda and her aunt were released after spending a year and a half in prison as a part of the Shalit footage deal in 2009.

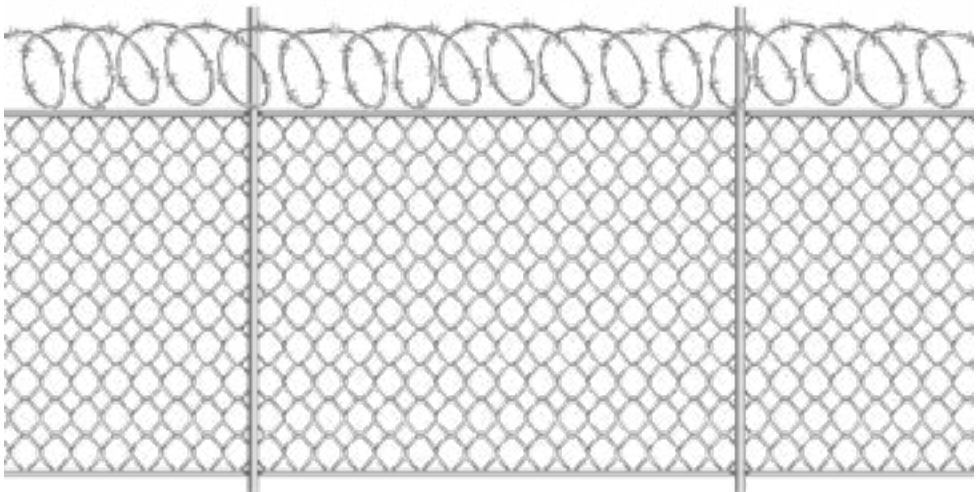
The occupation forces arrested Al-Natshah at one of the checkpoints on the pretext of her intention to stab a soldier with a knife, according to the soldiers who claimed that they had found a knife in her possession. This is an unfounded and untrue claim through which the occupation always repeats the same fallacious argument to justify abducting girls and women from the West Bank at checkpoints and bypass streets.

Heba, like the rest of the female prisoners, was subjected to very difficult interrogation conditions and then she was transferred to Hasharon prison where she struggled through the darkest chapters of suffering. Heba described her detention saying, "The female prisoners' battle inside the cells goes beyond the occupation's torture. They suffer from insects and mice and the prevention of the use of insecticides for fear of being used against the prison guards, humidity, poor ventilation, and the lack of sunlight exposure because the prison is located underground with more than three layers. The female prisoners also suffer from the lack of food, its poor quality and preparation, and overcrowdedness,



especially during the break, which does not exceed three hours a day and happens in an area that does not exceed ten meters for a total of 26 female prisoners.

After two years of suffering, Heba was released from prison and was able to pass the course of Tajweed (the Quran recitation rules and principles) and jurisprudence and memorize twenty-three parts of the Qur'an. She obtained her high school certificate from behind bars. She was released as a part of the Shalit footage deal in 2009.

She was examined in prison only to discover that she was pregnant. She was taken to the interrogation rooms, but she did not confess anything, so she was transferred to the cells of Ashkelon for interrogation. For an entire week, intense torture was practiced against her to have her confess to the charges against her without taking into account the state of her pregnancy.

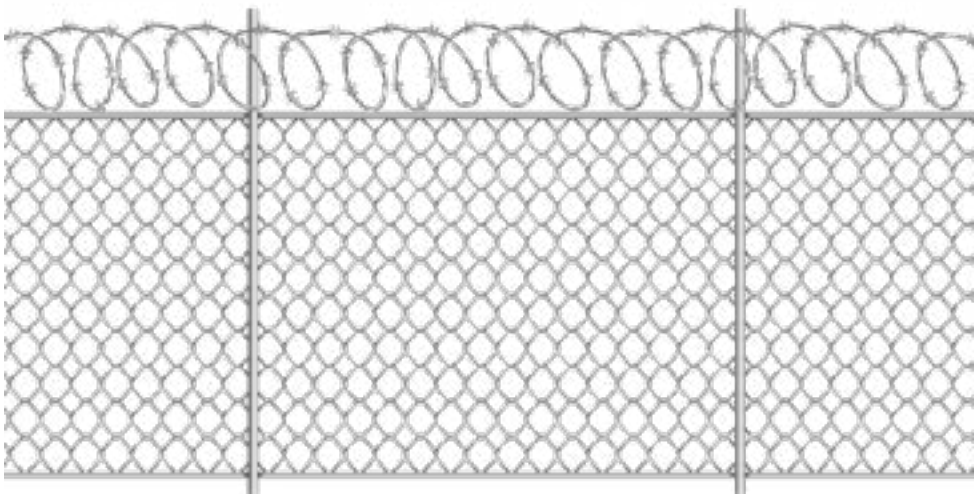
The captive suffered in prison, where she needed a varied diet rich in vitamins due to her pregnancy, but that was almost impossible in a place of "poor nutrition and bad conditions as the meat was a great luxury that they rarely had!" Her months of pregnancy were harsh and difficult.





During those months, Al-Zaq fought the battle to preserve her fetus, about which she was concerned. She suffered from bleeding during her stay in the interrogation cell. When she asked to be transferred to a hospital, she was mocked by the jailers. Al-Zaq gave birth on 17/01/2008 in prison and named her newborn Yousuf. Also, she was subjected to harsh treatment in the hospital, where she was handcuffed, and her feet bound throughout the birth and tied to the bed with iron chains. They refused her pleas to untie her due to the excessive pain she felt because this was a law that could not be violated.

In addition to what the prisoner suffered, there was also the suffering of her child, Yousuf, who did not enjoy a normal childhood and did not see other children except Ghada, the daughter of prisoner Khawla Zetawi. In the end, she was released as a part of the Shalit footage deal in 2009, which included 20 Palestinian female prisoners, after spending two and a half years in jail, and before the confirmation of the sentence against her.

She was released as a part of the Shalit footage deal after spending 17 months in prison.

She was released after serving her sentence.

Then she was re-arrested for the third time on November 5, 2012, and was sentenced to 20 months and a fine of 10,000 shekels. Then the court in Ofer issued a ruling adding four months to her previous sentence. Al-Saadi lived under very difficult conditions, especially since she suffered from high blood pressure and constant fatigue, so she needed special and constant care, which was not available in prison. The prison administration only gave her painkillers although she needed careful treatment and follow-ups. She was released on 30/09/2014 after serving her sentence

Braik said that despite the cruelty of the prison, she benefited greatly from her arrest experience, which was a practical one as she was a second-year student at the Faculty of Law at the Al-Najah National University. Also, she confirms that she will take up the cause of prisoners as a human right one, and the international law must be applied to the Palestinian prisoners because they are prisoners of war not terrorists as the Israeli entity claims. She was released as a part of the Shalit footage deal, after spending three years in prison.

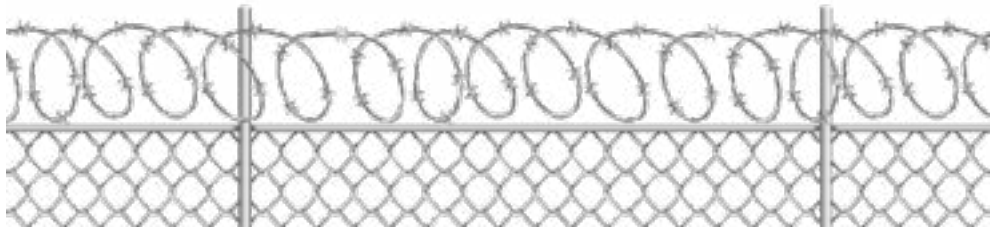

The occupation had included Al-Malaki among the twenty detainees in the Shalit footage deal, but the resistance refused because she had finished her sentence two days before the deal was achieved, so they asked to be replaced by detainee Rawda Habib from Gaza, who was still serving her sentence.

From the very first hearing, it was clear that she was innocent, but the occupation's authorities continued her capture until the judge decided that she was innocent because her statements were more convincing than the prosecution's. The judge ruled her innocent. However, at the same moment, the prosecution submitted a request to the court to arrest her again, and the prosecution's decision was appealed, but the judge refused to announce the appeal's decision, so Al-Amarna remained in prison for up to 11 months without knowing the fate of her case until she was released after her innocence was proven.

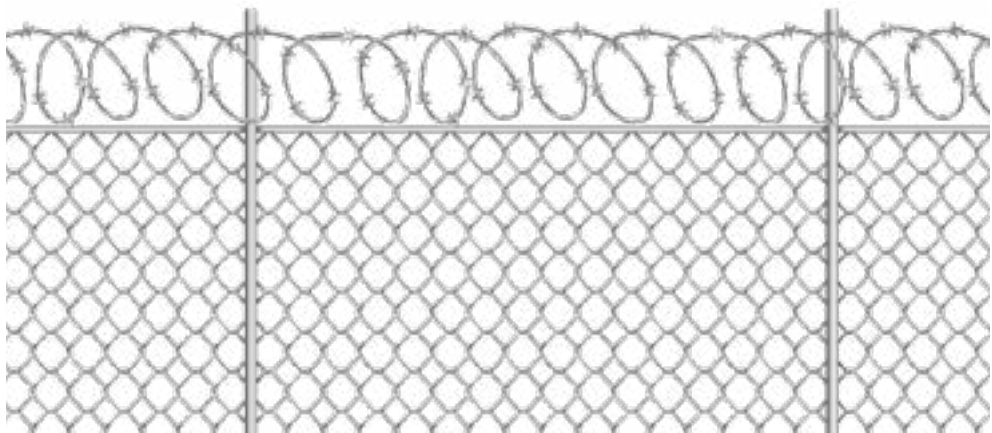

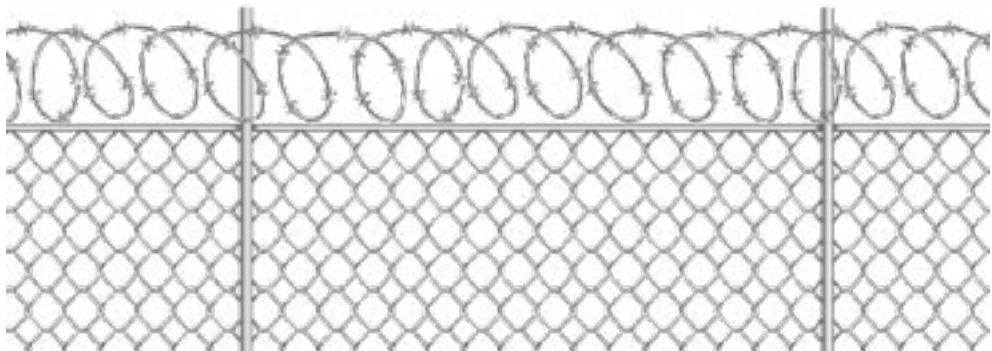

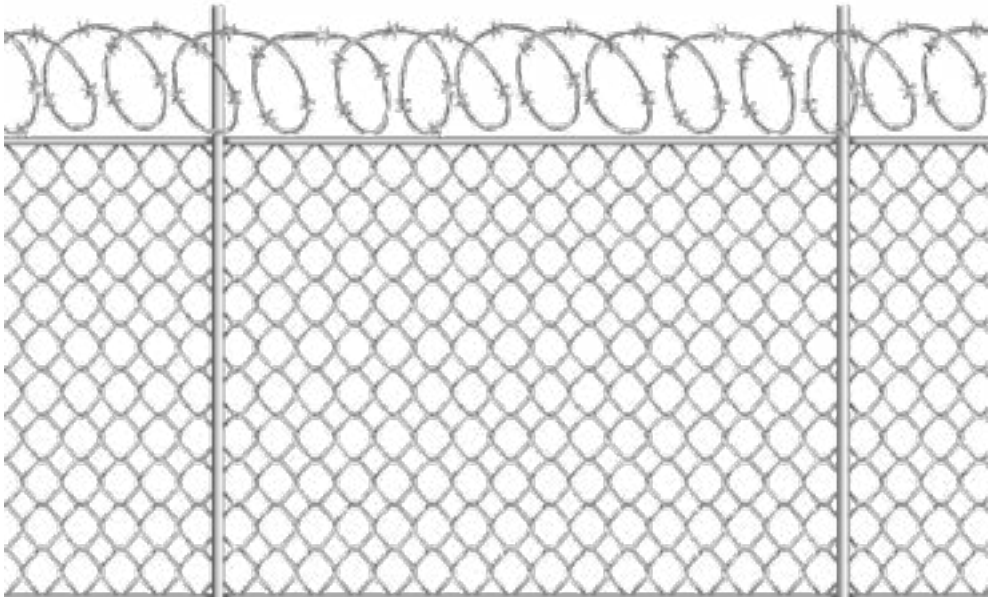
Um, Bakr is a deputy in the Palestinian Legislative Council on the Change and Reform List for the Palestinian Islamic Resistance Movement Hamas and the wife of Hamas leader Jamal Mansour, who was killed in an Israeli bombing of his office in 2001.

The occupation forces stormed Nablus and Balata refugee camp, east of the city, amid heavy gunfire and sound bombs. They raided the house of Mona Mansour, a representative in the Legislative Council, destroyed its contents, seized her computer and some of her files, and arrested her in a flagrant violation of the Law on the Protection of Elected Representatives.





She was taken to an interrogation center where they used various methods in the interrogation; sometimes in a rational, calm way, and at other times by shouting and threatening to transfer her to the Petah Tikva interrogation center and others. They also used other methods such as intimidation and notifying her that the charges against her were pretty big, and she could not deny them no matter how smart she was. Another investigator entered and told her that everyone knew who Mona Mansour was, and that denial would not help her. During the investigation, they asked her to swear by the Holy Qur'an that the accusations leveled against her were incorrect. She was released several days after her arrest.

For more than five consecutive years, the occupation prison administration prevented Abayat's father from visiting her. She also suffered from health issues in the kidney and did not receive the appropriate treatment. She was released in the Gilad Shalit prisoner exchange deal after spending two years in detention.

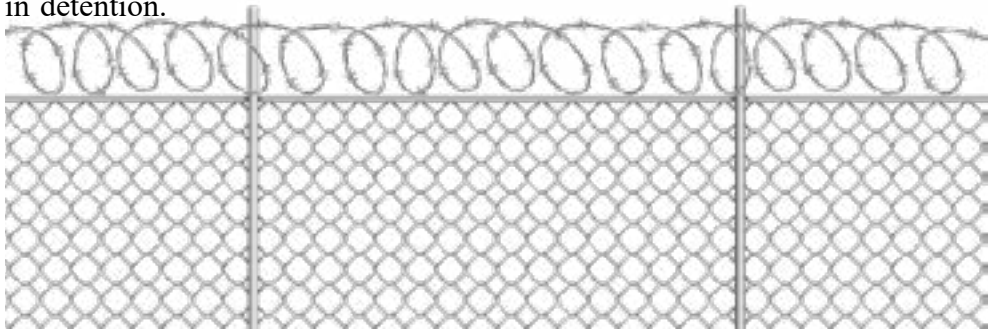

Karajah was released in the Gilad Shalit prisoner exchange deal after spending two years in detention.

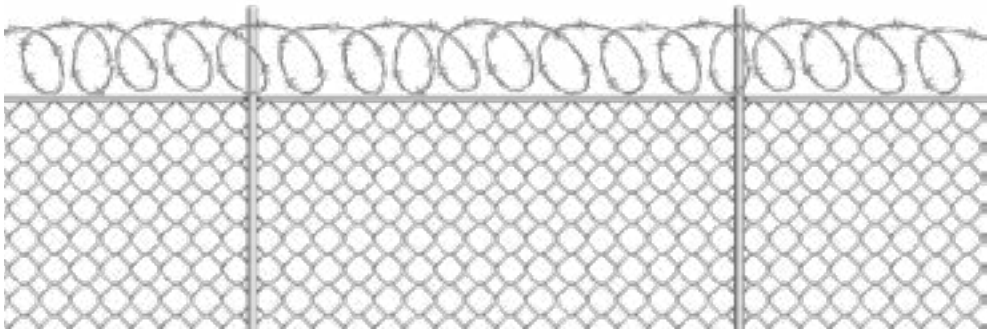

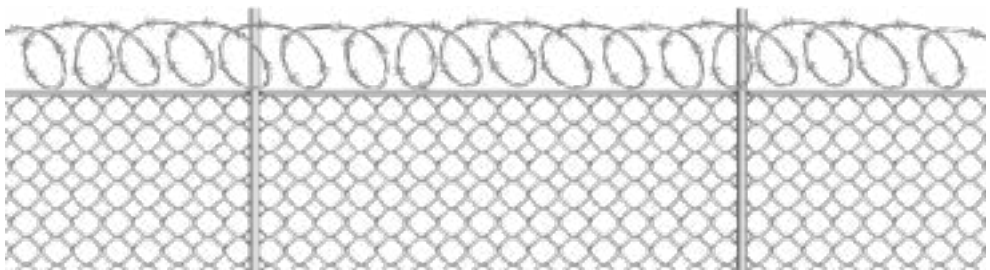

Then she was sent to the so-called (Beit Jala Institution for Girls' Welfare), where she spent another month and was banned from making any phone calls or receiving family visits except for the first-degree relatives before the occupation decided to release her.

The occupation re-detained Abu Turki on 27/7/2012 in front of a checkpoint near the Ibrahimi Mosque allegedly for spraying (nerve oil) at one of the occupation female soldiers and attempting to stab an Israeli occupation soldier in the same place. She was sentenced to one year of detention and a fine of 1,000 shekels, only to be released after serving her sentence.

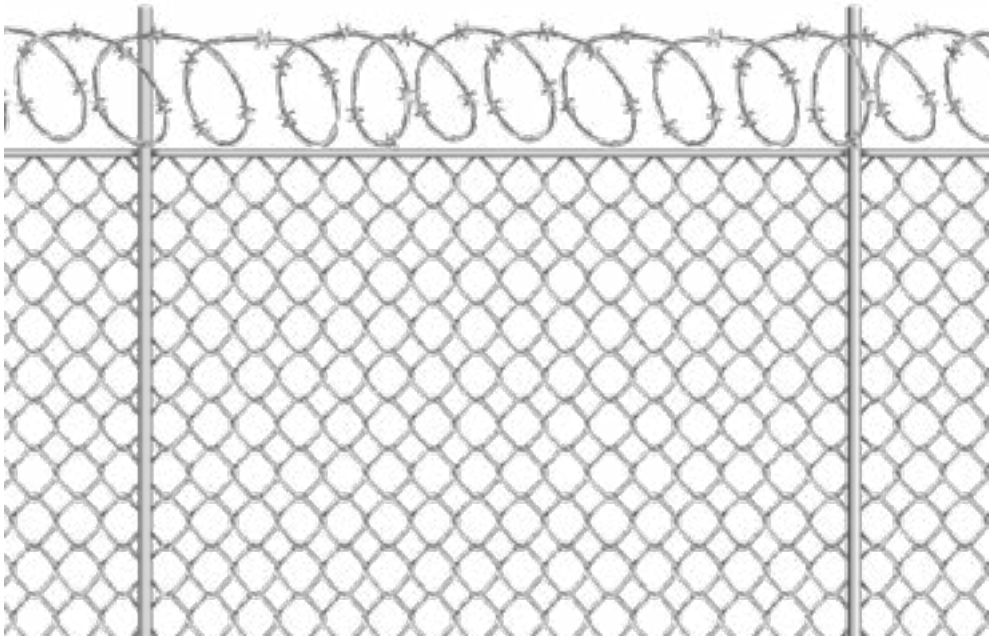
Eleven days later, the occupation raided her home again and arrested her husband's brother and son. 18 days later, the occupation stormed her husband's family home and arrested her mother-in-law, who remained in detention for two days, in order to exercise pressure on her and force her to confess.

In addition to the lack of food and blankets, as the weather was very cold, Safadi was subjected to continuous torture and deprivation of sleep during the 100 days she spent in the Petah Tikva interrogation center and the Hasharon solitary confinement. She was also not allowed to meet with her lawyer.

The detainee is the wife of blind detainee Ubadah Saeed Bilal, with whom she stayed for only two weeks after their marriage before the occupation forces detained him and sentenced him to 11 and a half years in jail. She only saw her husband seven years after his detention.



On one occasion, she had the opportunity to be with her husband Ubada in the same cage of the occupation court in Ofer, but the occupation soldiers prevented her from talking to him, which she refused, so they punished her in solitary confinement for three days. She was released after serving her sentence.

In detention, the occupation tortured her and threatened to detain her husband, but she denied all the charges against her.

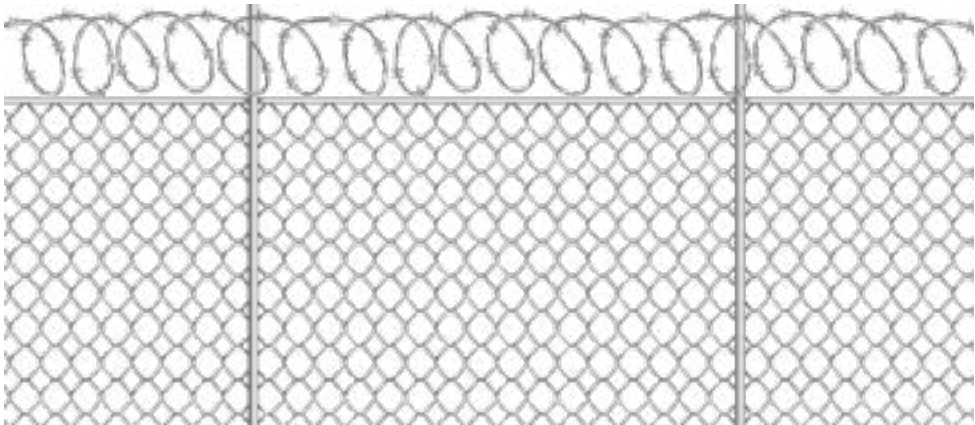
As for the cruelest part of the interrogation, Al-Ghoul said, "On the last day of the interrogation, they put me in a very cold room that had a bed of concrete, stink blankets, and a tightly-closed thick door. Then, they punished me and transferred me to the Israelis Criminal Prison. There, I continued the strike and refused to take the cardiac medicine they brought to me which caused me to suffer severe complications. At first, they did not care, but when my



health condition deteriorated dramatically, they transferred me to Section 11 for female security detainees in Telmond detention".

It is worth mentioning that the Israeli occupation arrested her in 1989, when she was on her way back from Jordan. Then, she lost her eyesight and had paralysis in her limbs after stones fell down on her head while Israeli occupation forces were demolishing the home of her neighbors. An Israeli military court sentenced her to three years and a half, but she only stayed four months in jail because she was a minor back then. The imprisonment was replaced with a one-thousand-shekel fine. In 2005, she was arrested for the second time for aiding the detainees. She had abusive interrogation in prison that lasted for a month. Then, an Israeli military court sentenced her to one year in prison and a fine.

The third detention occurred in 2009. The Israeli occupation kept her in administrative detention, and it was extended many times. Rajaa memorized the holy Quran, read 50 books, and summarized 10 during her detention. She was released upon the expiration of her sentence.

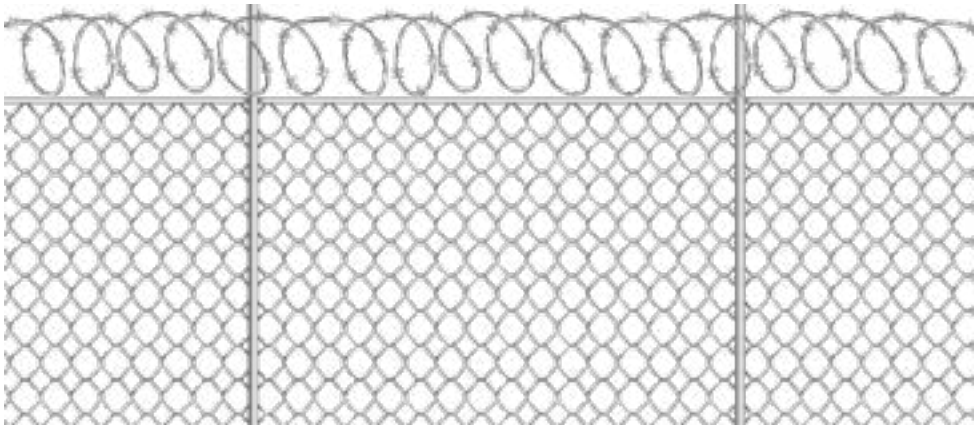

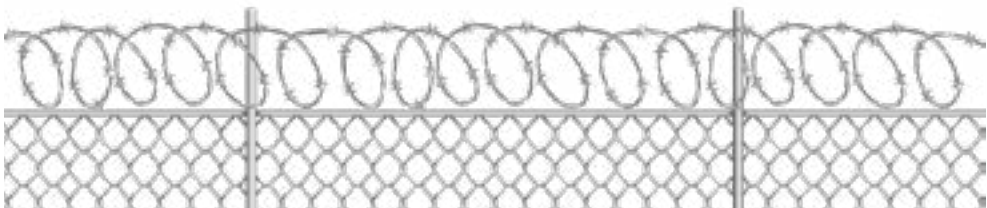

During her detention, she was interrogated almost daily and was subjected to psychological torture by talking about her family's health condition, specifically her father, and about detaining her brother and barbarically torturing him. She was released in the Gilad Shalit prisoner exchange deal in 2011 after serving eight months of her sentence.

Six to seven interrogators took turns interrogating her until she was emaciated from the severity of fatigue, lack of food, and sleep deprivation.

Sister of a martyr and an ex-detainee brother, Zamel comes from a struggling family. She previously worked for the daily "Palestine" newspaper. She was released after serving her 10-month sentence.

In 2010, she got engaged to detainee Hassan Salama from Gaza, who is serving a life 48-life sentence. Salama, 51, is considered one of the most prominent leaders of the Al-Qassam Brigades, whom the occupation authorities accused of being behind a series of martyrdom operations inside 1948 occupied territories after the martyrdom of Yahya Ayyash in 1996.

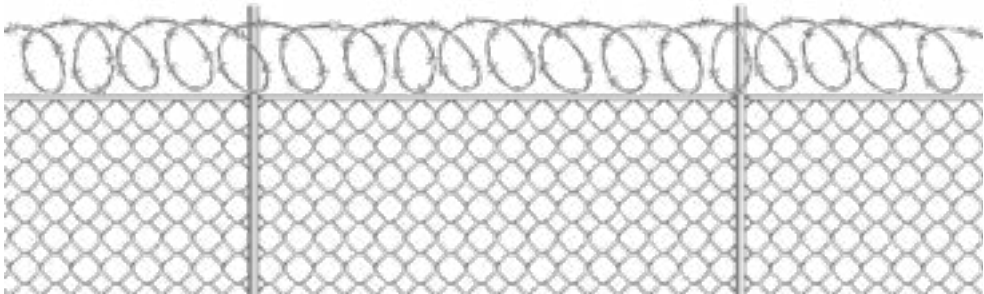

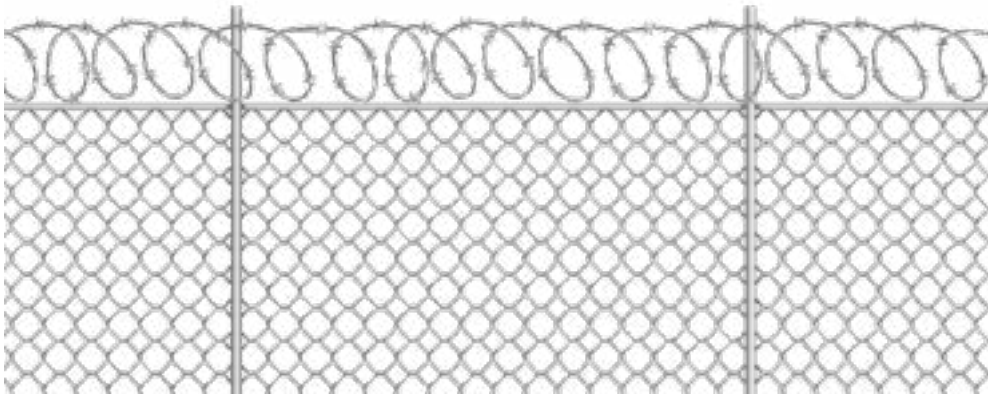

In an attempt to force Sweis to make confessions, Israeli interrogators threatened that they would detain her family members.

In the end, Israeli authorities failed to criminalize her, so she appeared before the court without charge. She was released a few days later.

She received 400-800 shekels for each visit to the detainees, the Israeli prosecution claimed. Israeli sources claimed that Israeli occupation forces found letters in the homes of the arrested lawyers during the arrest, noting that three of them were released before the trial, but Ayoub remained in prison until 26/04/2011.

Israeli occupation officers finally released her ten days later. The Israeli occupation authorities accused her of running a Facebook page concerned with the affairs of Palestinian detainees held in Israeli jails. She said that the page was a personal initiative to express her opinion about this issue.

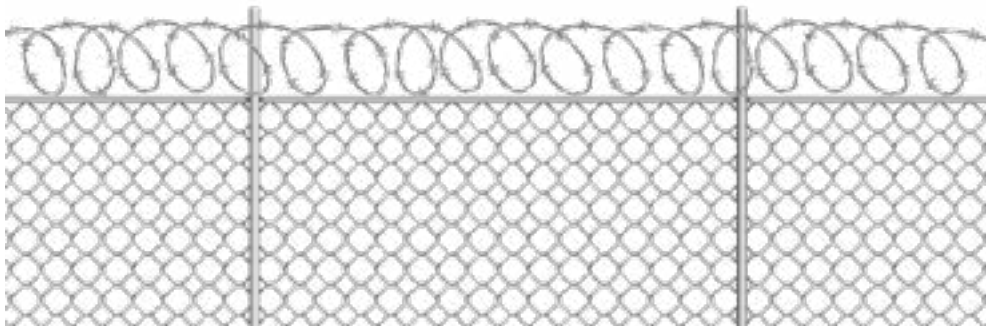

It is noteworthy that the detainee is an employee of the Cordoba School in the Tel Rumeida area, opposite the Ibrahimi Mosque, and the occupation had detained her more than once due to her constant activity in confronting the attacks of settlers. Abu-Eisheh suffers from severe pain in the joints due to rheumatic disease, which has escalated under the bad conditions in which she was kept during detention. She was released upon the expiration of her sentence.

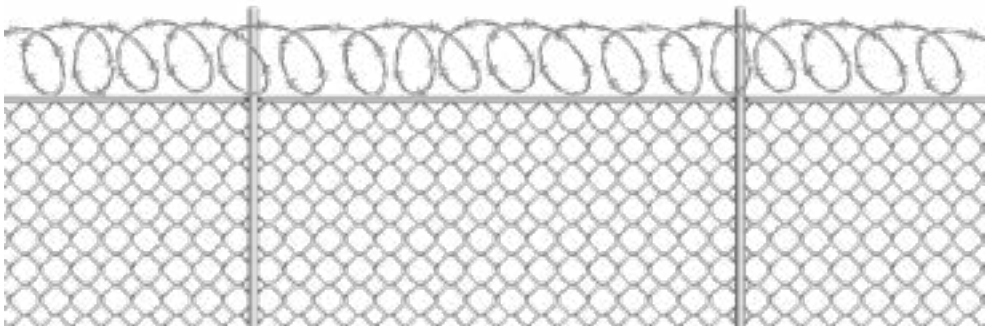

Waked suffers from difficult health conditions because of her asthma. The conditions in the interrogation cells and detention rooms exacerbated her illness, as the air was not clean, and the humidity was high. She also contracted diabetes and stress during her imprisonment. She was subjected to continuous and great pressure during her interrogation at Petah Tikva Center. Waked did not receive any medical treatment appropriate to her condition, which caused her health to decline in light of the continued policy of medical neglect against her. 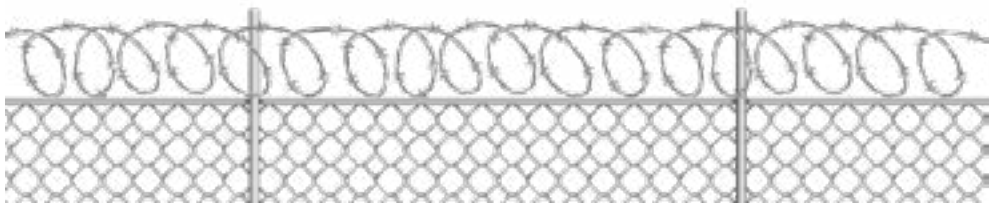

It is noteworthy that this was the third time Atyani was imprisoned by Israel. The first happened when she was 17 years old, and the second was in 2009 when she was kept in solitary confinement for 21 days.

She was released upon the expiration of her sentence.

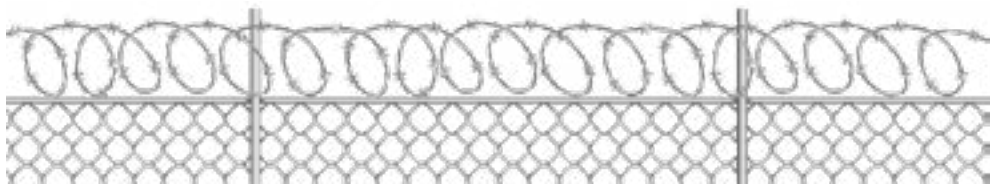

It is noteworthy that detainee Lama Hadaideh was a student at Al-Quds Open University in Tulkarm, majoring in Communication Technology. She is the daughter of martyr Ibrahim Hadaideh, who was martyred in the First Intifada at the hands of the Israeli occupation forces. She was released upon the end of her sentence.

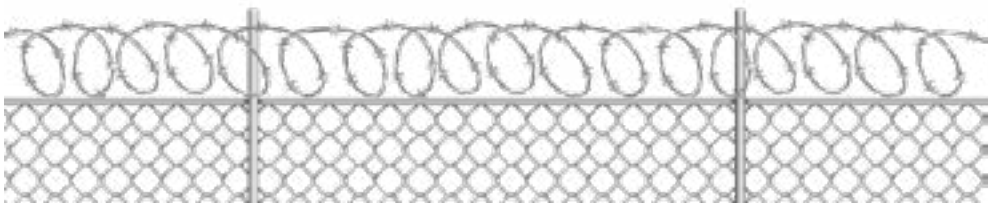

During the detention, Israeli occupation soldiers beat her severely, abused her verbally, placed her in solitary confinement, deprived her of sleep, and threatened to keep her in chains for days. As a result of the beating, her kidneys bled, according to the prison doctor. She was also hit on the head by a female soldier, causing her to faint. Al-Heeh remained isolated from the Palestinian women prisoners and was not admitted to Hasharon Prison, where they were held. Instead, she was placed with criminal prisoners. Most of the time, she was kept in a room alone at the Al-Moscobiyeh Detention Center. She was released upon the expiry of her sentence after the charge was not proven against her.

The occupation soldiers assaulted her with the butts of their rifles, which caused her to bleed from the head. In addition to humiliation, Hassouna's limbs were tightly tied for long hours without moving in front of the checkpoint. She was sentenced to five and a half months in detention. The Israeli occupation also prevented her from meeting with her relatives or talking to them over the phone. The first visit was made on 03/03/2014. Her father was deprived of visiting her despite completing all the required procedures. The pretext was "security" because he was a detainee himself about 20 years earlier. Hassouna is the only daughter of her parents and was a distinguished student in her studies at Al-Najah National University in Nablus. Two years after her detention, specifically on 01/12/2015, she was martyred at the Annab checkpoint, east of Tulkarm. The soldiers shot her dead on the spot which coincided with the day she was detained two years earlier.

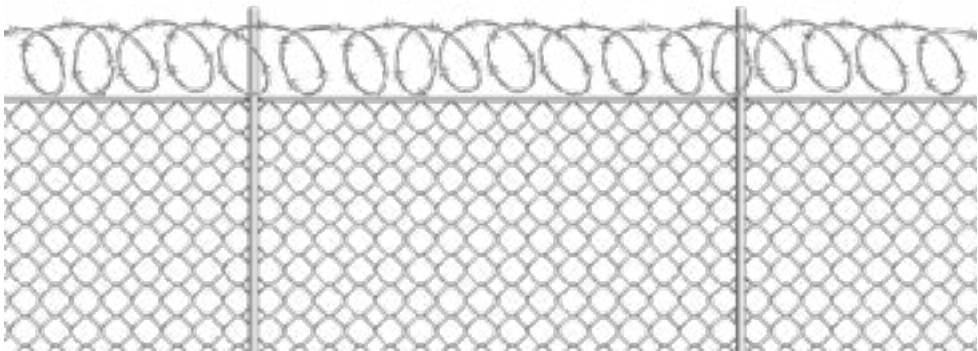

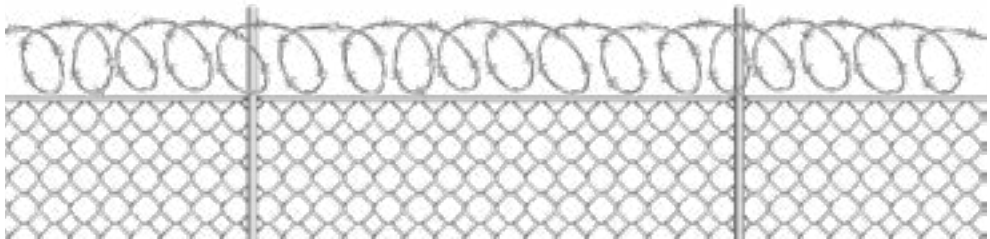

She was released upon the expiration of her sentence.

It is noteworthy that the detainee Qalambo is an African woman and one of the activists at the Al-Aqsa Mosque who participates in activities held in protest against the occupation's Judaisation policies exercised at the holy city. The Israeli occupation also detained her on 07/04/2013 in a march organized to protest the death of a Palestinian detainee in prison. Back then, Israeli occupation forces humiliated, beat, and prosecuted her. She had undergone abusive interrogation and harsh treatment in the Moscobiye detention center. The Israeli occupation released her seven months later, on 09/28/2014.

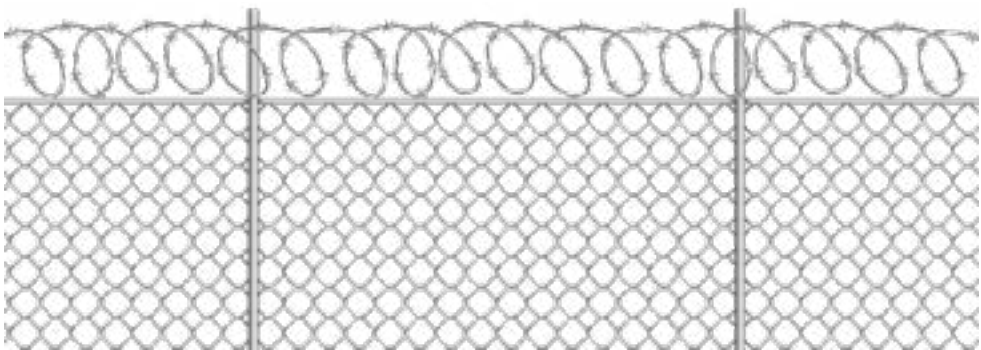

In addition, her husband suffered medical negligence in jail, as the Israeli Prison Server provided no medical care for the complications of a stroke she had had. The mother of six was finally released upon the expiration of her sentence.

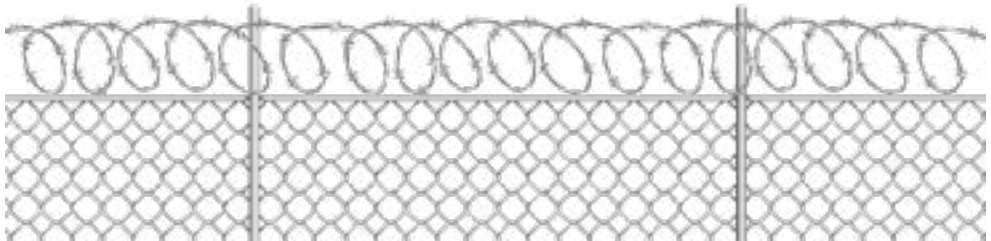

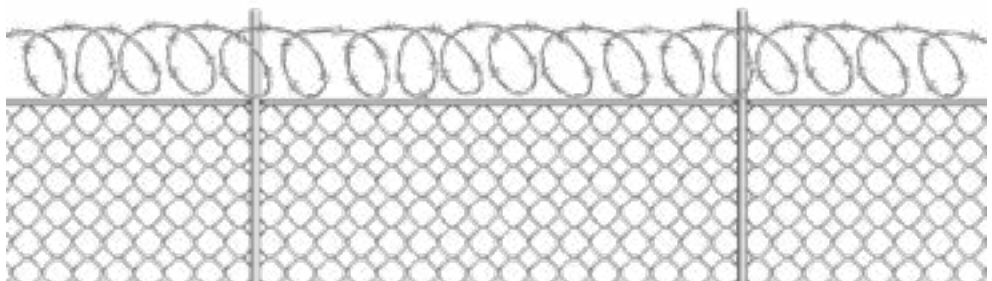

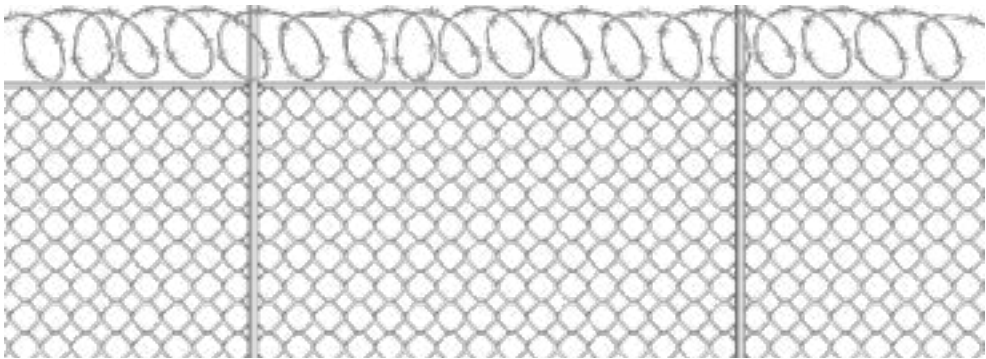

After her arrest, the Israeli authorities transferred her husband, Ahmed, from Eshel Prison to the Al-Jalamah Interrogation Center. The Israeli jailers also questioned him and his wife about helping Palestinian detainees. After the Israeli court made a judgment on her case, she was transferred to the Hasharon Prison. While behind bars, Al-Shaibani suffered from abusive interrogation and harsh investigation. She was released upon the expiration of her sentence.

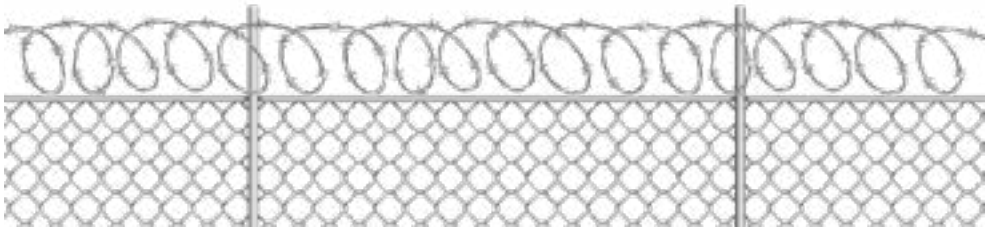

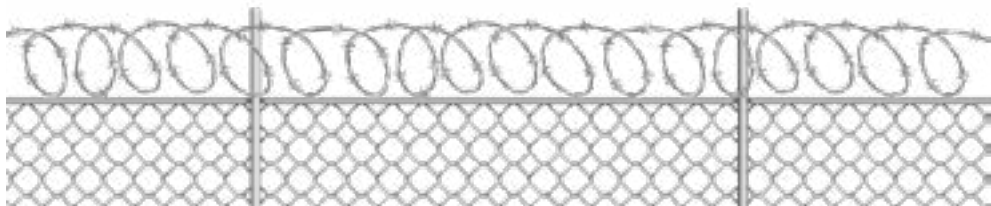

Shireen Al-Issawi is a Palestinian lawyer from the Al-Issawiya neighborhood in Jerusalem. Israeli occupation forces detained the lady after breaking into her home and charged her with assisting detainees from Hamas. The prison administration isolated her from other detainees on the first day in prison, so she went on an open-ended hunger strike in protest. Al-Issawi broke her hunger strike after the Israeli Prison Service suspended her solitary confinement.

Shireen Al-Issawi spent 43 months in Israeli jails. A few moments before Shireen's final release from the Damon Prison, the Israeli occupation authorities detained the lady again and took her to the Al-Moscobiyeh Interrogation Center in Jerusalem. Meanwhile, the Israeli occupation soldiers stormed her family's house, tore apart her pictures, and threatened to re-detain her in case the photos were redistributed in the village.

It is noteworthy that the Israeli occupation detained Shireen Al-Issawi multiple times and kept her under house arrest for several months. Furthermore, she is the sister of detainees Samer and Medhat Al-Issawi. She was released upon the expiration of her sentence.

On that day, she was moving an empty gas cylinder and a TV set. According to Israa, she told interrogators that she was turning on the air conditioner and the car recorder.

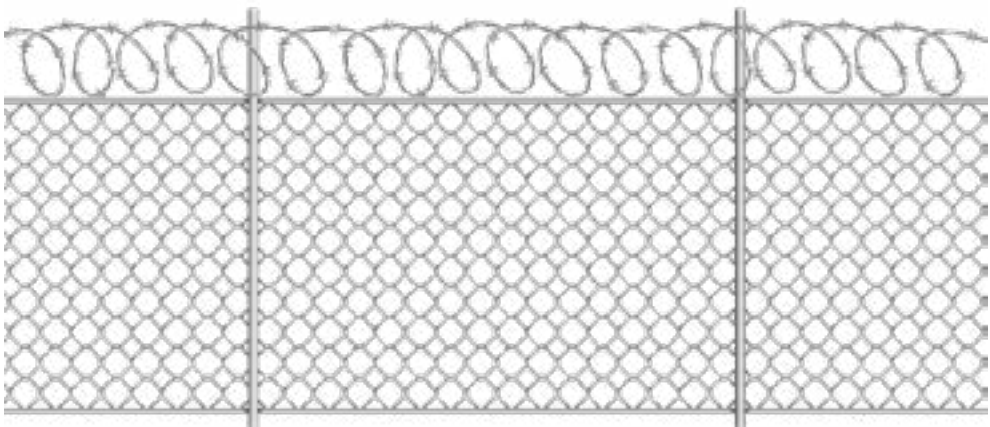
When Israa was heading to the Al-Zaim checkpoint, her car broke down near the settlement of Ma'ale Adumim, an electrical fault occurred, and the car's airbag exploded. The car caught fire. Israa got out of the car and called an ambulance from the Israeli policemen who were nearby, but the police did not call an ambulance. Rather, a policeman who was at the scene closed the burning car door while she was inside.

The police initially announced that it was a normal traffic accident. Then the Hebrew media announced that it was an operation targeting Israeli soldiers. Investigators later discovered the presence of the television with the empty gas cylinder and that the explosion was from the airbag, not the gas cylinder.



They also learned that turning on the air conditioner prevented the car windows from exploding, but Israeli intelligence claimed that Israa was on her way to carrying out an operation, and she was arrested after that.

Several interrogation sessions were held inside the hospital due to the difficulty of transferring her to court due to her critical health conditions. Israa was charged with attempting to carry out an operation and kill soldiers by detonating a gas cylinder, knowing that it was empty, and the explosion occurred in the front of the car. She was sentenced to 11 years in prison and was ordered to pay a fine of 20000 shekels. The deliberations before the ruling lasted a year, and the ruling was issued on 7/10/2016. The Israeli occupation withdrew her health insurance card and deprived her of family visits several times. On one occasion, Israeli occupation prevented her only son, Mutassim, from visiting her. She is still in prison serving her sentence.

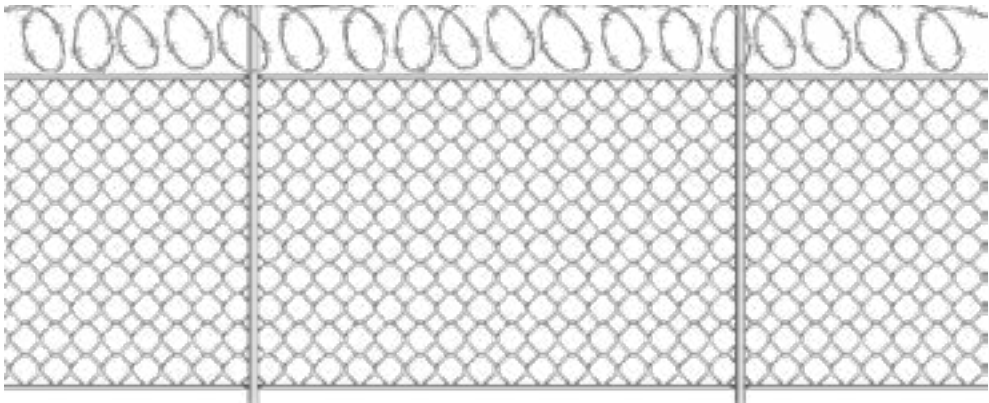
Darin Tatour is a Palestinian poet, photographer, and political and social activist. She was born in the village of Al-Rina, Nazareth. She studied engineering, programming, and then media and film directing.

Darin was arrested for writing an anti-occupation poem entitled "Resist, My People" and posting it on social media. She was accused of inciting violence and terrorism and supporting a terrorist organization. Darin received international support. Her case turned into a public opinion issue for freedom of expression and political prosecutions of artists, writers and, poets. She wrote in prison a play named: "I, Darine Tatour," in which she tells about her suffering in the occupation prison and documents her experience; the play was translated into English, Swedish, and Hebrew languages. The play was first staged in October 2018 in Hebrew and English in several places in occupied Palestine and abroad. Darin also published a book titled "My Dangerous



Poem” in Arabic and English languages. She also recorded her experience of captivity in the book.

In 2015, Darin won the Al Ain Magazine award for supporting politically persecuted artists. In 2016, she won the Danish poet Charles Scharnberg Prize. In 2017, she won the International Translation Day award where her poems were translated into more than 20 languages in the world organized by the International Pen Organization which adopted her case. In 2019, Darin won the Freedom of Expression Award from the International Oxfam Novib Organization in the Netherlands and the Freedom of Expression Award from the Norway Writers Organization. She was released upon the expiration of her sentence.

Shorouk, who is spending the longest jail term a Palestinian female prisoner is serving, was arrested while heading to pray in Al-Aqsa Mosque when settlers shot her to the chest, shoulder, and neck. Her condition was critical at the time as a result of being shot at close range. After Shorouk had tried to defend herself against harassment, she was accused of attempting to stab the settler. She was transferred to Hadassah Ein Karem hospital for medical treatment. Despite her critical condition, she was confined to a hospital bed, and under heavy security, she underwent an operation during which her hand artery, which was severed by the shooting, was repaired. After a month of her stay in the hospital, and before she fully recovered, the Israeli occupation transferred her to Hasharon Women's Prison and then to Damon, where she is still serving her sentence.

During the events of 14/12/2021, Shorouk, along with the female prisoner representative, Marah Bakir, and three other female prisoners, was sent to solitary confinement.

The Israeli occupation arrested Marah, a high school student, after she was targeted with 14 bullets to her hand after attending school in the Sheikh Jarrah neighborhood. An Israeli occupation soldier claimed that she tried to stab him before he shot her. Instead of helping her, four other Israeli officers surrounded her, pointing their guns at her. Marah stayed in the Hadassah Ein Kerem Hospital for 22 days before she was moved to the minors' section of the Hasharon Prison.

Marah suffers from medical negligence and unnecessary bureaucracy that delays an operation to remove platinum.

Marah was able to finish high school with a GPA of 80% and her dream is to study law in order to defend the oppressed. But the Israeli occupation prevents her from joining university.

Marah became a representative of the Palestinian female prisoners in Damon Prison after transferring her from Hasharon Prison. She was repressed and isolated in the events of 14/12/2021 with Shorouk Dwayyat and three other female prisoners. She is still in prison serving her sentence.

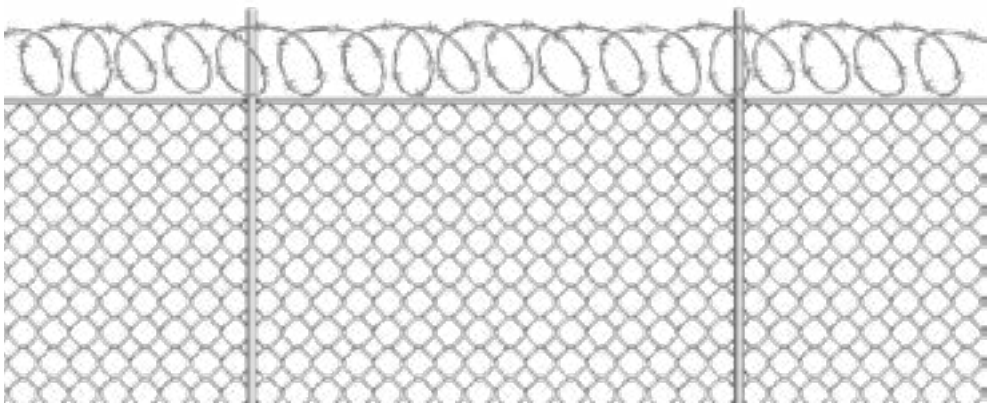
Detention circumstances:

Nisreen Abu Kamil is married to a relative in Gaza. She was on her way to Haifa, in the occupied Palestinian areas since 1948 to visit her family through the Beit Hanoun crossing when Israeli forces arrested her, claiming that she was a member of a resistance movement and that she was recruited to collect information on targets inside the occupied territories. She was subjected to a harsh interrogation for 21 days in Ashkelon at the hands of the occupation intelligence officers. She was hit with rifle butts directly on the heart, which weakened her heart muscle. She also suffers from several diseases, including hypertension and diabetes.

The families spent years moving between the prisons: Ramleh, Ashkelon, Hasharon, all the way to Damoun. Her family was prevented from visiting her because they are from the Gaza Strip. The court issued a verdict to release Nisreen more than once, but the prosecution repeatedly rejected that.



Nisreen was released upon the expiration of her sentence, but the occupation delayed her entry into the Gaza Strip, so she stayed at the Beit Hanoun crossing with a group of solidarity activists until the occupation was forced to allow her to enter three days after her release on the condition that she does not leave Gaza for two years. Nisreen finally met her children after six years of separation.

They took me to a room and kept me with another minor female prisoner named Maha Shatat. She was 17. They treated us badly there, and the cells were full of cockroaches. The jailer used to yell out, and the cells were very cold. The food was bad and had a bad smell. I stayed in the Jalameh prison for almost two weeks. During this period, I used



to go to courts that always extended my detention. They finally transferred me to the Hasharon prison.”

The Israeli court sentenced me to three months in prison. After her release, she rejoined school to continue her education.

He wanted to shoot me. I froze in my place, but he continued to shout and called the army. They came very quickly and handcuffed my hands from behind. They shouted at me and claimed that I was carrying a knife and intended to carry a stabbing attempt,” Dima explained

She was interrogated in the absence of her lawyer and father. The girl appeared before the military court and was sentenced to four months and a half in prison, but the prison sentence was suspended because no evidence .



was found. The Israeli Prison Service transferred her to the Hasharon Prison after she was charged with a murder attempt.

In her early days in prison, the Israeli prosecutor requested her transfer to a rehabilitation center run by the Israeli Ministry of Social Affairs. In addition, she was forced to pay a fine of 8000 shekels, and her family signed a bail bond of 25000 shekels.

The young girl was interrogated in the absence of her father and her lawyer. The occupation forces released the girl upon the expiration of her sentence

The occupation forces did not allow Ansam to complete her education inside the prison and banned her from regular family visits. She was allowed one family visit every four months.

An Israeli military court sentenced her to five years and two years suspended. She was released upon the expiration of her sentence on 08/03/2021.

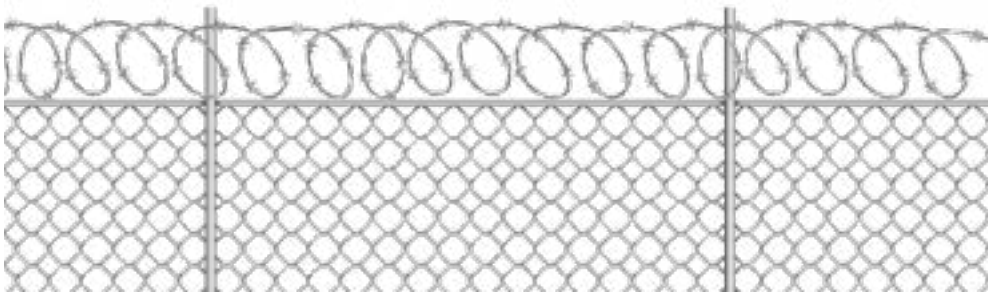

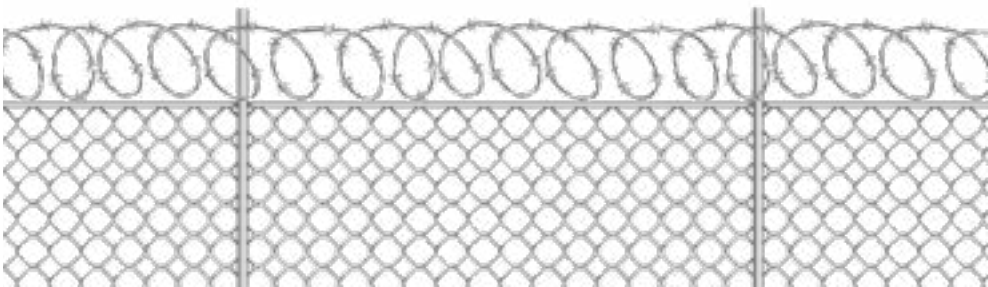

After Shatila's arrest, her family received a letter from her, stating that she had carried out the operation to respond to the crimes of the Israeli occupation. Shatila told Shin Bet officers during the investigation: "I carried out the operation in retaliation for the crimes against Dawabsheh and Abu Khdeir family, and for her brother Musa, who had been attacked and stabbed by settlers, since the occupation did not investigate or take any action" against the Israeli perpetrators

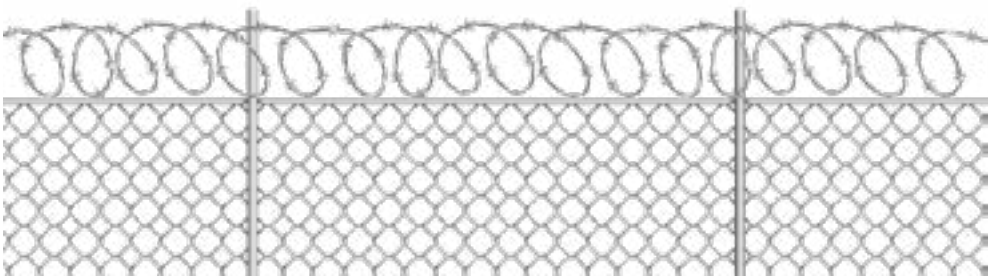

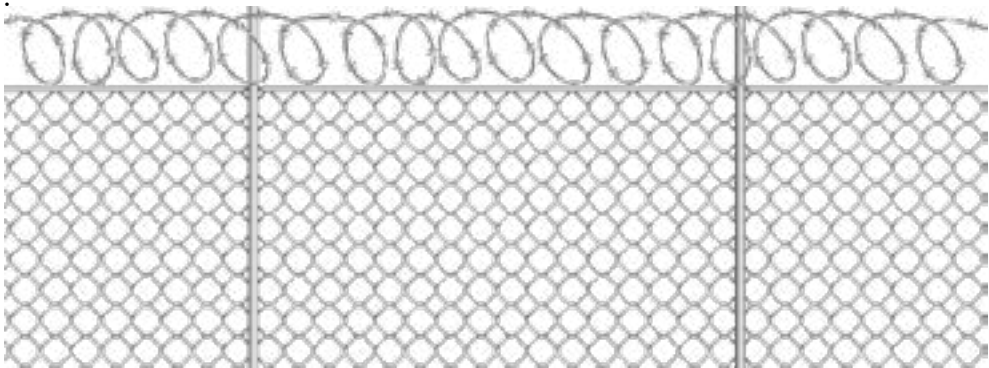

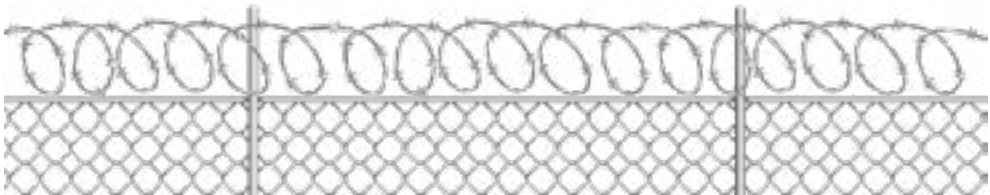

The Israeli Prison Service had banned her from family visits for three months since her detention.

She was transferred from the Al-Moscobiye Detention Center to the Hasharon Prison. An Israeli court sentenced her to eight months in prison after she had already served two months behind bars. Therefore, Nour was released four days after the trial. Then, she stayed in the Damon prison until her release.

Upon her release, Nour returned to university and completed her BA study.

A 'repulsive board' was placed in front of her face, and a cooling device was above her head.



The interrogators asked her to look towards the board while the cold air hit her head very hard. At the same time, two interrogators bombarded her with probing questions.

She was released upon the expiration of her sentence and was deported from Jerusalem for three years.

Israeli occupation forces accused her of violating the conditions of the Gilad Shalit prisoner exchange deal, claiming that she drove a car without a license. The Israeli prosecution demanded the reinstatement of her old sentence period and sentenced her to 17 months.

Randa was kept in solitary confinement in the Hasharon Prison under continued surveillance. The conditions inside the cell were appalling. Only a dirty mattress was thrown on the ground. The water was polluted, and the food was inedible. The harsh conditions forced her to go on an open-ended hunger strike in protest against her solitary confinement.

The Israeli occupation released Randa after 19 days and fined her 10,000 shekels, provided that she does not leave her town nor participate in any political activity. She was forced to visit the police station at the ‘Kiryat Arba’ settlement every Thursday to sign papers in confirmation of the above conditions.

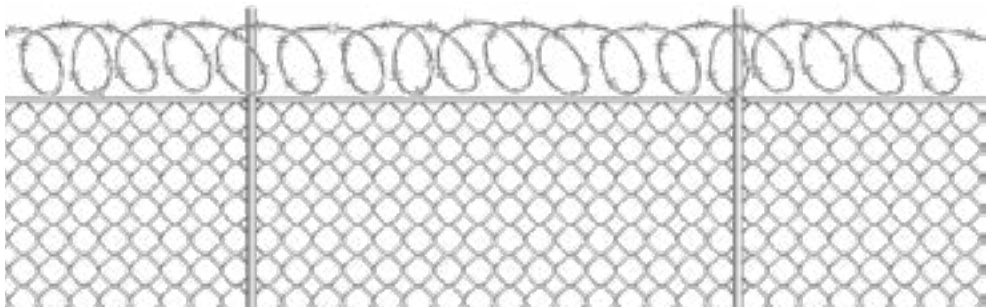

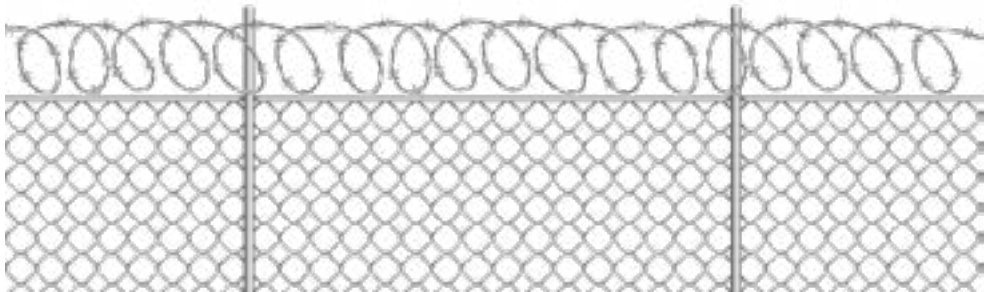

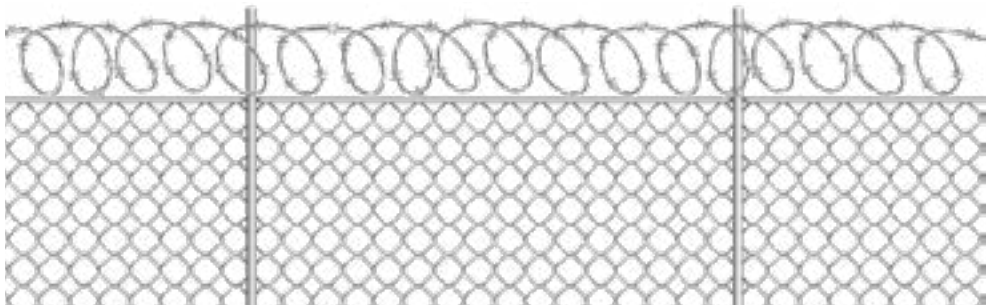

As part of humiliating Israeli practices, Israeli authorities had extended her detention many times before an Israeli Military Court sentenced her to 33 months in detention. She was charged with carrying out a stabbing attack. Amina was released upon the expiration of her sentence.

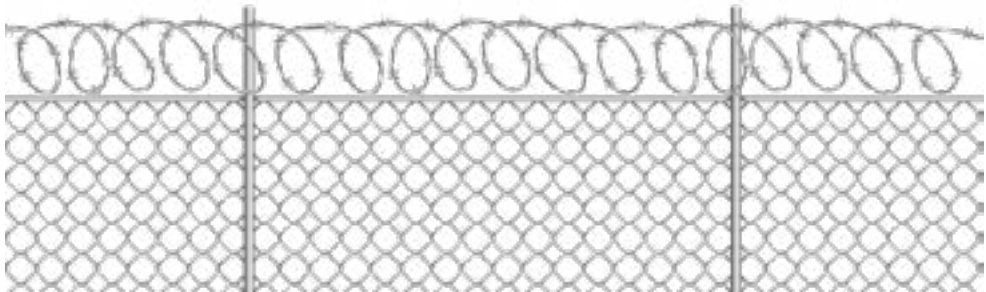

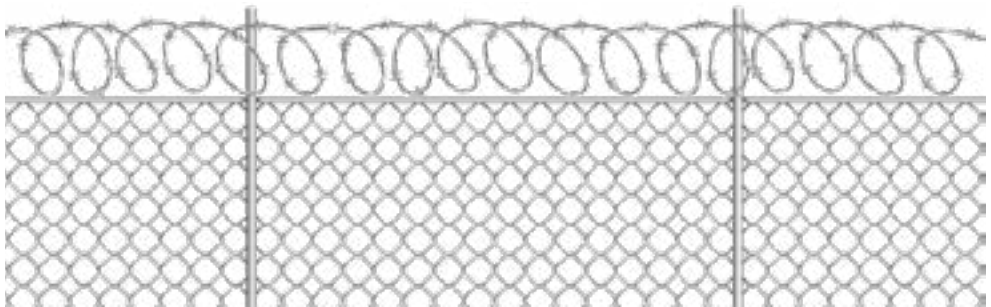

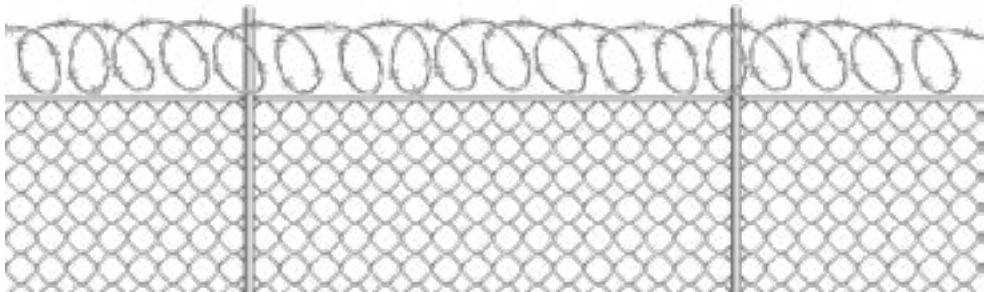

Her husband also established a media office, known as 'Tamimi Press', to document the Israeli crimes against the village residents. She was released upon the expiration of her sentence.

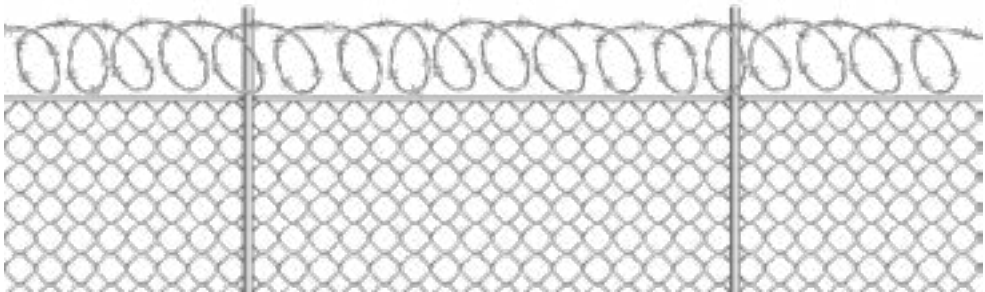

The detainee was subjected to torture as she was led by iron chains on her legs and wrists, and the occupation forces refused to allow her to take medication. She only had five insulin doses out of forty.

Moreover, she had a fracture in her hand and face at a court hearing. The mother of three detainees was released days later.

On the way, the Israeli jeep passed through the Etzion interrogation center, then Ofer Prison, up to the Hasharon Prison. She was interrogated for seven continuous hours for publishing some posts on Facebook.

The Ofer military court sentenced her to 95 days in prison and another seven-month-long imprisonment suspended for four years.

Shortly before her release, the Israeli Prison Service extended her administrative detention multiple times, so she went on an open-ended hunger strike in protest. The Israeli occupation finally released her on 08/08/2019 after spending a total of 21 months in prison.

In 2015, Israeli occupation forces arrested and sentenced Feda'a to six months in prison for allegedly holding a knife and fined her 2000 shekels.

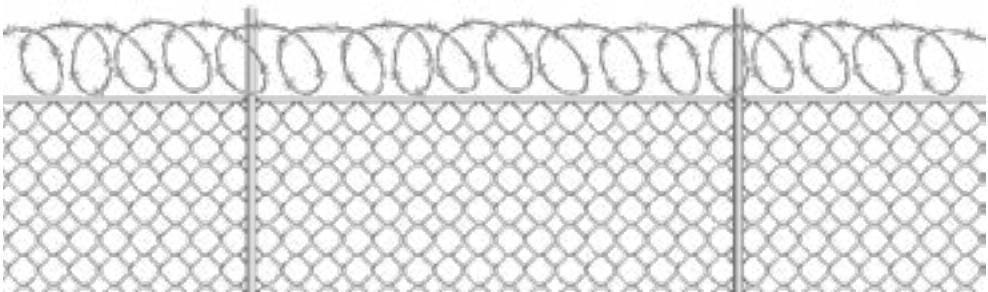

An Israeli military court sentenced her to 13 months in prison, but the Ofer Court added a fine of 4000 shekels to the judgement. During her stay in prison, Lama was elected as a member of the higher leadership committee of Hamas detainees. She was released on 26/07/2019 upon the expiration of her sentence.

It is noteworthy that the Israeli occupation detained her many times.

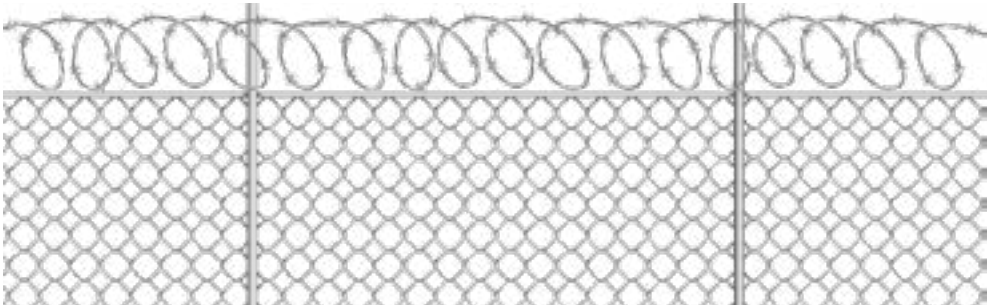

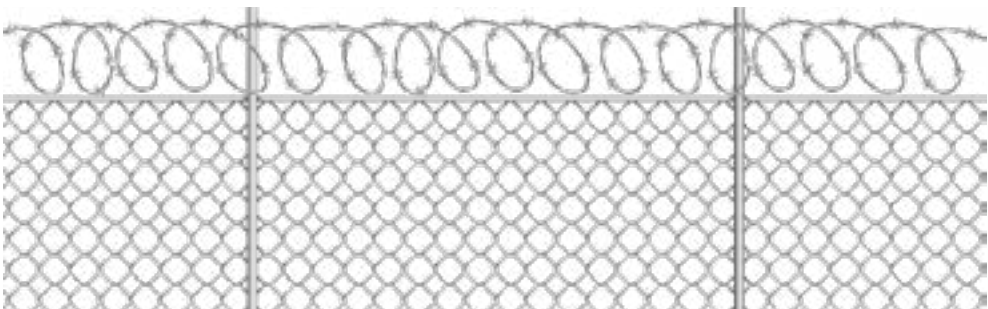

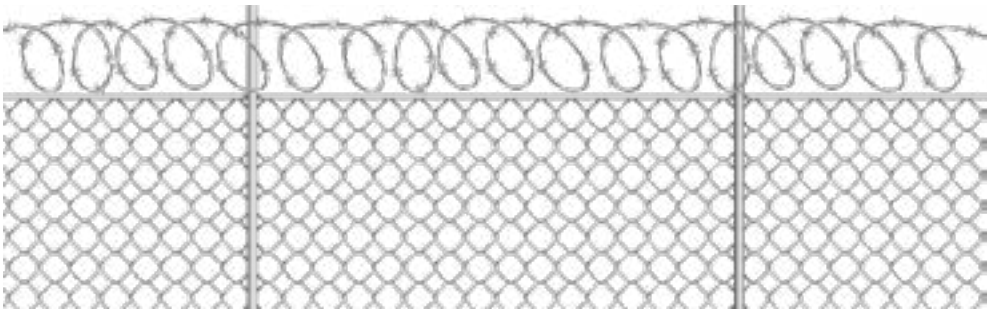

While her son was in hiding (before the assassination), Israeli occupation forces detained Wafaa, her husband, her oldest son, and her son-in-law and threatened to demolish the family's home. Israeli interrogators put her to suffer physical and psychological torture while behind bars. She was subjected to abusive interrogation and kept in solitary confinement during the interrogation. Being unconscious due to torture, she admitted the responsibility for actions that she had never done, but that was under duress. Wafaa had been repeatedly insulted, handcuffed, humiliated, and tortured for being the mother of a Palestinian chased by Israeli occupation forces. She was told that her final words to her son: "Take care of yourself, mom," was considered incitement against the Israeli occupation. An Israeli military court sentenced her to five years in prison and fined her \$12000. The Israeli Prison Service banned her from family visits while in detention. On 19/04/2020, an Israeli court ordered her release on bail equal to \$12000 after serving 18 months in detention, provided that she stays under house arrest. Upon her release, Wafaa had to start a new difficult life. The Israeli occupation had killed her son and demolished her home by then.

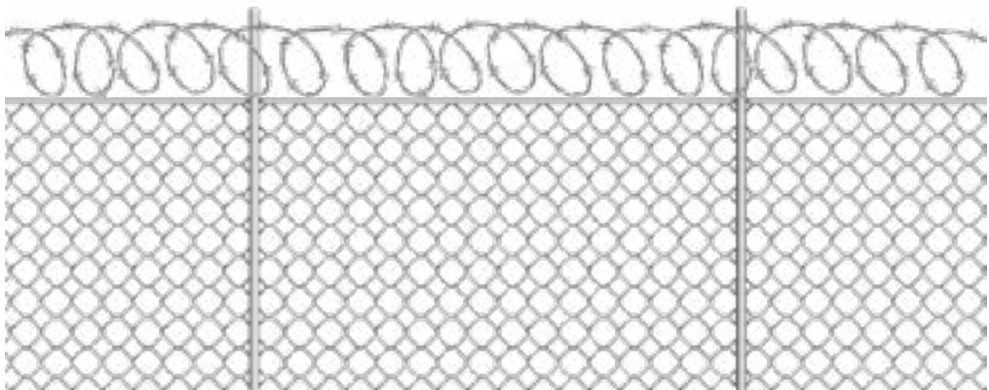
Israeli occupation soldiers broke into Khaleda's house in Al-Bireh at about 9:00 am and transferred her to Ofer center. There, she was searched and interrogated, and charges of membership in a banned organization were brought against her. For nearly three days, before she was transferred to the Al-Moscobiyeh Interrogation Center, she was subjected to investigation in Damon prison, and the same charges were brought against her.

The charge against her was the same charge she was tried for in 2015, which goes against international laws that a person cannot be tried twice for the same issue. Despite her difficult health condition requiring periodic follow-



up, this did not spare her when the Israeli occupation practiced torture against her. The Ofer Military Court issued a sentence against her on 01/03/2021. She was imprisoned for 24 months and 12 months suspended for 5 years from the day of her release, in addition to a fine of 4000 shekels. Eventually, she was released upon the expiration of her sentence.

It is noteworthy that the Israeli occupation refused to allow Khaleda to participate in the funeral procession of her daughter, Suha, 31, who died on 11/07/2021. Although the Addameer human rights organization appealed to the Israeli occupation to release the mother, the Israeli authorities declined.

They also arrested Asim's former detainee wife, Ayat Dahadha, for a few hours. She was released and later her home was demolished.

Umm Asif was placed in a cell devoid of any belongings and no means of heating, although she suffers from diabetes.

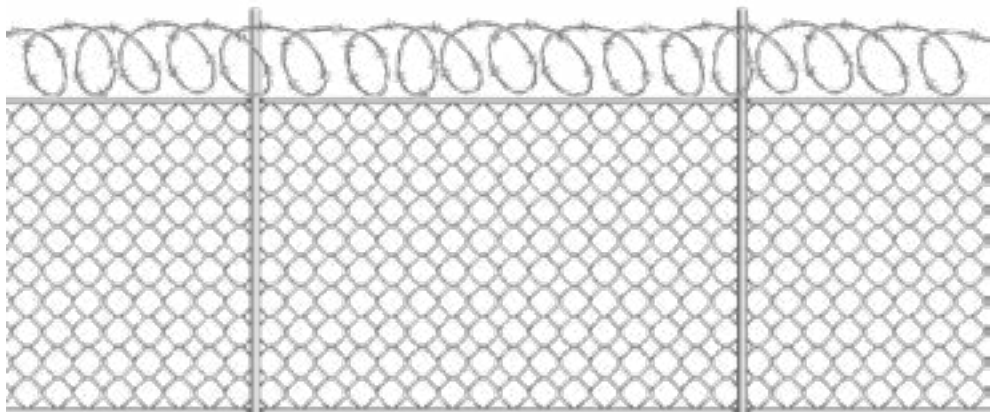
Al-Barghouti recounts the details of her first arrest, saying: "At the beginning of the arrest, I was interrogated in Ofer Prison, and before the investigation began, the Israeli soldiers wanted to strip-search me. I refused. And then one of the officers threatened me saying: "This is a procedure against all detainees"."



She continues, "My answer to him was that I would not be strip-searched, even if this was the last moment in my life. You can execute me if you want. Shocked by my answer, the Israeli officers were satisfied with the search without me taking off my clothes."

Suhair was released after spending about a month in prison, with conditions: bail of ten thousand shekels and a third-party guarantee.

The Israeli occupation court had issued two previous decisions to release her on bail and suspended their implementation at the time after the Public Prosecution announced its intention to file an appeal. The house of her son, Asim, was demolished after her release.

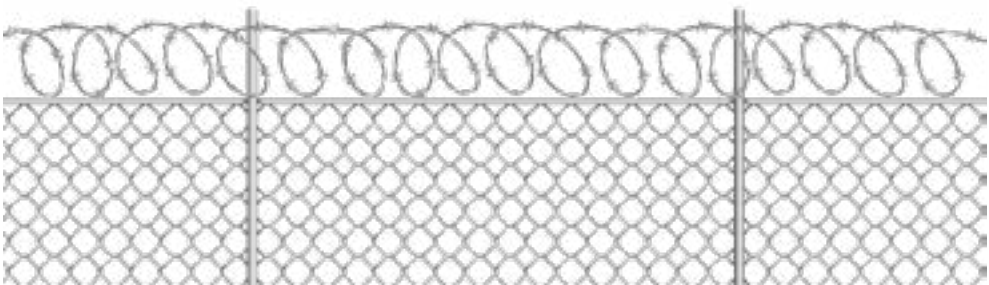

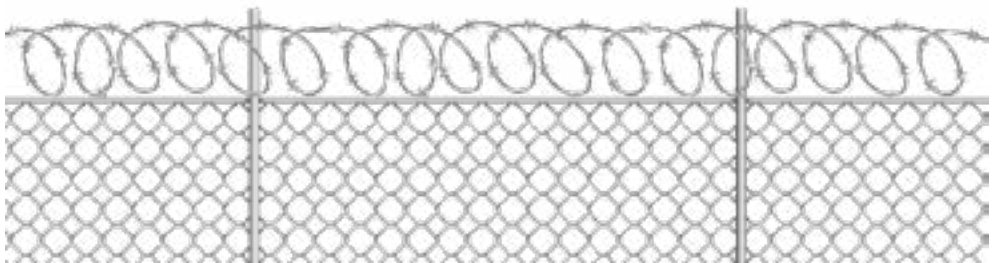

In addition to publications showing her support for the Secretary-General of Hezbollah in a post she wrote on his birthday.

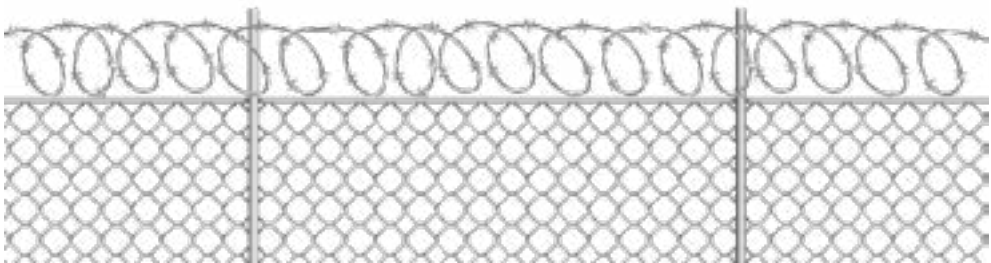
During her arrest, she was transferred to the Al-Moscobiye interrogation center, where the occupation intelligence made her son Qassam watch her from behind the glass in order to put pressure on him.



The interrogators threatened Qassam to subject his mother to a military investigation, with the aim of putting pressure on him and extracting confessions from him.

The Israeli occupation forces released Dr. Wedad on 16/09/2019 under the condition of house arrest in Area C, which is administratively under full control of the Israeli occupation according to the Oslo II Agreement and bail of 40000 shekels until the end of the legal procedures against her. Later, she was fined 20000 shekels.

She wrote her novel, "The Homes," in which she documents her human experience of demolishing her home, arresting her husband and two sons, and moving into several homes due to the occupation. The novel highlights her suffering as a mother of detainees, a detainee, and the wife of a detainee, and the Palestinian women's suffering as a result of violations against them by the Israeli occupation forces.

Israeli occupation forces detained Halima Khandakji while she was crossing the Atara 30/checkpoint arbitrarily. She was transferred to the Al-Moscobiyyeh Interrogation Center. Israeli interrogators insulted and tortured Halima during the detention.

She was later transferred to the Damon Prison after nine consecutive days of interrogation in the Al-Moscobiyyeh Interrogation Center. Thirteen Israeli interrogators conducted the investigation. In a bid to pressure her to make confessions, she was threatened that her 10-year-old child would be detained.

The Israeli Prison Service kept Halima in a dirty, foul-smelling cell. She was released upon the expiration of her sentence.

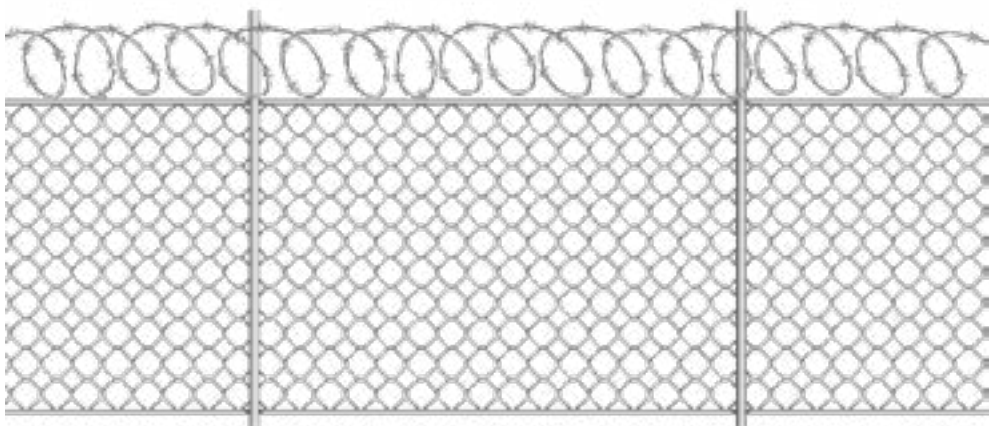

On 24/06/2021, the Israeli Prison Service later transferred her from the Damon Prison to house arrest. Waiting for her trial, she stayed in a house which was far away from her family’s and had an electric locking device.

Palestinian activists created a Facebook page to show solidarity with her and mobilize support for her.

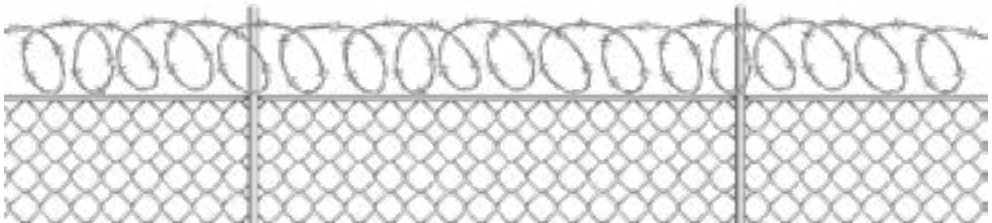

The Israeli occupation banned her from attending the court sessions on the pretext that her case was ‘confidential’.

Although Iman should have had surgery in prison, the Israeli Prison Service declined to admit her to the hospital. She was unable to bid her mother farewell at her funeral as well due to her imprisonment. Eventually, she was released upon the expiration of her sentence.

She was subjected to verbal harassment by criminal detainees. After 21 days in the Hasharon Prison, Ruba was transferred to the Damon Prison.

The military prosecutor indicted Ruba with participation in student activities, like exhibitions and selling books, membership in a banned organization, which is the Democratic Progressive Student Pole, and throwing stones.

Eventually, she was released upon the expiration of her sentence.

The Israeli interrogators investigated her participation in student activities at the university. She was later transferred to the Hasharon Prison.

After postponing her trial several times, the Ofer Military Court sentenced Elia to 11 months in prison and fined her 1,500 shekels, in addition to 10-month-long imprisonment suspended for five years. She was indicted with affiliation with a banned organization, participation in protests against the Israeli occupation, and throwing stones towards Israeli soldiers.

The Israeli Prison Service banned Elia from family visits and continuing her bachelor's study behind bars.

Eventually, she was released upon the expiration of her sentence

Shatha was later transferred to the Hasharon Prison, and then to the Damon Prison. An Israeli court sentenced her to 14 months in detention.

The Israeli occupation released Shatha upon the expiration of her sentence.

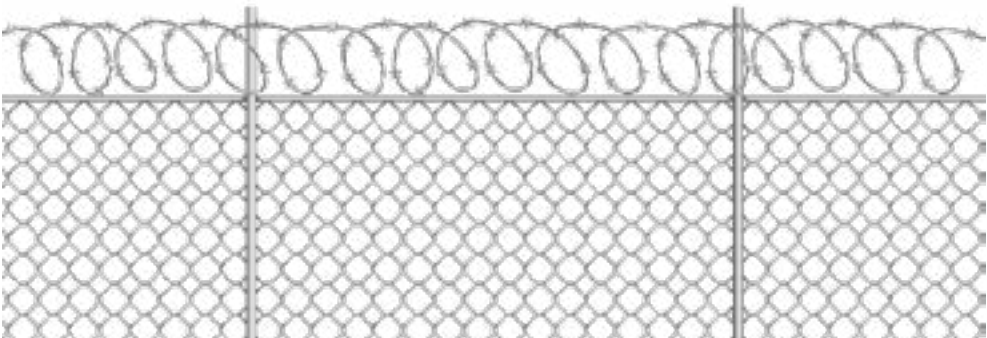

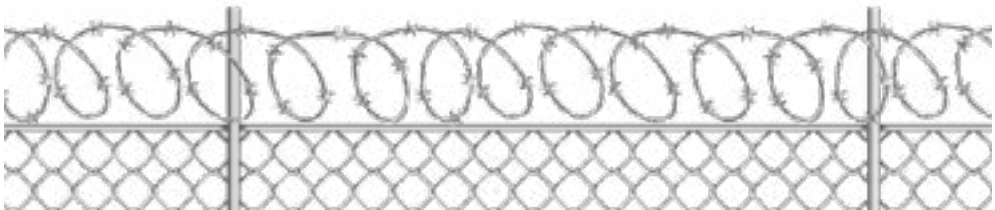

Shatha suffers from many chronic diseases, including diabetes, cholesterol, high blood pressure, and irritable bowel syndrome. In addition, she has undergone many surgeries, such as heart catheterization and eye surgery; thus, the violent interrogation she had at Israeli prisons was a threat to her life. She appeared before court several times. An Israeli court finally sentenced her to 16 months in prison, five years suspended, and a fine of 30 thousand shekels, but another court accepted a plea for early release. She was released on 03/06/2022.

And then she was transferred to the Damon Prison. Her charity works under the women's branch of the Palestinian Islamic Jihad movement. Mona was finally sentenced to 18 months in prison and a fine of 7000 shekels. She is still in prison

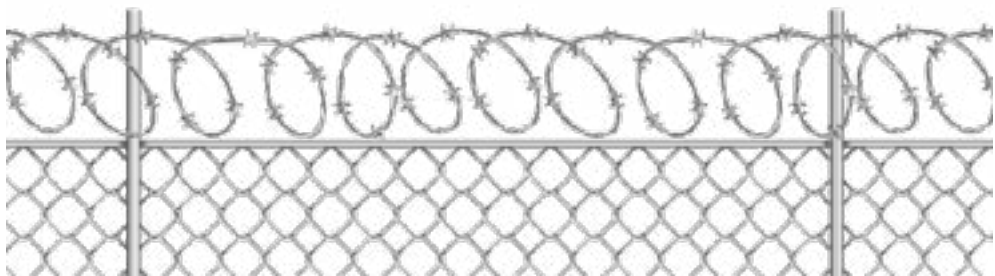

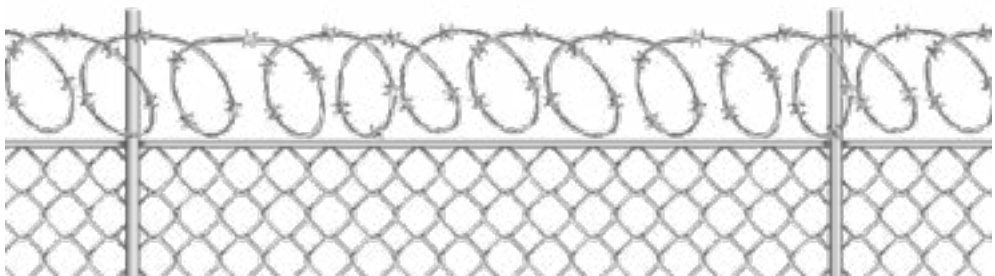

Anhar gained international support and solidarity after footage in which she wished to work outside the Israeli jail went viral. The Israeli occupation was forced to release her a few days before the pregnancy due date, provided that she pays a hefty fine and remains under house arrest.

Israeli occupation forces detained Juana and interrogated her for long hours for allegedly supporting terrorism, ignoring that she holds Spanish citizenship. Although her lawyer confirmed that Juana was not found guilty, the Israeli occupation kept her in detention.

Under pressure from the Spanish embassy in the Israeli occupation, the Israeli occupation released Juana before the expiration of her sentence.

On 08/12/2021, Israeli authorities held her again in administrative detention for four months, which were later renewed for another six months.

Shorouq had suffered from medical negligence in Israeli jails, and her medical condition has deteriorated due to Israeli practices, especially after she got injured in the kidney, stomach, and nerves during her first detention. She is still in prison.

Israeli occupation forces detained Fayrouz, who was a university student, after deliberately shooting her in the leg, claiming that she attempted to stab an Israeli soldier at an intersection near Huwara town, Nablus.

Israeli intelligence interrogated Fayrouz at 'Rabin Medical Center' while she was suffering from enormous pain. She was later transferred via the Bušta, the prisoner transfer vehicle, to a clinic attached to the Ramleh Prison and was kept in solitary confinement there, alone in a dirty cell. The Israeli Prison Service finally transferred her to the Damon Prison. Then, she was taken to the Damon Prison.

Due to the injury in the leg, Fayrouz has had two surgeries and internal fixation of a fracture. She receives psychotherapy at Rambam Health Care Campus.

Fayrouz is still in prison.

Israeli occupation forces detained Nofooth, along with Israa Ghatit, during a raid on her school in the Sheikh Jarrah neighbourhood in Jerusalem for allegedly attempting to stab an Israeli soldier. After searching her violently in front of her mates and teachers, she was dragged into a military jeep, blindfolded and handcuffed with iron chains.

Nofooth suffered from physical and psychological torture in prison. The Israeli occupation forces deprived her of food and meeting with family or a lawyer. In a bid to force her to make confessions, she was threatened that the Israeli occupation would demolish her family's home.

The Israeli occupation moved her multiple times between prisons until she was finally kept in the Damon Prison.

The Israeli authorities released her friend Israa on bail two weeks later. But Nofooth is still held in prison.

It is noteworthy that the Israeli occupation had previously detained Nofooth for drawing the Palestinian flag at a recreational activity organized for the children of her neighbourhood. She was interrogated and released back then.

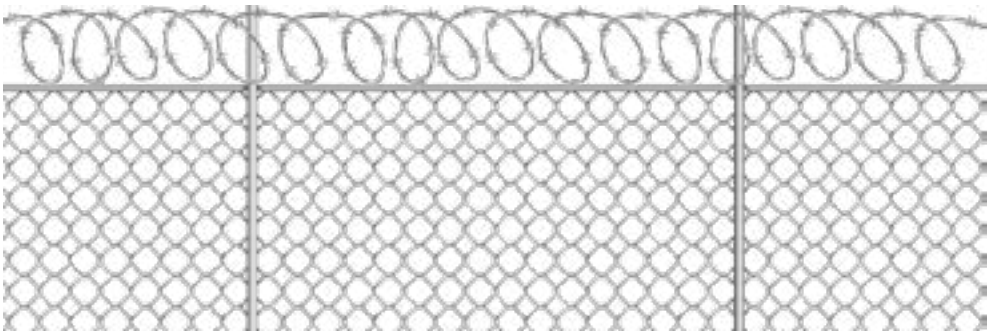

The Israeli occupation detained Ayyam, who is a peddler selling perfumes and makeup products in the city of Hebron, near the Al-Ibrahimi Mosque, for keeping a knife. It has been a regular practice for the Israeli occupation to detain Palestinian women for the same fabrication. It is noteworthy that Ayyam is a simple, illiterate Palestinian who works to provide for her family.

After interrogating her at the nearby police station, Israeli occupation forces transferred Ayyam to the Damon Prison. Like many other Palestinian women detainees in Israeli prisons, she was deprived of her right to meet with her family or a lawyer. The Israeli Prison Service claimed that Ayyam has a 'security ban'.

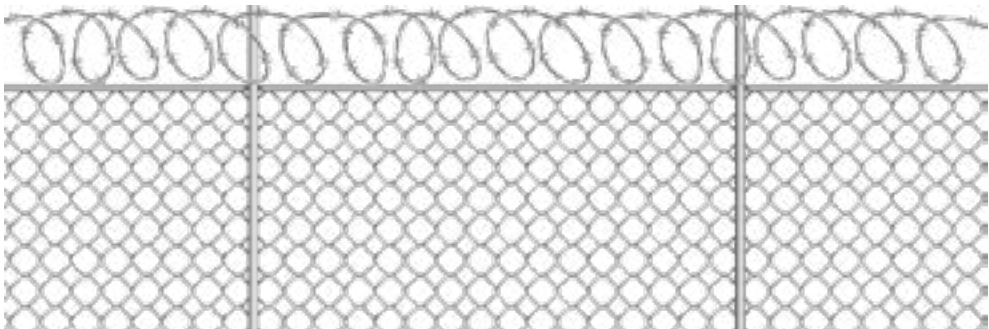

Detention circumstances:

On 07/07, 2021, Israeli occupation forces detained Palestinian student Lyan Naser, 21, in a pre-dawn raid on her home. She was a student at Birzeit University.

The Israeli Prison Service first kept her in the Hasharon (Telmond) Prison and then transferred her to the Damon Prison. An Israeli court charged Lyan with the organization of student activity without making a judgment against her.

After the Israeli court postponed her trial, Lyan was abruptly released on bail on 26/08/2021 after spending 50 days in jail. But the Israeli court is yet to continue her trial. She is still waiting for the final court ruling against her.

Bushra was arrested more than once, the first of which was in 2011 when she was 18 years old, and she was sentenced to 16 months, of which she served 5 months as she was released in the Gilad Shalit prisoner exchange deal.

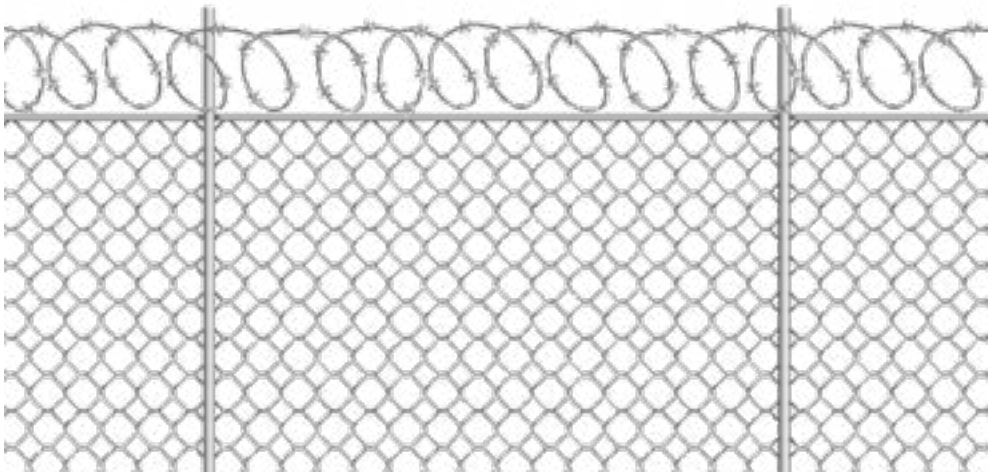
The Israeli occupation forces re-arrested her for the second time in 2014 to complete her previous sentence.

She was arrested for the third time on 01/11/2017 and served eight months in administrative detention. The Israeli occupation released her on 19/06/2018. But she was re-arrested on 11/12/2019 and the occupation authorities sentenced her to eight months with no charge presented. She was released on 28/07/2020. The Israeli occupation detained her at a temporary checkpoint near the Yitzhar settlement on 09/11/2020 south Nablus and sentenced her to renewable four months in administrative detention. Her father, Jamal Al-



Taweel, went on a hunger strike in response. After Palestinians launched a solidarity campaign with her, the Israeli occupation was forced to release her on 05/10/2021. But she was re-arrested on 21/03/2022 and sentenced to three months in administrative detention which were later renewed for another three. She is still in prison.

Bushra's father, Jamal al-Tawil, a leader in the Hamas movement, spent about 14 years in Israeli jails, and her mother spent about a year in Israeli prisons

Saadyieh, 68, is the oldest Palestinian women detainee held in Israeli jails. Originally from Idhna town in Hebron, she is a mother of eight children, and she has grandchildren. Israeli occupation forces detained her multiple times; the first detention was in 1987. She was also held in administrative detention in 2017.

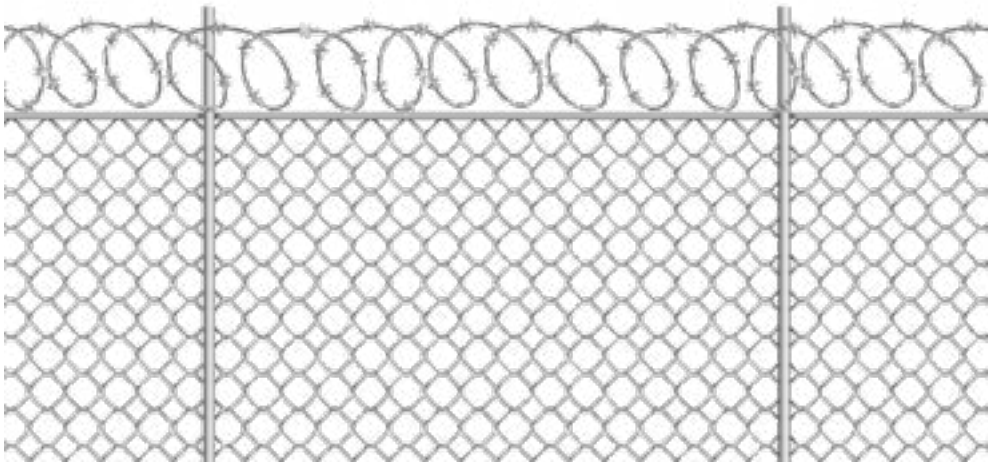
On 18/12/2021, Israeli occupation forces detained her near the Al-Ibrahimi Mosque when she was on her way to visit her daughter. Israeli occupation forces beat her and then claimed that she tried to stab an Israeli soldier. This attack caused her many injuries.

Saadyieh attended the first court hearing sitting in a wheelchair. Her lawyer requested the Israeli Prison Service to conduct a medical examination for the lady due to her difficult health conditions. After the diagnosis, it was found that she suffers from diabetes and high blood pressure.



The Israeli prosecution requested her detention for five years and a fine of 15 thousand shekels, but the Israeli court has not made a final judgment.

The Israeli Prison Service refused to provide medical care for her, so her health conditions continued to deteriorate. On 02/07/2022, she fainted in the 'Fora'. When the Israeli Prison Service admitted her to a clinic attached to the prison, she died there. Saadyieh was the first Palestinian women detainee to die inside Israeli jails.

Detention circumstances:

Hanadi Alhalawani is a Palestinian Jerusalemite whom the Israeli occupation has deported from the Al-Aqsa Mosque for more than nine years arbitrarily.

Israeli Intelligence summoned Hanadi for the first time in late 2012 and threatened that they would deny her travel and medical treatment. The Israeli officer told her: “I am here to keep calm in the place of the three divine religions, not only Islam, and you are a troublemaker in this place.”

Hanadi led a project called ‘Groups of Knowledge’, but it was declared by the Israeli occupation as a terrorist project. She was later placed on the Israeli blacklist of persons denied entry into the Al-Aqsa Mosque due to her participation in this project. Hanadi has become well-known among Palestinians following the confrontations at the Al-Asbat Gate in 2017 and the Gate of Mercy of the Al-Aqsa in 2019. Although she was deported from Al-Aqsa back then, Israeli occupation forces broke into her home and arrested her.

As for the other Palestinian women detainees, Hanadi suffered enormously in Israeli jails. The most difficult situation she went through was when Israeli

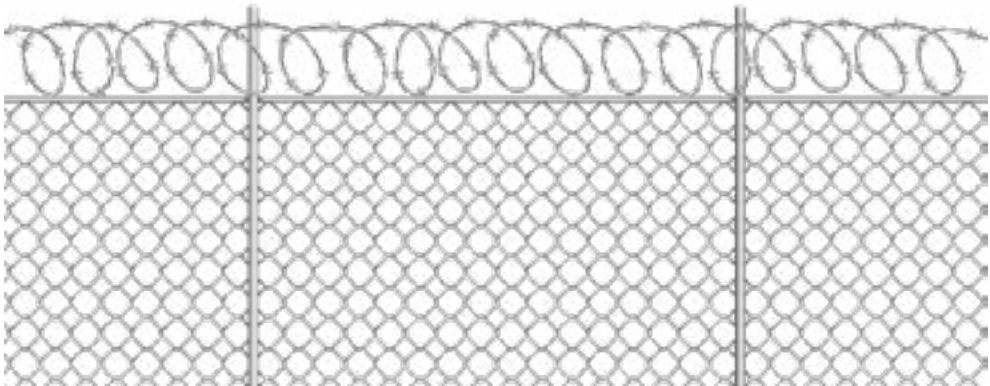


soldiers removed her clothes. Alone, she was kept naked for 15 minutes in a solitary confinement cell, which was monitored by surveillance cameras. The Israeli Prison Service once forced her to attend a court hearing without Hijab. Since 2011, Israeli occupation forces had detained Hanadi 65 times and deported her from the Al-Aqsa Mosque for nine years. Her family's home has also been demolished multiple times.

Her last arrest was on 09/06/2022. Israeli soldiers detained her at Bab Hutta in the Old City of Jerusalem and handed her a six-month-long order of deportation that expires in December 2022.

By 2019, the Israeli occupation had also banned her from traveling for three years, which was renewed multiple times and is still in effect. Two cases are filed against Hanadi at Israeli courts, and she will have to attend a court hearing in September 2022.

It is noteworthy that Hanadi has a master's degree in Democracy and Human Rights from Birzeit University. She has dedicated her life to defending Al-Aqsa and the women detainees in Israeli jails.
